

Merkel students will have a holiday this Friday, while teachers attend the District TSTA Convention in Abilene.



Because the problem is widespread, many parents are trying to solve it on a community-wide basis. They've found that one of the finest recreational activities a town or neighborhood can provide is a supervised range-firing program for its youth .

Rifle ranges are sponsored by such concerned groups as the Boy Scouts, the YMCA, PAL or 4-H; and there, a father can start his son-or daughter-on the fundamentals of safe gun handling.
