City Council Eyes Area Trash Burning

City Council members, meeting Monday evening, had much to say concerning the "burning of trash in barrels in the residential areas.

"Burning of trash in barrels is getting to be a serious situation," said Mayor Horace Hargrove. "We have had four fires in the new type garbage pickup truck, and have had to have the fire department out to put them out." Hargrove emphasized that

"trash pickup men cannot empty barrels when there is a fire or one is smoldering."

"So, if you want to be sure that your barrels are emptied by the city garbage department each time, check your barrels to see that all fires are out," said Hargrove.

Burning of trash in barrels in residential areas will be against the law after Oct. 30, 1969. "However, until that time reo-

ple in the residential districts may continue to burn trash, but be sure fires are out before trash pickup time. (Burning of trash in barrels in business district is against the city ordinance.)

Councilmen also reminded Merkelites that "eventually barrels will be replaced by galvanized cans."

Councilman Button suggested that people who find they have to get new containers to go ahead and buy the galvanized cans now, instead of getting barrels.

Other items on the agenda included the discussion of the Landfill, which goes into effect Nov. 1, and the raising of trash hauling rates.

"We are getting the land ready now," said Hargrove, "and by Oct. 30, expect to have everything ready to go. Still working on a way to finance equipment necessary for operating the Landfill."

People were also reminded that limbs, shrubs and other trash could still be hauled to the city dump grounds, but "in the very

MERKEL LIONS CLUB HEARS TALK ON TC RURAL REVAMPING PLAN

Merkel Lions Club members unanimously voiced a vote of confidence in Taylor County Judge Roy Skaggs and the Commissioners Court at their Tuesday noon meeting.

The vote of confidence came following a discussion by Skaggs and Commissioners concerning the rural revamping plan that has been "under fire" for several weeks, and was approved Tuesday morning in a vote of 3-1.

"Redistricting is an attempt to equally balance Taylor County's voting population within four precincts, according to Supreme Court Law," said Judge Skaggs.

Commissioners attending the noon meeting and taking part in the discussion were Felton Saverance, Jake McMillon and Joe Cypert.

"Not everyone is going to be pleased with any kind of redistricting in Taylor County," said Skaggs, "but your commissioners have tried to do what they thought was best for Taylor County. It has been a trying time and I sincerely believe that all of our commissioners had the interest of the people of Taylor County in mind."

A note of humor was dropped into the discussion when a Lions Club member asked, "Do we still get to keep Joe Cypert in our precinct?"

Judge Skaggs immediately assured the questioner that they would.

The revamping plan has the following effect on Abilene's voting boxes, according to Skaggs.

Precincts 5, 6, 7, 26 and 33 will be under Nelson; Precincts 39, 40, 130 and 41 make up the remainder of Prec. 2 under Cypert; Precincts 3, 4, 8, 9 and 19 go to Prec. 3 under Saverance, and Precincts 1, 2, 10, 11, 12, 14, 17 and will be placed in Prec. 4, under McMillon.

It was after commissioners had shown members a map of the revamping plan and after Judge Skaggs had remarked, "We tried to keep the interest of the people of Taylor County in mind," that the vote of confidence was expressed.

Other items on the club's agenda was the discussion of plans for a garage sale at Saturday's Flea Market and the appointment of the Rev. Jim Sinclair as liaison officer for the Lions Club and the Merkel Teen Center.

"We definitely need someone to represent both organizations," said president Don Warren, "and Jim Sinclair has been working with the youth of Merkel for quite some time, and has been doing an outstanding job."

Sinclair, who will serve in the capacity as adult representative for the Teen Center and for the Lions Club, said "I will be happy to serve in this capacity and will do the best I can to represent both organizations."

Teen president, Randy Doan, who was a guest at the noon meeting, said, "he was sure members of the Teen Center would be glad to know that Rev. Sinclair was their representative."

Watch Out For Those School Children — Cautions Chief Briley

With school "just around the corner" the Merkel Police Department are cautioning motorists to "become aware of youngsters everywhere."

"Children are America's proudest possessions," said police chief, Mike Briley. "They are guarded every moment while they are young, but then comes the time when they have to leave their parents' watchful eyes and go to school. It is then we hope that our safety lessons will be remembered."

Briley commented, "We send our children off to school, where as pedestrians, they have to put up with an ever-increasing number of motorists. There will be children going to and from school, children running across streets to see who can get to the drive-in

first, and some chasing balls out into the traffic lanes. And every time you see a child in a school zone, you should think of him as a stop sign, a yield sign, a school crossing sign and caution sign all rolled up into one pretty little bundle."

The police department will patrol the 20 MPH school zone that completely surrounds the schools.

"Speaking as your chief of police and speaking in behalf of City Judge, Roy Kimbrell, parents can rest assured that we will do our utmost to insure your children's safety," said Briley. "Drive carefully — everyone — for the little boy or girl who gets injured or perhaps killed — because of a failure to watch out for them — just might be your own."

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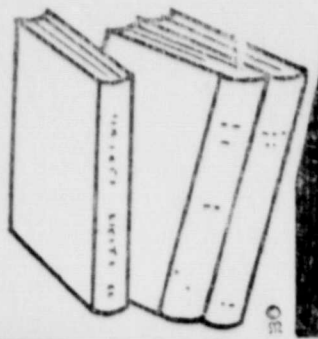

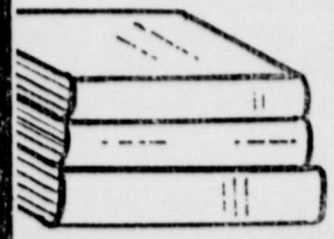

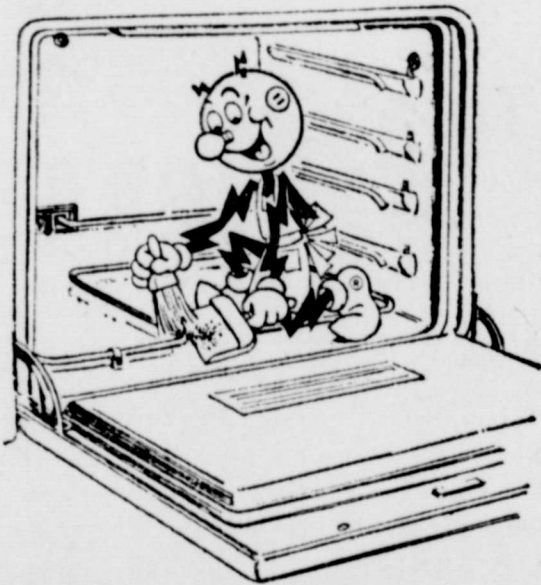
