If there's anything which riles nice citizens more than being out of water, it's reading a story about how great the new water system is while they're out of

Since the rains of later summer stopped, "Dry" would have been an accurate forecast from then to now.

"Never have I seen it SO wet and then SO dry such a short time later," a water-conscious farmer commented this week, A good rain now would give the new crop of wheat a boost and would also, no doubt, aid farmers in their land breaking.

We've had a conference with Weatherman Willie Williams In Bovingabout this moisture shortage and he keeps giving us hope. However, last week, for instance, Willie predicted moisture. And we got some. But it was very little. Just enough to save Willie's reputation, in fact, and not enough to be of any

benefit to the land. The rains in late summer produced more volunteer wheat in this area than some oldtimers ever remember. This has added to the number of cattle on wheat pasture in the area. The volunteer wheat was ready to be pastured this fall earlier than most of the sewed wheat, But, the volunteer wheat was produced by late summer rains, and there hasn't been any measurable moisture since. Sixty more days of dryness and the farmers will be complaining loud enough for you to hear them.

Another pheasant season has been folded back into the pages of Parmer County sports history. Observations from here indicated that the season was a good one for good and/or lucky nunters and poor for poor and/ or unlucky hunters.

Out-of-county hunters came here to hunt and brought some green stuff with them. And we don't mean that color of shotgun shells. That was a boost to some county businesses, without a doubt. A man from Childress, for instance, won third place in the longest tailfeather contest here in Bovina.

We hope that the out-ofcounty hunters were enthused enough about the season here that they'll be interested in coming back and bringing their friends with them.







In City Limits--

Council Passes Traffic Rules

The Bovina City Commission met Thursday in regular session and passed two City ordinances concerning traffic regulations within the City limits.

One ordinance demands that the state low of the 30 miles per hour speed limit on city limit streets be observed within Bovina except where speed limit signs are posted.

This 30 mile per hour speed limit has been a state law in Texas for many years and the commission has given Bovina policemen instructions not only to enforce the law within city limits, but to issue traffic tickets to violators. Another city ordinance prohibits "U" turns except at street intersections and parking within 10 feet of the end of the curb

It is also illegal for drivers to cross the center line or cross opposite traffic lanes on any street inside City limits except at street intersections.

Other actions included the approval for purchase of two gasoline pumps for the city, the transferring of \$4,750 from the sinking fund to Security State Bank in Farwell to cover bonds and a \$25 raise in salary for both the trash collector and city secretary.

The City of Bovina approved a motion to cooperate with the Municipal League on the ordinance promoting legislation on a municipal sales tax on a permission basis.







Legal Notices

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Bovina. Texas, Inc. that after the effective date of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person operating a motor vehicle within the City limits of the City of Bovina to:

Make a U-turn in any street except at intersections, As used herein, the term "U"-tern shall mean a turn of at least 180 degrees.

Park a motor vehicle within 10 feet of any intersection. Any person so parking shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Parking a motor vehicle more than three feet from the curb. Any person violating this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined, not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$100,00. An emergency and extreme public necessity exists and this ordinance shall be effective after its first publication, and shall be published in the next issue of the "Bovina Blade", a weekly news-paper, published within the City of Bovina.


