Who is it who hasn" had enough rain?

The rain picture the last few months has completely erased the hot, dry weather picture, that threatened our area earlier with a severe drought.

Just before the rains started a few weeks ago, a lot of the ground was cracked open due to the long, dry hot weather. But now, with the amount of rain we have received, it has sealed cracks over and there is standing water over the land.

With the late rains, the crops are late and are making a wonderful growth and will make a lot of grazing or hay. Some stockmen report they are buying cotton cake to feed the livestock and planning on grass and less

We were on a ranch last Sunday, looking over 40 acres of coastal grass being watered and running 70 head of steers on it. The steers were being fed 2 pounds of cake daily per steer. This setup was far out of anything I have seen for finishing cattle out. The cattle will go to market when they reach 700 pounds. They are now weighing around 550.

We had a report from a good rancher friend down in Coke County this week. He is F. E. Modgling of Bronte. He has sold 1.500 lambs last week, and had bought the lambs earlier to winter, but due to the continued rise in price he resold the lambs and says perhaps his 7 section ranch will go unstocked this winter. So that's what a lot of late rain will do.

Fred White, who ranches on the old White Home Ranch, told us this week after Sammy Cox of Abilene died, that he. White, moved off the Cox ranch, and went back to the old White Home Ranch. Fred said after being ranch foreman on the larger ranches, would make an old man out of a young man, due to the labor shortage.



Fallout Would Be Widespread

The distribution of fallout particles after a nuclear attack would depend on what part of the country had been attacked, and the number of weapons used, as well as wind currents, weather conditions and other factors. However, there is no way of predicting in advance what areas of the country would be affected, or how soon the particles would fall back to earth at a particu-

lar location. Some communities might get a heavy accumulation of fall-out, while others might get little or none. No area in the U.S. could be sure of not get-

Areas close to a nuclear ex-plosion might receive fallout within 15 to 30 minutes. On the

Fallout Causes Radiation Sickness

Almost all of the radiation that people would absorb from fallout particles would come from particles outside their own bodies. Only simple precautions would be necessary to avoid swallowing the particles, and it would be practically im-possible to inhale them.

People exposed to fallout radiation do not become radioactive and thereby dangerous to other people. Radiation sickness is not contagious or infectious, and one person can-not "catch it" from another person.

Protection Is Possible

People can protect them-selves against fallout radia-tion, and have a good chance of surviving, by staying inside a fallout shelter. In most cases, the fallout radiation level outside the shelter would decrease rapidly enough to permit peo-ple to leave the shelter within a few days.

Even in communities that received relatively heavy accu-mulations of fallout particles, people soon might be able to leave shelter for a few minutes or a few hours at a time to per-form emergency tasks. In most places, it is unlikely that fulltime shelter occupancy would be required for more than a week or two.

The information in this story was furnished by the U.S. Department of Defense, Office of Civil De-fense, to help people pre-pare for a nuclear attack and learn what actions to take in case an attack should occur. Local gov-ernment authorities are re-sponsible for supplying, the public with more de-tailed survival instructions for this area. New Look At The Big Board

For years one of the most familiar sights in America has been the trading floor, of the New York Stock Exchange. No matter where people live, they generally recognize photographs of the bustling securities marketplace rising five stories to its ornate, lofty ceiling. In an age of change it isn't surprising that this has changed some too. The historic trading floor at the corner of Wall and Broad Streets in New York City looks exactly the same as it always has. But it has a young brother now.

During the summer, the Stock Exchange opened a \$5 million extension of its trading facilities that increase total space by twenty

The new extension, under construction for 18 months, provides Stock Exchange brokers more space to handle the public's orders quickly and efficiently, at a time when some 26 million Americans own stock and trading averages more than 10 million shares a day.

With bright blue walls, closed circuit television ticker, and an automated lighting system, the new extension will serve as a proving ground for many of the automated techniques that will be incorporated into the projected new Exchange building. It will rise on a landfill site at the eastern end of Wall Street and is scheduled for completion in the mid-1970's.


