





1/2 cup melted butter or margarine

1/3 cup sugar

1 tsp. cinnamon

Mix together egg, milk and apple; add all at once to dry ingredients and mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill greased 21/2 x 11/4 inch muffin tins 3/3 full. Bake in 350 degree moderate oven 20 or 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans; immediately roll donuts in melted butter and then in cinnamon and sugar that have been mixed together. 
