Voters-Cast Your Ballot In Precinct Where You Reside

Precinct voting boxes and polling places have been changed from their designated places as of last election, due to the re-districting of the county by the Commissioners' Court, according to Larry Cunningham, Taylor County Democratic Executive chairman.

"The law reads that persons will vote in the precinct in which they reside," said Cunningham. "and this holds true with the May 2 election."

Joe Lassiter, Merkel Democratic Precinct chairman, urged all voters of "our community to vote in the May 2 Primary."

"But, be sure that you check where you actually live in relation to your polling place," he said.

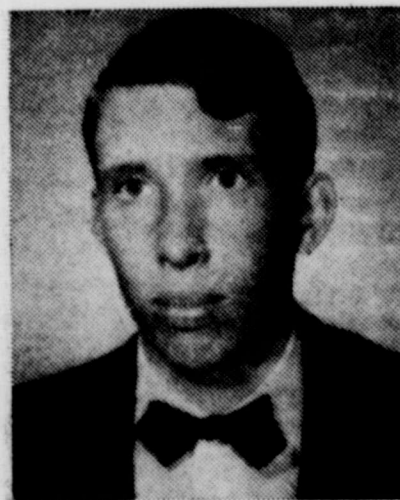

Polls Open 7 A. M. In May 2 Primary

Saturday's primary elections flow toward Merkel with scarcely a ripple.

Top "wave" on the political sea is the swell caused by Senator Ralph Yarborough seeking re-election with opponent Lloyd Bentsen not pouring any oil on the waters.

Second "wave" is the race between Merkel farmer and outstanding soil conservationist Joe McDuff and C. E. Gatlin, former Abilene mayor, for County Commissioner of Precinct 2.

Merkel Democrats will vote at the Merkel Gym with Joe Lassiter as election judge.

Merkel Republicans will vote in their primary will have to journey to Abilene to the Calvary Baptist Church where Marcus Anderson will be precinct judge.

Republicans also have a senatorial race going between Robert Morris and George Bush, Paul Eggers and Roger Martin are on the ballot as GOP governor candidates. Two Abilene doctors are vying to head the Taylor County GOP. They are Clyde Morgan and Rod C. Canedy.

Precinct conventions, also slated for both parties Saturday, haven't produced a ripple of controversy.

Since there is no contest for the governorship in the Democratic primary for the first time since primaries were begun, less attention is being given to statewide races. The Texas Election Bureau is estimating that 1,800,000 Democrats will vote.

Little attention has been paid to the effort of David Brown of Sherman to defeat Atty. Crawford Martin, or to the campaign by Connie Lawson of Taylor against Railroad Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey.

Lawyers are taking an active part in the two high court races, Hawthorn Phillips of Austin, Judge Matt Davis of Texarkana and Judge James G. Denton of Lubbock are seeking an open seat on the Texas Supreme Court. Judge Truman Roberts of Hamil-

ton and Earl Smith of San Angelo are candidates for an open place on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Other statewide offices are uncontested.

Saturday's Republican primary is expected to draw about 150,000 voters. U.S. Representative George Bush of Houston is favored to win the U.S. Senate nomination over Robert Morris of Plano. It is Bush's second try for the Senate. Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls, although he was ill and unable to campaign for nearly two weeks, is favored over Roger Martin of Gainesville in the gubernatorial race. It's Eggers' second race for governor.

State Representative Grant Jones is facing an opponent in Joe A. Hernandez. Both are from Abilene. Representative Frank Calhoun will not have an opponent in the Democratic Primary but

will face Republican Marvin Saugh in the November General Election.

Miss Irene Crawford, the present district clerk with 18 years experience, is facing an opponent in Troy Willis, veteran Taylor County lawman.

Roger Q. Garrett Jr. of Abilene and Austin McCloud of Colorado City are running for chief justice of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland.

McDuff, who says it has been his lifelong ambition to be a county commissioner, has been cited as an outstanding farmer and the district soil conservationist and has been active in Taylor County farm organizations. He is a member of the Merkel School Board.

Gatlin said that in his term as mayor of Abilene he worked to produce the contract to obtain Merkel's water contract with Abilene.

DEMO PRECINCT CONVENTION SET MAY 2, 7:30 P.M.

Democratic Precinct Convention for voting Precinct No. 24 will be held at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, May 2, in the High School Gymnasium lobby, according to chairman, Joe E. Lassiter.

"This is the same place where the Democratic Primary election will be held earlier that same day," said Lassiter.

Voting polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and in order to attend the 7:30 p.m. convention "one must have voted in the Democratic Primary preceding the convention."

Precinct No. 24 will be allowed 19 delegates to the Democratic Convention to be held Saturday.

May 9 in Abilene. Precinct delegate strength is based on the total votes each voting precinct cast for the Democratic Party Nominee for Governor at the immediate preceding General 1968 Election. Precinct 24 total vote was 487, Lassiter explained.

"Each voter is urged to attend the Convention," said Lassiter. "If anyone wishes a resolution to be presented to the County Convention and presented to the assembled Precinct Convention for its deliberation."

Lassiter stressed that each Democratic voter has a voice in the convention, and it should be

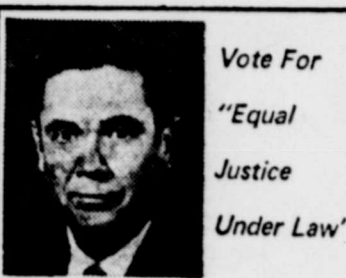

He said America must get back to a mere basic rural population to meet growing needs. But this would not be done until farming income is near parity, he said.

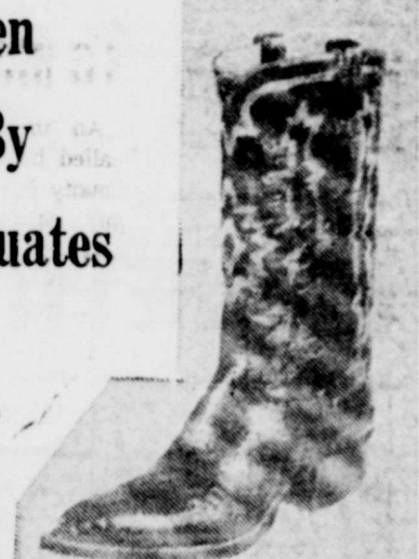
