'WRITE HANOI TODAY' LION CLUBBERS TOLD

Members and guests of Merkel Lion Clubbers heard Mrs. Ronald (Ann) Backschie urge "everyone to write a letter to Hanoi Today."

Mrs. Backschie, who is living in Abilene while her husband is in Thailand, became interested in the welfare of the prisoners in North Vietnam after meeting Mrs. Paula Hartness, wife of an Air Force captain thought to be a prisoner of war.

"We very definitely believe that the campaign to write letters to Hanoi is effective," she said. "Just as war criticism is used as propaganda by Hanoi, the letters act as a counter-propaganda. It helps to convince Hanoi that the people of the United States are concerned for their men and the more letters we get going over there the more forceful our concern will be."

MERKEL BADGERS TO THAW THE BLIZZARDS

"You come out to the ball game Friday night and see the boys (the Merkel Badgers) play the Winters Blizzards and you're going to see a heck of a ball game."

That was Head Coach Paul Woodfin telling members of the Merkel Booster Club his outlook for this Friday's game to be held at 7:30 p.m. at Badger Field.

About Merkel's 12 to 0 loss to Clyde last week - another non-conference game - Woodfin said:

Reserve Tickets Deadline Friday

All season reserve tickets to the Badger Football games will be on sale until 3:30 p.m. Friday afternoon, said Mack Fisher, superintendent.

"After Friday at 3:30 p.m., season reserve tickets will be \$1.75 each, here in our office or at the game," said Fisher.

Price of season reserve (5 tickets) is \$7.50 if purchased before 3:30 p.m. Friday.

General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for students.

This was the game that experienced Quarterback Bill Whisenhunt hobbled on the sidelines with a twisted ankle and Kerry Thames was yanked from center to quarterback.

But for Merkel the highlights of the Clyde game was the defense with Buster Tarpley and Don Purser and Paul Thames among those who starred.

But Woodfin said this week's game would see the return of Whisenhunt in some position either offensive or defensive.

And the coach said this week the Badger fans would see an offensive game as good as the defensive game the Badgers put together last week.

Question is can the new coach for Merkel get both games working on the same night?

Woodfin said that the Badgers just weren't "up" for the Clyde game. He made a plea for Merkel fans to let Badger players know that they had the adults' support.

Coach Woodfin also made a plea for boys who are considering playing football to come out for the game.

"The door is still open," said Woodfin. He said every boy who went out for the junior varsity team would get to play. This is not true for the varsity squad, he said, pointing out that in varsity games there was more emphasis placed on winning if possible.

He said 41 boys are now signed up to play football.

However, lack of depth is still one of the problems facing the Merkel squad.

Tommy Anderson lugged the leather 45 yards for Merkel in the Clyde game as the Badgers' leading ground gainer.

Fisher expressed appreciation to the group in "taking time to

come out to this meeting."

"We know that everyone has a busy schedule, he said, "but the very fact that you are here tells us that you are interested in making this 1970-71 Community Fund Drive a success. Since this will be our main and only drive for the year, we must work hard and see that every person in Merkel has an opportunity to contribute."

Stopping by the Merkel Mail before leaving for San Antonio Monday, Mrs. Lippard graciously let us browse through her Merkel High School picture book, annual, and "notes."

Daughter of the late Rev. and Mrs. T. N. Lowrey, Faye "grew up in Merkel" and was a graduate of the Merkel High School. Her father was pastor of the Methodist Church here. Classmates included Mrs. Luola (Coate) Hail, Clara (Sample) Largent, Minnie (Harris) Duckett, Clementine Barker, Rupert Evans, John West and Sam Swann.

"It was a thrill to come back for a visit," said Mrs. L., "and such a wonderful thrill to find that my home place at 212 Orange Street was still there. The Methodist Church looks almost the same as it did when I attended there so many years ago. Of course, there have been many improvements in my church from the outside, but it's still the same."

She recalls that her father held the service that laid the cornerstone of the church.

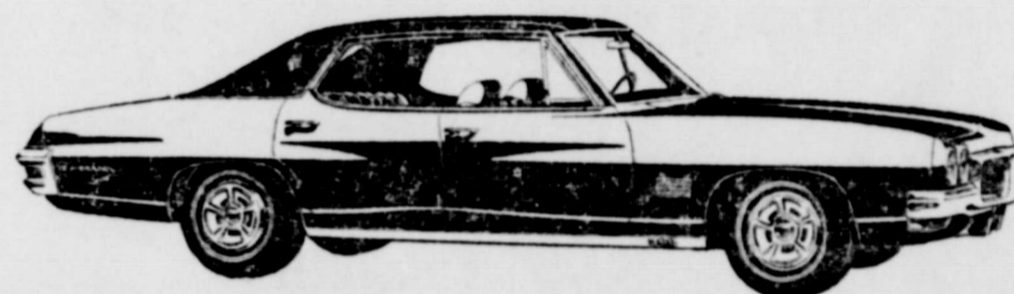

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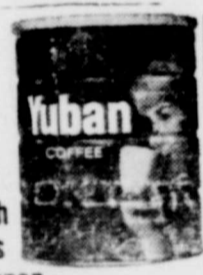

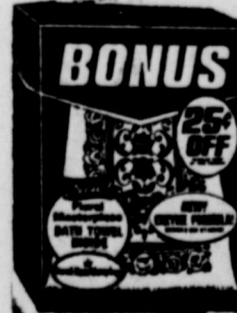
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
