The Merkel Chamber of Commerce has accepted an invitation extended by Governor Preston Smith to participate in the 3rd Annual Governor's Conference on Industrial Expansion to be held Tuesday, October 13.

More than a thousand persons

are expected to attend the daylong conference from throughout the state. The program will serve two basic purposes. It will allow Texas to honor expanding industries, and reveal for the first time the results of the inter-state study on plant location incentives being offered by the nation's leading industrial states.
