Mrs. Ray Wilson, recently appointed member of the USO National Council, is representative for the local USO fund raising campaign.

Since its founding in 1941, the USO has provided morale - boosters for U.S. troops around the world.

"Concern for the morale of American servicemen has come a long, long way since WWI when the nearest thing to the USO was a single star, Elsie Janis," writes Louis Sobol in the January, 1971, edition of "The American Legion Magazine," covering the Story of the USO, "She abandoned her stage career to dedicate herself to entertaining troops in the war zones. The U.S. servicemen have been engaged, so to speak, to rub shoulders with glamor queens, including the successive Miss Americas, Miss Universes and Miss Black Americas - or with such celebrities as Bob Hope, Martha Raye and Georgie Jessell, as well as with Jack Benny, Marlene Dietrich, Al Jolson, Carole Landis, Edgar Bergen and Joe E. Brown.
