water, and no one was complaining.

And the faces of the large crowd gathered at a local restaurant at 7 a.m. this past Friday were wreathed in smiles — looking and talking about the rain.

Horace Boney reported that total inches of rainfall recorded as of Tuesday were 3.4, and most areas from Merkel east and north-eastward received slow, gentle rains Sunday.

Boney, who has a stock farm about ten miles south of Merkel, said Tuesday morning, "You can really see the difference in the wheat, already." Boney said there was from 2 1/2 to 3 inches of rain in his area.

"It was real nice," were Ray Wilson's comments about the rain. "You can already see the difference in grazing and it looks like a new world." Wilson said there was approximately 3 inches of rain in the Canyon.

W. S. J. Brown reported two and one half inches of rain on his place northwest of Merkel. "Things are looking a lot better," he said. "As far as wheat is concerned the crop is scarce, but we'll have a little grazing. Let's hope we get some more."

Another farm located in Mulberry Canyon and belonging to David Gamble, received 3 inches of rain, and Gamble's remarks were, "Fine. Afraid to say anything more . . . afraid it will go away."

Truett Thompson's place at Stith received 3 inches of rain and Truett's remarks, "It sure was nice."

This rain was a "soaker, and farmers and ranchers in the area are looking for another good, steady rain that will fill tanks.

TEC MEMBERS HEAR REA SERVICES DISCUSSED AT ANNUAL MEETING

Members and guests attending the 30th Annual meeting of Taylor Electric Cooperative last Thursday met the Cooperative's new manager, Don Hart, and heard David Hamil of Washington, D.C. tell of the "need for Rural Electrification increase."

Hamil, the administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration told the audience of about 1,600 people, that "the need and usage of REA services will increase because people remaining in agriculture will be using more automation that requires more electricity."

"Rural homes today, he said, "are as modern as those in the city and use electricity in their operations and every - day living."

He cited business moving to rural areas and to small towns that are served by REA as a major reason for the need of REA increase.

"Texas electric cooperatives have done much to encourage people to build here," Hamil said, "and is attracting industrial development in the area."

Through community and Cooperative cooperation, Hamil pointed out that both operations benefit in "making the area a good place to live."

Hart, who is a native of Eastland County, assumed full duties as general manager of the Merkel cooperative March 16. He came to Merkel from the Erath County Electric Cooperative in Stephenville. He has also worked with the Coleman Electric Cooperative and was employed by the Texas Electric Service Co. at Eastland and Wichita Falls.

Hamil pointed out that Texas' rural electrification program leads all other states in number of REA borrowers, miles of electric line, and rural consumers served. The Taylor Electric Cooperative has

2,900 miles of line and 6,200 consumer - members in seven counties.

During the business session, Ray Orsborn of Merkel, Tommy Johnson of Oplin and R. C. (Sonny) Watts of Hylton, were reelected as members of the board of directors of the cooperative.

Contestants to the above positions were Leo Crane of Dudley, Sterling Odom of Cross Plains and Jimmy Guthrie of Nolan.

Following the general meeting, directors reelected O. S. Moore of Nolan as president, R. C. Watts as vice president; and Jack Morrow of Hawley as secretary-treasurer.

Also during the business meeting members gave authorization for changes in the charter to enable the cooperative to borrow money from the National Rural Utilities Finance Corporation if necessary.



LBJ Library Grant Approved


