
Dr. Vincent was a reseach scientist with the Texas Nuclear Corporation in 1959-60 where he conducted research with high enery



Sour Cream Sauce\* Combine rice, milk, water and 1 teaspoon salt in medium saucepan. Bring to boil and stir with fork. Cover and cook over low heat 20 minutes, or until rice is tender. 





As the weight of his body came down on the insteps, the single nail was pressed hard against the top of the wound . . . then, unable to bear the pain below, which cramped legs, thighs, and wrung moans from the strongest, he let his body sag lower and lower, and his knees projected a little at a time until with a deep sigh, he felt himself to be hanging by the wrists and hands. And this process must have been repeated again and again.

We should try to realize the utter degradation as well as the anguish of such a death. No modern form of punishment carries with it the abhorred disgrace or dishonor with which crucifixion was regarded. And this sacrifice to God for your sins is the only sacrifice for your sins, if you reject it there remains only one thing . . . Hebrews 10:26-31.


