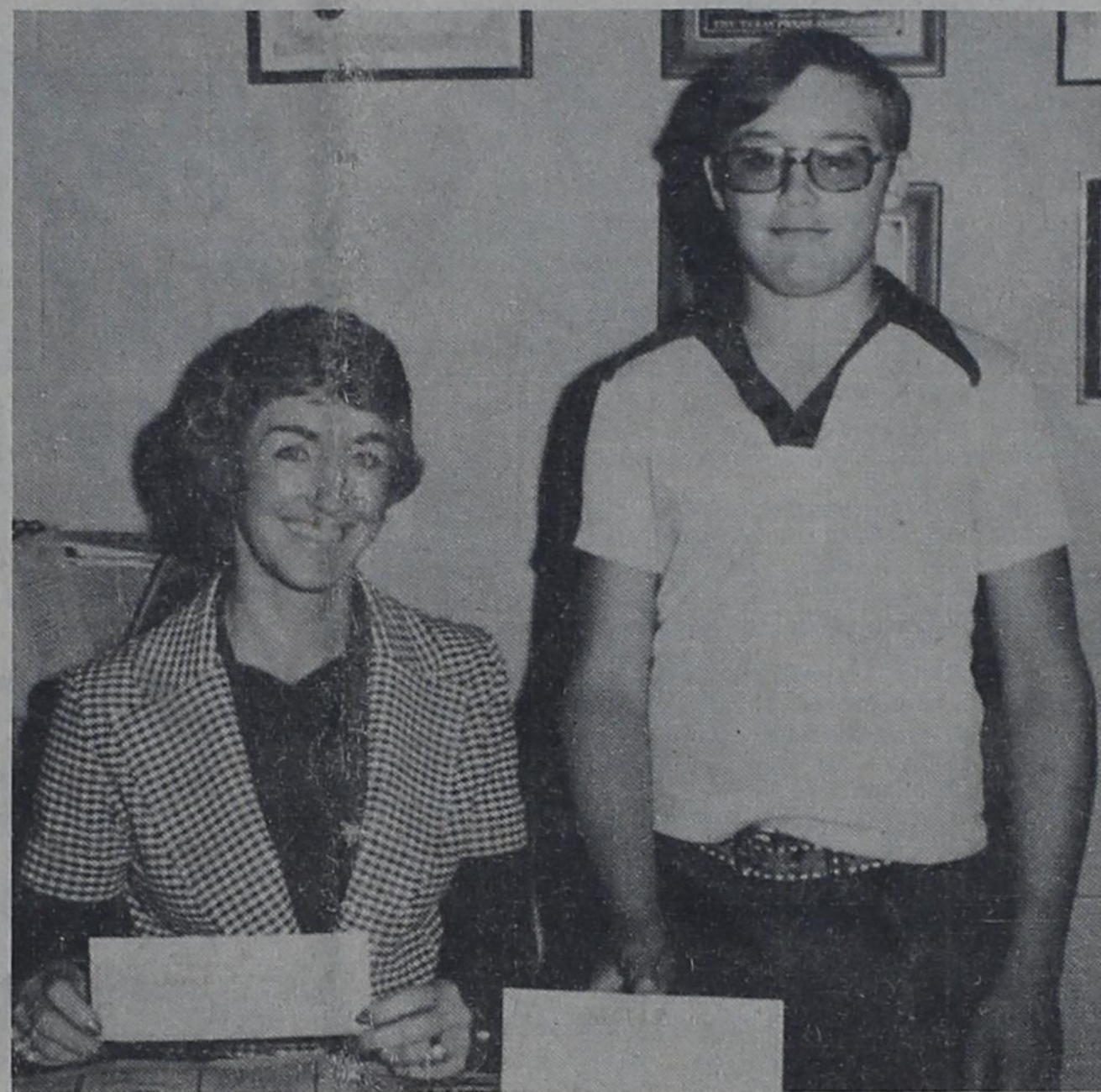

Bovina Favors Demo Slate

Parmer County voters joined with those across Texas in favoring Democratic candidates in Tuesday's general election.

In what was considered an average turnout for a non-presidential election a total of 2074 voters went to the polls in Parmer's eight voting precincts. The turnout was slightly above average in Bovina where 439 votes were cast, some 62 percent of the registered voters in this precinct.

Incumbent Democratic Governor Dolph Briscoe received a total of 1217 Parmer County votes to lead over his Republican opponent, Dr. James Granberry of Lubbock, who had a total of 783.

In the other race of prime interest in Bovina, Incumbent County Commissioner Charlie Jefferson was re-elected with 232 votes over Richard Carson, who had waged a strong write-in campaign, and received 182 votes in the Bovina and

Rhea boxes. Receiving 65 write-in votes was Robert Calaway. Two other write-in votes were cast.

In other contested races, Republican Jimmy Briggs was named County Commissioner in Precinct No. 4. Briggs received 134 votes to 103 for Democrat Roy Miller.

At the state level, in the lieutenant governor's race, Democrat Bill Hobby received 1353 votes to 604 for Republican Gaylord Marshall and two for Dan Fein of the Socialist Workers Party; Democrat John Hill received 1490 in the attorney general's race to 445 for Republican Tom Cole and four for Socialist Worker Pedro Vasquez; Democrat Bob Bullock received 1493 votes for comptroller of public accounts to 420 for Republican Nick Rowe; Democrat Incumbent Jesse James received 1296 votes for state treasurer to 678 for Republican Robert G. Holt;

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 4, 1959

A grain truck driver miraculously escaped serious injury last Tuesday night when his vehicle ran off a rural road and overturned in a milo field. The driver, Floyd Avent of Clovis, was pinned inside the truck from about 7 p.m. until 7 a.m. Wednesday.

What would have been the "burglary of the year" if the culprit had gotten away with it was pulled in Farwell Wednesday night. A daring (and drunk) Latin American from Amarillo bashed a restroom window in the county courthouse, crawled through and helped himself to a looting of every official's office on the first floor. Included in his take was liquor, money and guns from the sheriff's office.

An injury-riddled squad of Bovina Mustangs rose up in defiance and played one of their best games of the season Friday night, but two costly errors cost them two touchdowns and an 18-6 defeat at the hands of the Lazbuddie Longhorns.

Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Killough returned home last Saturday from a two weeks inspection tour of Texas highways. They also toured Texas Highway Department's main offices in Austin and looked at new warehouses in San Angelo and Odessa. Bovina is scheduled to have a new one in the near future.

Killough was named winner of District Five maintenance contest in a foremen's meeting at Lubbock July 31. The tour was a part of the award.

The best maize crop in history was about 75 per cent harvested last week when rainy weather halted field work. Elevator operators throughout the Parmer County area estimated the record-breaking crop to be from 70 to 90 per cent harvested. High Plains farmers are experiencing the greatest yields they have ever had. Reports on irrigated yields range from 3500 pounds an acre to 9500.

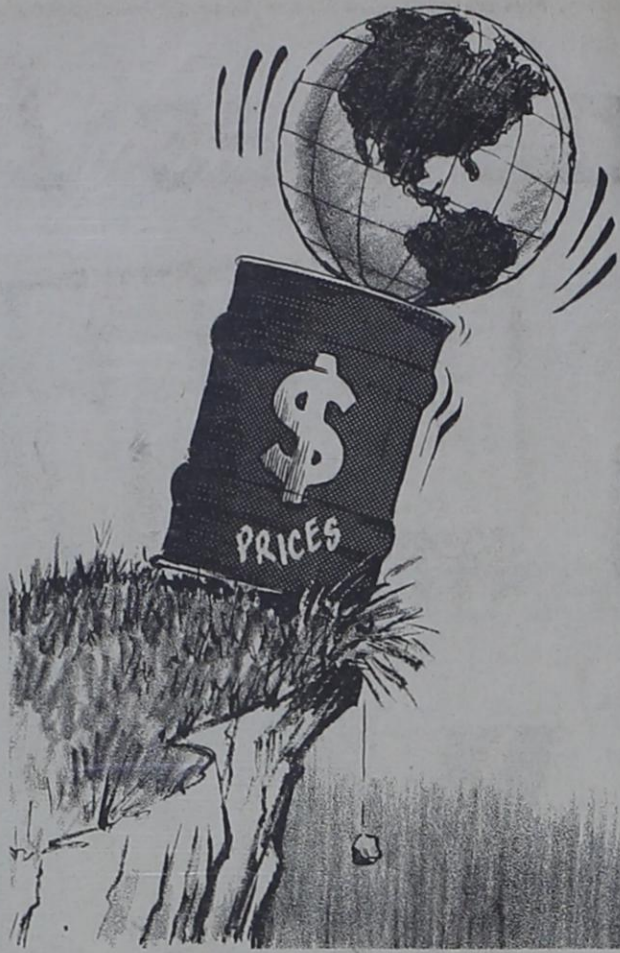

Approximately 400 people attended the annual turkey dinner at St. Ann's Parish Hall Sunday.

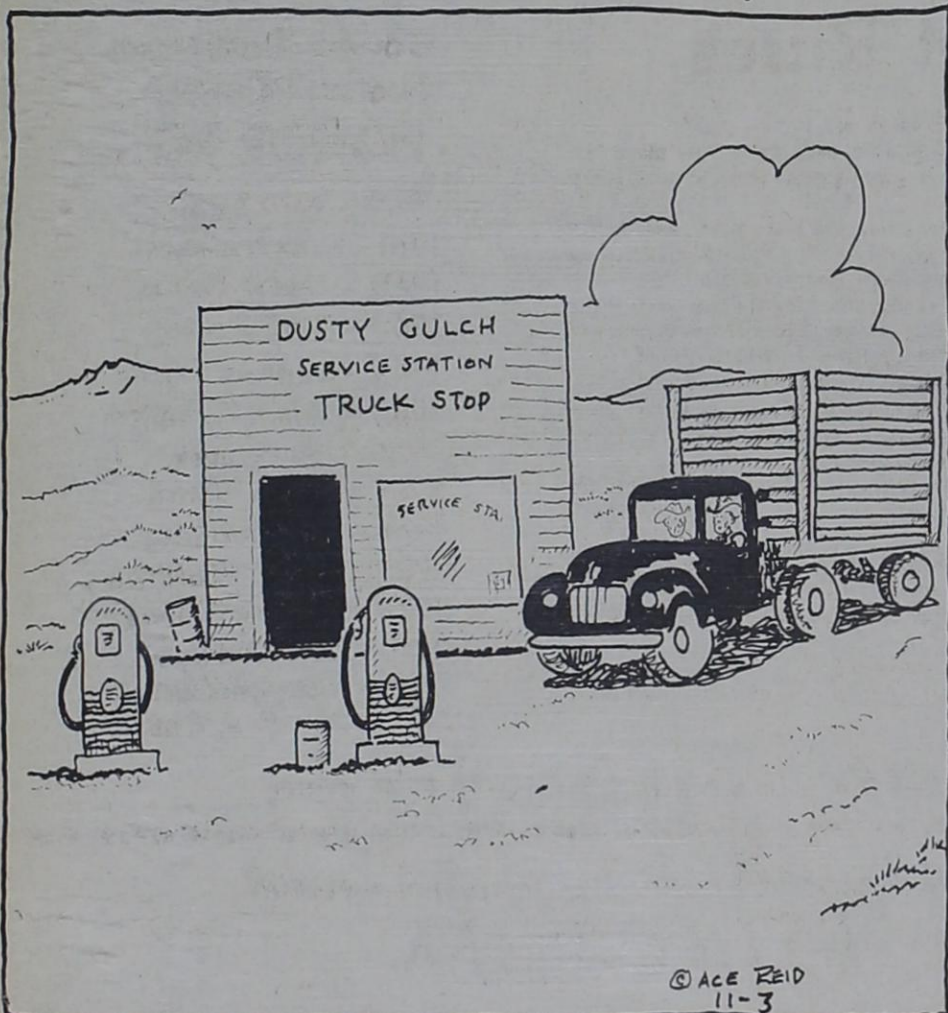
Booster Club will give away a trip for two to the Cotton Bowl game in Dallas during halftime at the Bovina-Farwell football game Friday night.

The national sponsors--the Scripps-Howard Newspapers--establish the rules for the annual Bee competition. Any student who will not have reached his (or her) 16th birthday or gone beyond the eighth grade at the end of the current school term, will be eligible to compete.

The Amarillo Globe-News-WTSU Regional Bee is unique in that it also offers a chance for the elementary grade students to compete. Boys and girls in the sixth grades and lower may spell in the junior division and each county will select a champ in this division. The elementary county winners do not compete in the regional elimination contest in Amarillo unless he should hold both junior and senior championships.

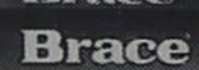

Also, Commissioner of general land office, Democrat Incumbent Bob Armstrong, received 1534 votes to 381 for Republican Mary Lou Grier; Democrat Incumbent John C. White received 1396 votes for commissioner of agriculture to 571 for Zack Fisher, Republican; Democrat Jim C. Langdon received 1445 votes for railroad commissioner to 447 for Republican Joe P. Cain; and Democrat Mack Wallace received 1456 votes for railroad commissioner, unexpired term, to 421 for Republican Dale W. Steffes.

A number of other candidates on the ballot were uncontested in their bids for office, including U.S. Representative George Mahon, State Representative Bill Clayton, District Judge Pat Boone Jr., District Clerk Dorothy Quikel, County Judge Paul Fortenberry, County Clerk Bonnie Warren, County Treasurer Benna Felts, Justice of the Peace Precinct No. 1 Ray Mears, Justice of the Peace Precinct No. 2 Frances Euler and Justice of the Peace Precinct No. 3 Wilbur Charles.

A small number of write-in votes were cast for Archie Tarter, outgoing county judge, however, Fortenberry had no trouble in obtaining a majority of the vote. In the commissioner's race in Precinct No. 2, Jefferson received 199 votes in Bovina and 29 in Rhea with four absentee votes for a total of 232. Carson received 178 votes in Bovina, 21 in Rhea and four absentee for a total of 182. Calaway received 63 votes in Bovina and two in Rhea for a total of 65.

Bovina was the only box out of the three largest in the county to record over a 50 per cent turnout, which was attributed to the write-in campaign in the commissioner's race. In Black, some 54 votes were cast, about 70 per cent of the registered voters; in Friona, 780 ballots were counted, about 50 per cent; in Bovina, 439 for about 62 per cent; in Farwell, 337 for about 50 per cent; in Lazbuddie, 236 for 70 per cent; in Oklahoma Lane, 90 for about 40 per cent; in Rhea, 57 votes; in Lakeview, 44 for 78 per cent.

The 70 per cent turnout in Lazbuddie was also attributed to the contested race for county commissioner in that precinct.

An injury-riddled Bovina Mustang squad battled on even terms for three quarters with the Kress Kangaroos Friday night at Kress with the third quarter spelling disaster for the 'Hosses of Roger Ezell.

The Mustangs drew first and last blood in the contest, however the 'Roos scored two TDs two and one-half minutes apart in the third stanza to ice down the 27-14 win in District 3-A action. lowing a loss of one yard, Street connected on a pass to End Johnny Rich for 35 yards and then picked up 25 yards himself for a first and goal at the one yard line of the Ponies. Fullback Lance McClendon punched the ball over from that point and Halfback Stan Weatherred tacked on the extra point to give Kress a 7-6 lead with 1:03 remaining to be played in the half.

The Kangaroos' put seven more points on the board with 5:17 left in the third quarter on a 55-yard drive. McClendon scored once again on a trap play from the 13 with Weatherred's kick good for a 14-6 edge.

Less than two and a half minutes later, Halfback Max Jones burst through the middle of the Mustang line for a 42-yard scoring jaunt. The extra point attempt failed and Kress owned a 20-6 lead with 2:56 left in the third stanza.

The Kangaroos got on the scoreboard once again just seconds into the final stanza when Street intercepted a wayward aerial meant for End Ellie Hernandez.

With the aid of two long gainers and a 15-yard penalty on the Ponies, it took Kress only five plays to score with Halfback Martin Alcozer scampering 13 yards for the counter. Weatherred's kick was good and the score stood at 27-6 with 11:14 remaining in the game.

Fullback Gerald Shelby, a freshman starting for injured Ray Martinez, took the opening kickoff on the 10 and ran it back to the 30

where Bovina put the ball into play.

With Halfback Clint Cox picking up most of the yardage in the drive, the Mustangs scored with 5:57 left on the clock when Cox dived through the right side of the line from the two for the TD. Cox also tacked on the two-point extras with a dash around right end which ended the scoring for the evening.

Bovina missed a chance to make the scoreboard look a little better on the final series of the evening.

Halfback Tommy DeLeon fielded a Kress punt on his own 40 and eluded Kangaroo tacklers until he was run out of bounds on the Kress 20. A 10-yard scoring pass from Willard to End Ken Sorley was nullified by an offside penalty and the clock ran out for the Mustangs and their sparse following of fans.

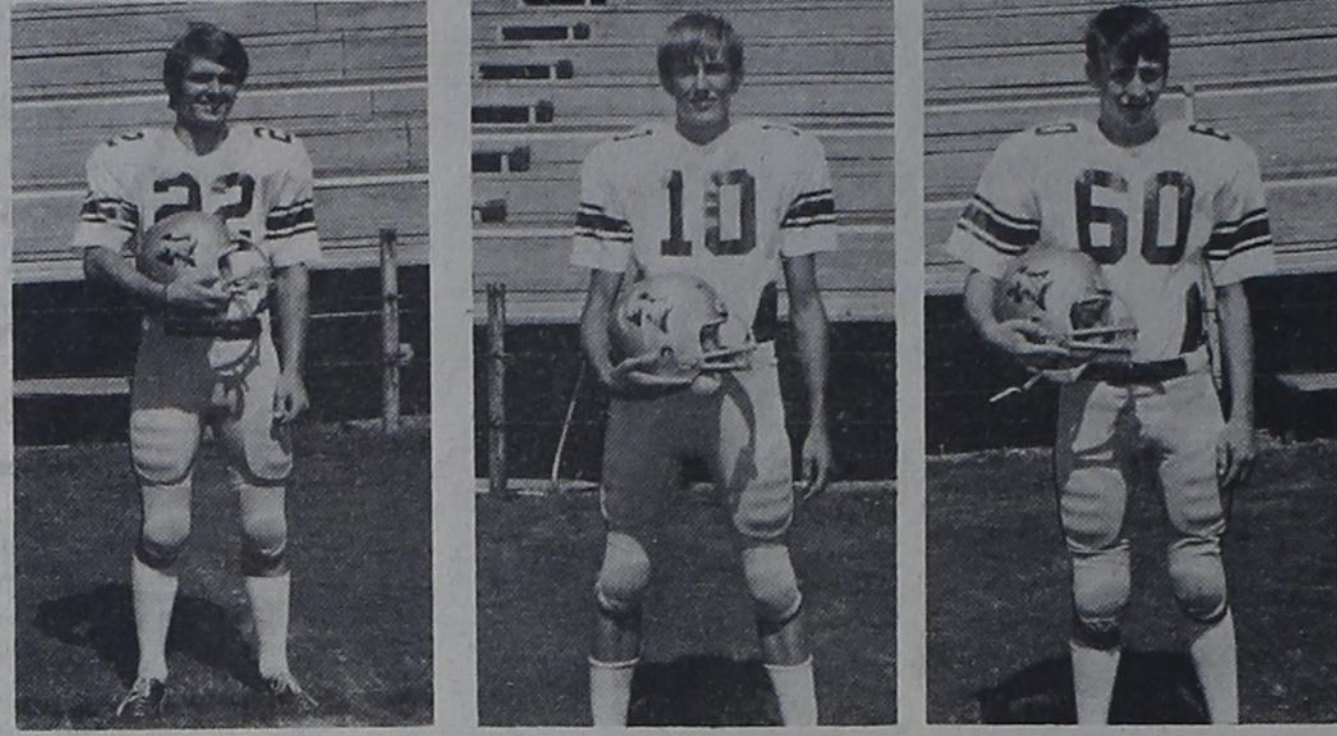

Mustangs Seek To Spoil Longhorn's Title March

Bovina's Mustangs, eliminated from the District 3-A title by last week's loss to the Kress Kangaroos, will attempt to play the role of spoilers this week when they host the Vega Longhorns who are currently tied with Hart and Springlake-Earth for the lead.

Game time is at 7:30 p.m. at Mustang Field.

"Vega is a good team—not as strong overall as last year—but good," said Head Coach Roger Ezell this week. "They are big, have good speed and don't throw much; they just overpower people."

The 'Horns run from three offensive sets, the power I, wishbone and Houston veer. Larry Richardson (140 lb. junior) is a capable quarterback, small but very quick, according to the scouting reports.

Ezell commented that a three-way tie for the district title is likely at this point with a coin flip probably determining which team will advance to the playoffs.

The Longhorns went all the way to the state finals last year, finishing with a 14-1 record, the best in the school's history and farther down the playoff trail than ever before.

Vega returns 11 lettermen from that team, headed by all-state prospect Gerald Berry (235 lb. junior tackle), who had college coaches looking last year when he was only a sophomore.

Berry was a key to the 'Horns rushing success in '73, displaying unusual quickness for his size. "He will be hard to handle this fall," according to a pre-season football publication.

Fullback-linebacker Jim Davis (175 lb. senior) is touted as a quality football player with invaluable experience. He runs with reckless abandon and enjoys running over people. "Hitting is his specialty."

With those two standouts are Coach Jimmy Duncan's only two offensive starters back-junior Quarterback Larry Richardson (5-8, 145 lb.), who was the starting safety last year and Fullback Leo Ramos (175 lb. senior). Returning on defense are Ramos, Richardson, Berry, Davis, Gary Rea (145 lb. senior) and Mark Harwell (195 lb. senior).

Testifying to the size of the Longhorns' line is the average weight of the starters—195 pounds. Ardell Meador, starting center, weighs in at 180; Guards Monty Pratt and Brant Lookingbill weigh in at 165 and 180, respectively; Tackles Berry and Stan Gossett

tip the scales at 235 and 230; and Ends Harwell and Mike Yell weigh 195 and 175.

Vega comes into Friday night's game with Bovina in possession of a 5-2-1 record in overall play and a 2-1 record in district.

Vega tied Groom, 6-6, the first week of the season, lost, 15-21, to Sunray the second week, downed Claude, 22-0, the third week, defeated Boys Ranch, 21-6, the fourth week, trounced Panhandle, 44-15, the fifth week, lost to Springlake-Earth, 6-9, the seventh week, surprised Hart, 34-8, the eighth week, and clobbered Farwell, 36-7, the ninth week. The 'Horns forfeited the game with Boys Ranch when they were found to have played an ineligible player that week.

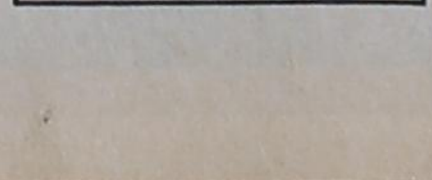
