LEARN TO SWIM BEGINS JUNE 26

The annual Red Cross Learn to Swim program is scheduled to begin at two locations June 26 and July 2, according to executive director, Taylor County Chapter American Red Cross, Miss Ollie Lena Olsen.

The first program will be taught at Abilene State Park Pool and will be held from Saturday, June 26 through Friday, July 2.

The second program will begin at Stevenson Park Pool in Abilene July 5 and will run in one-week sessions for five weeks through Aug. 7.

Merkel and area children may

enroll in either of the two programs, said Miss Olsen.

Registration blanks may be picked up at the Merkel Mail office and at Starbucks in Merkel. First State Bank in Tuscola will also have registration blanks for the June 26 program.

Places in Abilene for getting registration forms for the five week learn to swim program are the Red Cross Chapter House and the Abilene Reporter - News.

The Learn to Swim program will include students from ages 6 through 18 years. Children must have a doctor's signature and

also parents' signature, said Miss Olsen.

Deadline for registering for the June 26 program at Abilene State Park is June 24 and applications are to be turned in to First State Bank at Tuscola.

Instructor for the first program are Mrs. Beth Mclesky, Bruce Kilmer, Patricia Ewing, George Adams, Earl Bonine, Jim Bruce, and Buzzy Andress. . . all volunteer instructors from Red Cross.

Hours for the programs are 8:30 until 1:30 a.m., Abilene State Park and 9 a.m. until 12 p.m., Stevenson Park.

Pageant theme is "Good Ole Summer Time."



MERKELITES LEAVE ON 'THE GRAND TOUR'

"Bon voyage" was the wish extended to CATHY CARSON, MARK DUDLEY and MIKE DUDLEY as they left for a tour of Europe on June 11. These three, along with CINDY McWHORTER of Wylie, are part of the group who are traveling with MRS. DON DUDLEY as the guide and chaperone.

There will be 250 persons from across Texas traveling under the auspice of the Student Travel Abroad Company of Dallas on this charter flight.

During the 21-day tour the group will visit six different European countries.

The group left Love Field, Dallas, Friday evening (June 11) for the non-stop flight to London, England. During their three day stay in London, the young people will tour the city, seeing Trafalgar Square, Nelson Column, St. James Palace, Buckingham Palace, with the Changing of the Guard, Houses of Parliament, Westminster Abbey, Whitehall, Downing Street, St. Paul's Cathedral, and the Tower of London, as well as attending the theater several times. Then there's the shopping trips and a boat cruise down the Thames River.

From London the group will travel to Paris by way of rail

and hovercraft across the English Channel. They will arrive in Paris on the morning of June 16 and immediately tour Modern Paris, which includes the Opera, Madeleine Church to Concorde Square. They will continue along the Champs - Elysees to Les Invalides where a visit is made to Napoleon's Tomb. Stop at the Eiffel Tower will be made and then they will proceed around the Arch of Triumph, to the Sacred Heart of Montmartre.

On June 17 the group will tour Versailles.

Other tour schedules include Nice, Milan and Florence, Italy, June 19, 20, 21, 22. On June 23, the group will arrive in Rome, with a sightseeing tour to include the U.S. Embassy, the popular Trevi Fountain, the Pantheon, Fountain of the Four Rivers, the Arch of Triumph of Emperor Septimus Severus, the Basilica of St. Paul outside the Walls, and the Church of St. Peter in Chains.





BARNES ANNOUNCES FOR GOVERNORSHIP

Barnes, at 33, has more than 10 years of experience in public office in Texas. He first won election to the Texas House from De

Leon in 1960. He was elected Speaker of the House in January, 1965, and was re-elected to that post in 1967, thus becoming the youngest Speaker in Texas history to serve two consecutive terms.

In his first bid for statewide office, Barnes was elected Lieutenant Governor in November of 1968, and become the first candidate in the history of Texas to poll more than two million votes. He was re-elected to a second term in November of 1970.

RELAXATION TIME

Soil Conservation Service
With the adoption of daylight savings time more people have more time for more recreation. Some type or recreation is a necessity for most people. We get tired of the day to day pressures and demands of our jobs. Often it becomes necessary for us to take a few moments or maybe a few days off to get away from it all and be refreshed.

With this thought in mind, many landowners in Taylor County are including in their farm or ranch conservation plan a place for this much needed rest and relaxation. Some are enlarging their old farm ponds or considering new ones and stocking them with fish for this purpose, or maybe planting trees and preparing a picnic or camping area. Others are planning for a more suitable environment for wildlife to improve hunting. By leaving strips of timber for deer runs and by leaving downed timber for quail cover they can use their rangeland for both livestock production and provide a better habitat for wildlife. Brush control, range seeding, access roads, or better range management may be needed. Hunting and fishing can both be greatly improved when proper planning and management practices are followed.

The Soil Conservation Service working with the Middle Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District have assisted many landowners in including a place for recreation in their farm or ranch conservation plan. The personnel of the SCS are qualified to give old conservation plan, or maybe this assistance.

Why not take a new look at that you own a piece of property that you haven't developed a plan on yet. Consider including a place for recreation in those plans. The personnel of the local Soil Con-

Environmental questions about melting of highway ice and snow with salt were posed by a reader. Here is what my digging through studies and reports turned up.

No river or major stream even approaches the 250 parts per million (ppm) of chlorides set by the Public Health Service as the upper limit for drinking water. (One ppm is like an inch in 16 miles.)

The relationship between the small area devoted to highways and the thousands of square miles of watershed is such that the average of runoff in the snowbelt is less than one ppm. Salt in fresh water bodies does not use up oxygen, does not affect the surface and, in modest amounts, even perks up fish.

Salt is and must be, nature decrees, in us, our air, land and water. Domestic animals, furry wild friends and most fish can tolerate at least 1500 ppm, and man at least 3700 ppm (the level in blood).

Along even expressways with heavy runoffs we seldom see brown sections. Most grasses can tolerate at least 1200 ppm. Most trees can withstand at least 2000 ppm, many 5000 ppm. (But the sugar maple is a notable exception.)

With 80% of workers commuting by auto and 40% of public school students by bus, not to mention shopping and municipal services, safe winter roads are a must in our society. For an informative pamphlet send this article and the name of your newspaper to me marked "Ice Control Salt."

FATHERHOOD FACTS AND FANCIES

Fishing gear or a portable chain saw may seem appropriate gifts for Dad — but an African Dinka tribesman would strongly disagree.

He anxiously awaits the moment when he can receive the one "perfect" present from his son: the skin of the first lion the young man kills!

It's not just what children give their sires, but what fathers pass on to their children, that varies in fascinating ways around the globe.

Tchambuli boys of New Guinea learn that doing tribal dances and carving ritual masks is man's work — and that it's mama's job to grow the crops and catch the fish that feed the family!

Does Dad spoil the child by sparing the rod? The Arapesh, neighbors of the Tchambuli, would recoil in horror at the thought of striking their offspring. To them, a child's tears are a tragedy — and one of Dad's biggest jobs is to see that his children never cry. He delights in feeding the children by hand, slipping them the best morsels. Parental "don'ts" are few. Yet the Arapesh youngsters emerge not as little monsters — but as junior editions of their mild parents.

In contrast, Ossete tribesmen of the Russian Caucasus are so stern that they never play with their babies! Public opinion brands as "sissified" the man who fondles his children. But tribal custom does permit Dad to take his youngster by the hand when walking — once the child has reached the ripe age of four!

Strict Puritan parents sometimes insisted on being addressed by their offspring as "honored sir," instead of merely "father" — but for a different reason. The South Pacific son believes that spirits are the true fathers of mankind. Instead he addresses Dad by a title that means simply "my mother's husband!"

In parts of the Near and Far East, father has almost complete authority over his chil-



dren, but must still defer to grandfather. Several generations may live under one roof, and the old patriarch dominates them all. But among some South Sea island tribes, the uncle is the head of the household.

This arrangement comes about because of an odd social structure which requires that people choose their mates from outside their native village, but continue to live in their own village after marriage. Dad lives in one hamlet, Mama and the kids in another. A man has authority not over his own children, but over his sister's offspring!

To more than 50 million American families, however, it's father who will be the big man on the third Sunday of June. Father's Day was the brainchild of a grateful daughter, Mrs. John Dodd, who wished to honor her father, William Smart, for his devotion and kindness in rearing six motherless children. Thanks to her efforts, the holiday was first celebrated in 1910 in Spokane, Washington.

From its modest beginnings, Father's Day has become such an important occasion to American families that they are expected to spend more than one billion dollars this year on gifts for Dad, who will smile

and feel twice-blessed whether his gift is a home-made greeting card smeared with the grimy fingerprints of a loving son or daughter or a great new 'Homelite 150' heavy-duty portable chain saw with light magnesium body, built-in noise muffler and automatic bar-and-chain lubrication bought for him by the entire family!

In old China, where great age implied great prestige, a son could think of no better way to show respect for an elderly parent than by making him a birthday present of a silken robe embroidered with the Chinese characters for "long life." The robe was considered most effective if sewn by a young person likely to live a long time!

There is one exotic custom, pertaining more to new fathers rather than old ones, that American men might like to adopt. In many African and South American tribes, it's feared that a father might endanger the health of his newborn child by engaging in hunting, fishing and other workday pursuits.

Therefore, although Mama returns to her usual tasks about as soon as the baby is born, Dad takes to his bed for days or even weeks — and does absolutely nothing!

1 What is the "church?" The English word "church" comes from the New Testament Greek word "EK-KLESIA" which means "called out body." The church is "saved people added to the church by the Lord" (Acts 2) called to serve God through Jesus Christ — 2 Corinthians 6:17, 18.

It then makes a difference whether or not you belong because the saved make up the church and if you don't belong its because you are not in a saved relationship with God as the saved are added to the church — Acts 2:47.

2 The "church" (called out body of saved people) BELONG to Jesus Christ — I Corinthians 3:23. The "church" has been bought (sins paid for by Christ's death) with the blood of Jesus — I Corinthians 6:19, 20; I Peter 1:18, 19.

It again therefore makes a difference if you are in the church because the redeemed make up the church. The redeemed will be in heaven in eternity — Revelation 14:1-3, because the church are the saved belonging to Christ. Because the church belongs to Christ it is referred to as the "body of Christ" — Ephesians 1:22, 23 — of which Christ is the head — Colossians 1:18. Therefore one head on several bodies is not taught in the New Testament but Ephesians 4:4 says "one body" as Christ would look rather odd with one head and several bodies. Why "ONE" body? Because all the save belong to Christ therefore he adds them to his body.
