TRAVELING WITH YOUR FAMILY DOG!

Most dogs love to travel. Yours may be no exception. Vacationing by car makes it easy to include him in your plans —if you follow a few simple rules:

Be sure your pet is healthy and properly inoculated. See that his rabies, identification, and license tags are firmly attached to his collar. Take along all his immunization records.

Condition your dog for auto travel and his first vacation trip with several short jaunts. Have someone along specifically to comfort him if the motion of the car unnerves him. If nervousness or car sickness persist, consult your veterinarian for a remedy. Remember, too, whenever you leave your pet alone in the car, be sure he has a shady spot to sit in and plenty of fresh air.

Pack a small suitcase or canvas bag with the dog's gear: food dish, water bowl (both unbreakable), can opener, spoon, walking leash, clothes-line exercise leash, collar, comb and brush for grooming, muzzle, and some old towels for drying the dog or wiping his paws. Include several of his favortoys and a good supply of dogfood. Insist on discipline while travel-

ing. Don't allow your dog to hang his head out the car window, bark at passing traffic, cavort with the children, or interfere with the driver. Train him to sit or lie on the rear seat - or, in a station wagon, the back deck. Pad his spot with an old blanket or rug.

Frequently stop the car off the highway in a safe, secluded place. Snap the exercise leash on your pet before opening the car door (surprising how this prevents runaway dogs). Briskly exercise him, then pour him a drink of cool water from an insulated jug you carry just for this purpose.

Although a dog can be watered several times en route, forego feeding until you stop for the day. Most motel

operators accept pets, but you need to know for sure - in advance - where your dog is welcome. Local service station dealers can

TOPIC: TAX RELIEF ON DROUTH SALES


Unfortunately the drouth has forced many livestock owners to sell a part or all of their herd. The Internal Revenue Service provides a modified form of tax relief on the sale of livestock due to a drouth. You are not required to pay taxes on any profit that you make on the sale of your herd (provided your sales for the year are in excess of normal sales) if you reinvest within two years with the same type of herd. An extension of this period beyond two years may be granted by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue

Service in exceptional cases, Publicaton 225, the Farmers Tax Guide, spells out all the requirements on drouth sales of livestock on pages 36 through 40, Local county agents and Internal Revenue Service officers have free copies of the Farmers Tax Guide available for you. IRS advises farmers considering a drouth sale to obtain a Farmers Tax Guide and carefully check the rules in
