Individual reserve seat tickets may be purchased for \$1.75 each. Regular seats are \$1.50 and students fifty cents.

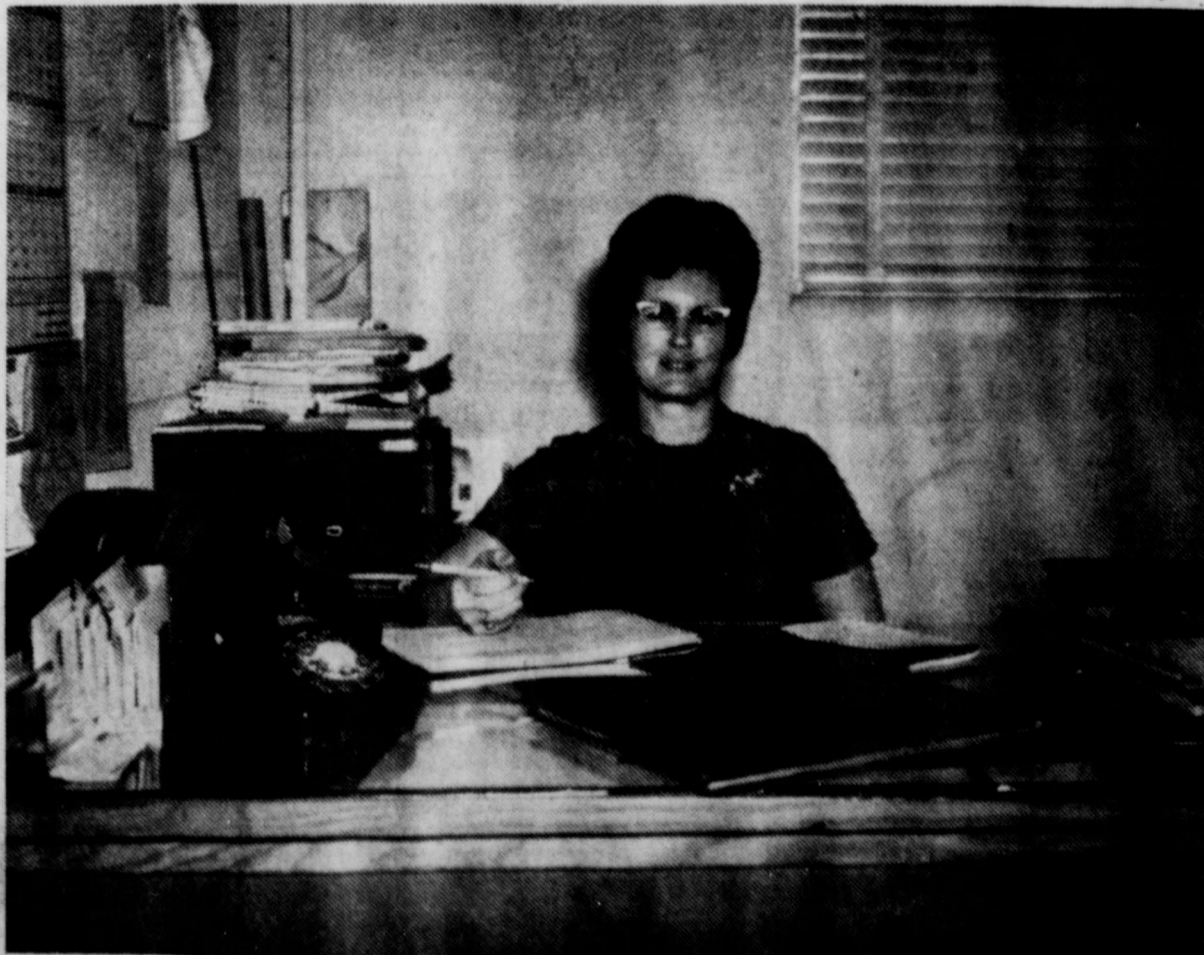
Revival Services

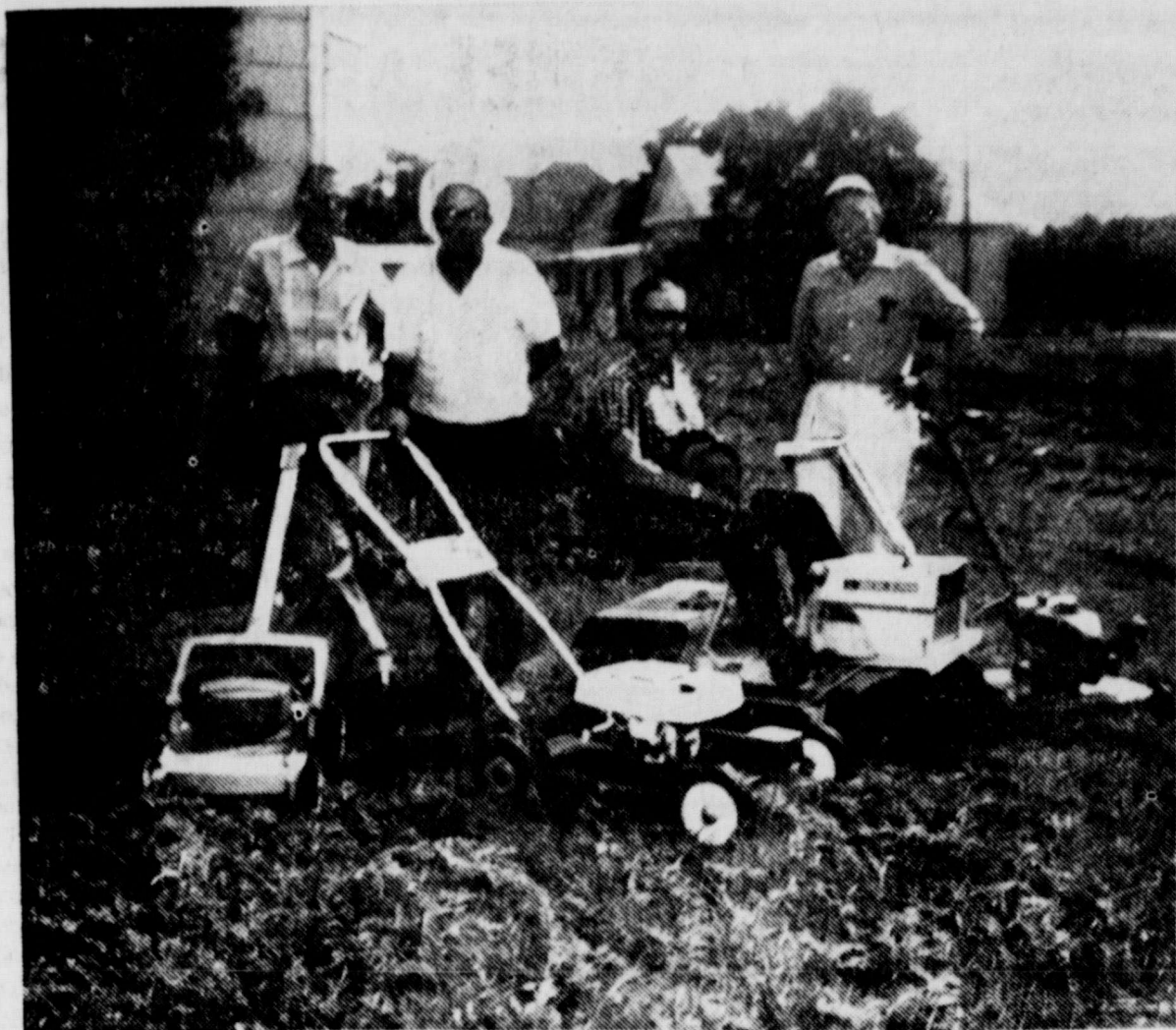

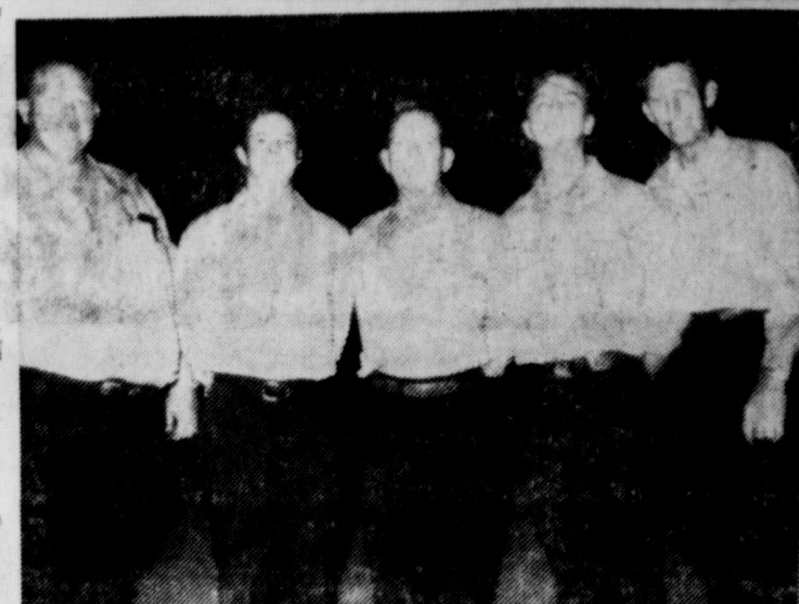

**How the Bible Is Received
In the Minds of People**

The Word of God is received in the minds of people in different ways:

1 It may be MISUNDERSTOOD (understand incorrectly, miscomprehend, misinterpret) II Peter 3:16 "As also in all his (Paul's) epistles, speaking in them of these things; in which are some things hard to be understood, which they that are unlearned and unstable wrest (to twist, turn around or reverse), as they also the other scriptures, unto their own destruction." A misunderstanding may be from:

a Not wanting the truth (read II Thessalonians 2:10, 11, 12), "they do not love the truth and love unrighteousness."

b Or because they are "unlearned and unstable."

2 It may be that one does NOT UNDERSTAND at all. Acts 8:30, 31 the question was ask, "Understand what you read," the eunuch replied, "How can I except some man guide me?" Two things show the sincerity of the man:

a He realized he needed help "how can except . . ."

b When he did understand he was willing and ready to do the Will of God, 8:35-40.

3 The Bible may be UNDERSTOOD. Isaiah 35:8 says that even though a man is a "fool" he can understand what he needs to know. God would not make the sacrifice of Christ's death then make salvation so difficult that man could not understand it if the person really loved and desired to know. In John 7:17 Jesus taught a principle along this line, "If a person wills (makes it his purpose) to do God's will he will know the correct doctrine. Here again there are two responses:

a Acts 19:24-27 Here a man who did not have a full understanding but when taught "the way of God more perfectly," he did the will of God.

b Acts 24:24-26 This man Felix was taught and understood, it made him "tremble," but he put off obedience to the will of God.
