

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

A safety lighting project for

Merkel was recently included in the approved expenditure of \$1,-500,000 for highway safety and betterment and improvement of state highways and farm to market roads in District 8 during 1972.

Roberts said that a total of 159,3 miles will be involved in the annual program, of which the east and west Loop Interchang. es and FM 126 interchanges will be included in the lighting proggram. This includes all exit and entrance ramps and where the roads run under Interstate 20 at those designations.

Kindergartens To Get Funds

AUSTIN - New public school kindergartens may receive \$400 in state funds to help pay for teaching materials during their first year under a plan approved Sept. 11 by the State Board of

Texas school districts are expceted to set up approximately 600 new kindergarten classrooms during the 1971-72 school year, bringing the total number of state-sup-

ported programs for five - yearolds to 1,141.

The number of new kindergarten classrooms is expected to reach a total of 9,000 during the 1977 - 78 school year. Largest increase, according to Texas Education Agency estimates, will come in 1973 - 74 when 3,000 new classrooms are added to the statesupported program,

Berliners Read a Lot, Print a Lot



Berliners like to keep up with the news, and with its interpretation from different viewpoints. That's why West Berlin, with a population of just over 2 million, supports no less than nine major dailies selling from 25,000 to 350,000 copies, for a combined weekday circulation of 1.2 million. And this is not a new development: even back in 1914 Berlin had 40 dailies (and 50 suburban papers) that by 1928 had increased to an amazing 147 newssheets

Berliners are also avid readers of books. The city has 450 bookshops, one for every 4,660 residents. They may also borrow from more than 100 public libraries which stock nearly two million volumes that were taken out over seven million times last year: this topped any other German-speaking city by about three volumes per head of the population per year. Extremely popular is the American Memorial Library, donated by the United States in 1954, that contains some 350,000 volumes and is said to be the most frequently used library in Europe.

With all this reading going on, perhaps it was predictable that, with more than 10,000 highly-skilled workers employed by over 300 firms engaged in the printing industry, Berlin itself is the largest typography center in the Federal Republic for which it engraves most of the country's postage stamps.




