VOTER CERTIFICATES BE RECORD

a total of 19,175 voter cerificates have been issued for the 1972 registration, with "approximately one thousand applications on hand for certificates."

King explained that "these ccr. tificates will not be issued until after the first of the year," due to a re - programming of the Unitab Company's computer.

King urged all Taylor County citizens to "get their applications in by Jan. 31, when he "will run the first alphabetical list of qualified vcters."

The certificates are not valid until March 1, and a voter may register enytime during the year urder new rules, as long as he "es so a month ! "re an election he wants to vole in."

"Getting your applications in early can guarantee your right to vote," said King, "for if a large number of applications flood this office just before the primary on May 6, mary could not be issued in time."

Any U.S. citizen 18 years of age or older can register to vote, provided he satisfies the residence requirements for the election he desires to vete in, Requirements are one year before the election for state elections and six months for county and city elections King also explained that a person who will be 18 years of age



MRS. ROBERSON'S sister came and spent a few days during Christmas and they visited in her son's home with her son, Loyd.


