Medical College, Dr. Magee moved to Abilene in 1902, had a drugstore and extensive practice. His home was noted for its hospitality."

550,000 Students Get SS Help On School Expenses

Some 400,000 young people whose mother or father has died got monthly social security checks in 1971 that helped them attend colleges, high schools, or trade schools, according to R. R. Tuley Jr., social security district manager in Abilene,

The studens, 18 through 21, and unmarried were eligible survivors of parent(s) who were insured under social security

About 100,000 other students got monthly checks in 1971 because one of their parents retired and collected monthly retirement benefits. And, over 50,000 young people are geting students' benefits because they are children of severely disabled workers who got disability insurance proments, Tuley added.

A recent study of student beneficiaries made by the Social Security Administration showed 66 per cent of the students were enrolled in college, 26 per cent were attending high school, and 8 per cent were in technical or vocational schools.






