

**Trash Pickup** Is Scheduled

Merkel residents were advised this week that a scheduled pickup on limbs, brush and trash will be set for once each month, by the City Refuse Department. Robert Leo Harris, city water superintendent said Wednesday that this pickup is "included in the trash hauling and that there is no extra charge."

"We have had serveral calls made to City Hall," said Harris, "and we just want to let people know that there is a schedule for trash pickup."

Harris asked that persons having trash to be picked up to cut limbs into four foot lengths and bundle if possible.

Other trash such as leaves and grass need to be in plastic bags or containers," he said, "All trash to be picked up should be in alleys so that when the truck checks each residence they will be ready for pickup."

## **Religious Prejudice Against Other Churches**

PREJUDICE: A judgment or opinion, favorable or unfavorable, formed BEFOREHAND or WITHOUT DUE EXAMINATION: a mental decision based on **OTHER GROUNDS than REASON or JUSTICE.** 

Why is there prejudice against people of a different religious belief? Just because they are different? Because we disagree over what is believed? Because we don't understand why they believe what they do? Because of something we have heard they supposedly believe? If it is "prejudice," then it is an opinion or judgment formed before and without proper examination. Thus that prejudice may be completely based upon something that does not really exist at

Against WHAT are you prejudiced if you are? Against people? Against a church (that's people)? Against a truth we don't want to accept? Or against a particular religion? WHY?

An amazing thing about Jesus was - "he regardeth not the person of men" (Matthew 22:16) and he made the distinction between loving people (even sinners) without loving sin and the sin they were guilty of. If we are to really be a Christian, we must take upon us the "mind of Christ" (Philippians 2:4, 5), we must be like Jesus. That for one thing means free from prejudice.

If you are aware of prejudice in your own heart it would be advisable, if you plan to be a Christian, to make proper examination of all the facts related to what the person you are prejudiced against really believes and base what you believe upon one thing only: TRUTH! Jesus said, "If you continue in two word, then are you my disciples indeed; and you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.' (John 8:31, 32) and "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth." (John 17:17) and I Peter 1:22 the Bible reads: "Seeing you have puri-fied your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit unto unfeigned love of the brethren, see that ve love one another with a pure heart fervently:".




