



"It shall be unlawful for any person or persons ni the City to keep, or cause, or allow to be kept in any pen, place or premise owned or controlled by him, her, or them, in or upon which hogs or other animals are kept, in such manner as to be unhealthy, offensive, or any annoyance to any person whatever.

"It shall not be unlawful for any person or persons in this City to allow or permit any Horse or other Animal owned, controlled or kept by him, her of them, and which has come to its death by disease, or otherwise to lie or remain in or upon any street alley, squae, lot or other ground public or private; but such person or persons shall cause the carcass of such animal or animals to be wholly burned, or conveyed nad deposited upon the dumping grounds provided by the City for such purposes, and there burned or buried,"

"If persons have complaints concerning this ordinance being disregarded, they may file a complaint at City Hall," said Hargrove. "Upon filing complaint, the persons disregarding such ordinance will be notified."

Hargrove urged persons maintaining horse lots within the ctiy limits to check hteir lots and remember that "consideration of other people can probably correct any problems."




