



Another passage of scripture that is of most importance is Romans 16:17,18 "Now I beseech you brethren, mark them which cause divisions and offences CONTRARY TO THE DOCTRINE which ye have learned (from the Bible not man); and avoid them. For they that are such serve not our Lord Jesus Christ, but their own belly; and by good words and fair speeches deceive the hearts of the simple."

We must today make absolutely certain that we do not "establish our own righteousness" to replace those directions the Lord himself has given because of "being ignorant of God's righteousness."

IT DOES, ACCORDING TO THE BIBLE, MAKE A DIFFERENCE WHAT YOU BELIEVE AND PRACTICE IN RELIGION. The only other conclusion one can draw is that either these passages mean nothing or that they are in error.


