The K-shaped configuration features a centralized nurses station, which optimizes staffing. The proposed facility would include private and semi-private rooms along with a patio overlooking the park. One of the wings would serve as a 20 -bed special care unit.

## Slower economic growth predicted

AUSIIN - The Index of one or the fastest growing states

Leading Texas Economic Indicators continues to forecast slower economic growth for Texas during the next four to six months," Texas ComptrollerCarole Keeton Rylander said March 22.
The latest Index was at 132.9 in January, up just 0.2 percent compared to December, and up by 0.4 percent compared to January 1998.
Five of the 10 leading economic indicators reflect positive state economy, while the remaining five point to a slower-growing economy. Overall, the Texas economy remains strong," Rylander said.

The Texas 100 Stock Index is the strongest component of the January Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators. At 127.1, the January Texas 100 was up 23.1 percent compared to January 1998.
New home construction continues to boom, thanks to unseasonably warm weather, low mortgage interestrates, and strong demand for homes in
in the nation. Construction permits for nearly 13,000 new homes were issued in January, up 22.2 percent compared to January 1998.
Texas retail sales increased by 7.8 percent in January, compared to the same period last year. The increase came despite a fifth consecutive month of declining consumer confidence. Texas consumer confidence fell by 7.5 percent during January 1999, and was down 15.2 percent compared to January 1998.

## Legislation to help local telephone companies

hone service years ago, tele phone service to rural Texas was largely nonexistent. Few rural homes had electric lights, there were no automobiles, and hardly any practical way to keep intouch except for a slow mail system and occasional trips from the country to town.

Telephone service was estabished in small towns when citizens banded together and agreed to set up a workable sys tem, with each user responsible for his or her own telephone line Small networks were established o link farm houses to towns. Then, by 1925, there were 900 elephone companies in Texas erving slightly more than a hai million customers. The Bellcom any served about half the ustomers, and the remaining were shared by small family cooperatives set up by farmers, anchers and other businessmen. Today, there are 61 individual

# millionts serving more than 2 

million telephone lines to house businesses, organizations and governments in Texas. Most of the companies are members of the Texas Telephone Association. Ourservingterritories stretch from the deserts and oases of Wes Texas to the piney woods of Eas Texas, from the high plains to the marshlands of the Gulf Coast. B law, we have to provide telephone service to anyone needing that service. And we take that responsibility very seriously.
It used to be that the small independent companies, such as WestPlains Telecommunications and Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Inc., were for the most part not affected by telecommunications regulations and legislation. But that has changed in the last two decades, and especially in the past few years, as the telecom business has become much more complex

What the industry - the members of the telephnne association - are seeking is legislation that will maintain the economic climate in Texas that generates strong investment trends. The bill that maintains our investment incentive - investment that helps bring the latest in telecommunications technology to the rural areas - is HB 1701 . This bill would best assure that Texas customers - no matter where they live - would realize the full benefits of modern services at the best possible prices. One of the main things this bill does is to enablesmalllocal telephone companies to obtain support for discounts to schools, libraries, and hospitals for advanced ser vices. This would give the small companies the ability to small companies the ability to offer services to our schools and hospitals comparable tothat afforded the large telephone companies and their schools and hospital
HB 1701 would allow all local telephone companies, large and small, to offer the latest services and technology to their customers in a comparable, competitive manner. This forward-looking legislation would mean abrighter telecommunications future for Texas consumers.
Continued affordable local telephone rates and high levels of investment in a state-of-the-art local infrastructure can be secured by HB 1701. And, most importantly, the customers of all Texas' local telephone companies - whether they are in the community- would receive their fair share of the benefits.
