

Berlin's Botanical Wonderland

They look like huge platters of bright green leather. Actually, they are the floating leaves of a remarkable variety of water lily, the Victoria Regia of tropical South America. These measure 4 to 6 ft. across and can support considerable weight. The giant plant also sprouts large flowers, 1 to 2 ft. in diameter, that bloom only at night, then change color from white through pink to crimson, and usually last no more than 48 hours. This exotic plant is but one of the 18,000 species that delight and amaze visitors to the famed Botanical Gardens in West Berlin.

Another rare specimen is the Metasequoia Glyptostroboides, related to the redwoods, discovered in China in other than fossilized form only 25 years ago. The California redwood itself is represented by a handsome crosssection, about 700 years old and weighing 4.5 tons.

Berlin's Botanical Gardens cover 104 acres that also contain the Botanical Museum, a large herbarium with 1.5 million specimens, the smaller Willdenow Herbarium with 20,000 even rarer varieties, and a research library of more than 60,000 volumes plus related documents

A real "must" at Berlin's botanical wonderland is the unique "Geographical Gardens" section, with its fascinating array of major plant formations from Europe to China and Japan and on to North America: they include the mountain flora of the Pyrenees, Alps, Carpathians, Caucasus, Himalayas, the Altai Mountains; and, of course. from the Rockies, the Central plains, and the woodlands of the north Atlantic coast.
