



Dips and Chips Tips

Dips are to parties as butter is to bread: they just go together! Whether you're serving dinner for twenty or snacks for six, dips and chips are "must" foods for almost any occasion. For tastier dips, follow these

I Prepare dips at least 45 minutes before serving, so the flavors can blend: to keep flavor fresh, cover the dips tightly before refrigerating.

I Don't serve dips icy-cold. Remove from the refrigerator at least fifteen minutes before serving and let stand at room temperature to mellow.


