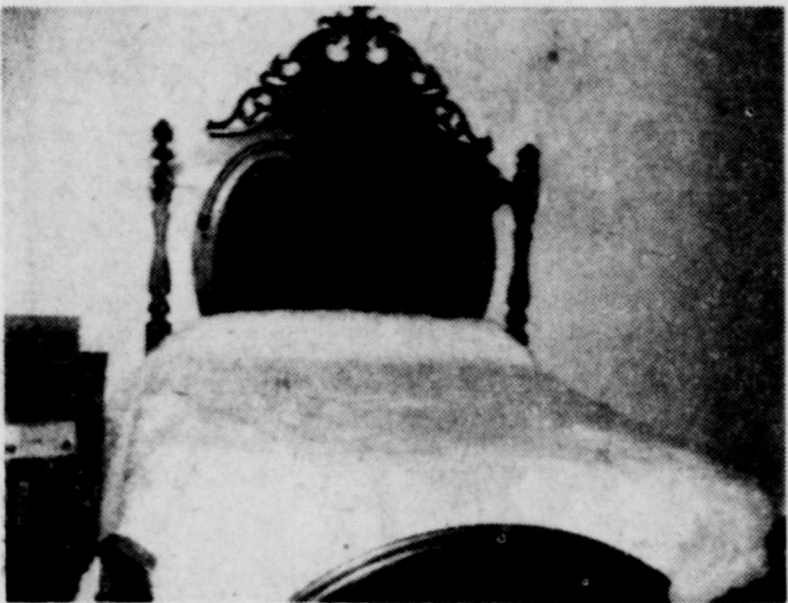
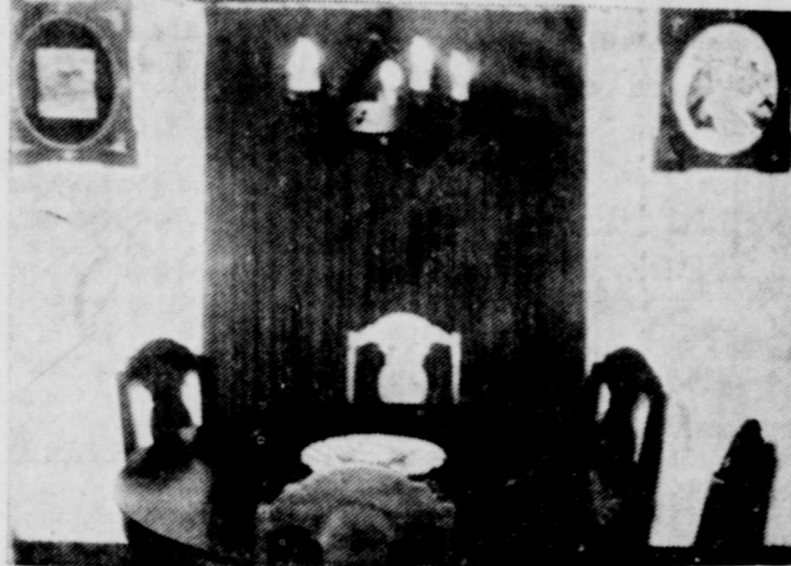

Signs On State Highways Now Require State Permit

AUSTIN — Owners of advertising signs along Interstate, U.S. and major State-numbered highways have until December 31 to apply for permits required under the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The act controls all outdoor advertising signs from the largest signboard to the smallest sign hanging from a fence along the right of way line.

The Texas Highway Commission established the deadline under the legislation which became effective on June 29. The act requires that no person may erect or maintain a sign within 600 feet of an Interstate or federal-aid primary highway in Texas without a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

In addition to the license, the sign owner must have a permit for each sign he has now or which he plans to erect.

On-premise signs — those advertising activities conducted on the premises and those offering the property for sale — are exempt.

The act will be implemented in stages. The first stage requires the owner of the sign to obtain a State license and post a bond. The license fee is \$25 and the license is valid for an indefinite period.

The license application must be accompanied by a bond in the amount of \$2,500 for each county in which signs are located, or a maximum bond of \$10,000 for owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond form applications may be obtained by writing the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas 78763.

After obtaining a license, the owner is required to obtain a separate permit for each existing and new off-premise sign on the affected highways. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the Right of Way Sections of the Highway Department district offices.

For each sign permit required, the owner should submit an application accompanied by a check or money order for \$5 to the Highway Department district of-

fice for the county in which the sign is located. If the permit application is for an existing sign, the Highway Department will check to see if the sign conforms with the Beautification Act.

Permits now will be issued for signs in place prior to June 29 even if they do not conform to the law. They will be permitted to stay in place until programmed for acquisition or removal.

Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law.

Anyone planning to put up a new sign on the controlled highways should check with the Highway Department district office in his area before doing anything, to determine if the proposed sign location conforms to the law.

The Highway Department also has begun removal of abandoned and illegal signs on controlled highways. An abandoned sign is one in which the owner no longer claims any interest. An illegal sign is one which is located on private property without permission of the property owner.

Owners of signs along the controlled highways who have questions about the program should contact the Highway district office in Abilene. Contact J. C. Roberts, Old Anson Rd. and U.S. 83. Telephone number is 673-3761.

Agriculture Expansion To Require More Credit

COLLEGE STATION — Agricultural finance and credit are essential to food and fiber production and marketing in Texas. And with Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Month in progress, a closer look at this phase of agriculture is in order, contends Tom Prater, economist in management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

farmers and ranchers continue to expand as they invest in new technology, enlarge their operations, and increase borrowing for personal items. Of course, a prime need for additional financing is the increased price of capital goods, such as real estate, machinery and other inputs.

Who is providing this credit? Non-real estate type loans — those made to meet current opera-

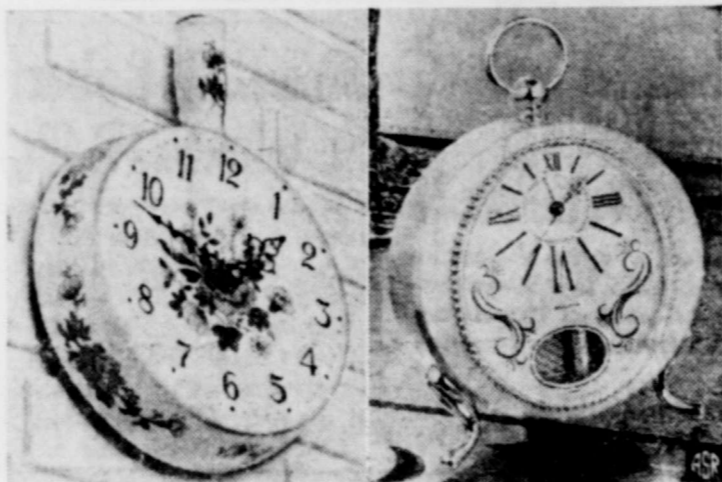
ting and living needs — are supplied largely by banks, production credit associations and similar organizations, and the Farmers Home Administration, points out the Texas A.M. University economist. Considering credit supplied by merchants, suppliers and others, the non-real estate loans in Texas total well over \$2 billion.

"As far as real estate loans for Texas farmers and ranchers are concerned such loans have totaled more than \$2 billion for several years. Credit institutions provid-

ing these loans include banks, federal land banks, Farmers Home Administration, life insurance companies and individuals," notes Prater.

"As the production and marketing of food and fiber products continues to increase in Texas and financial needs continue to grow, credit institutions will play an increasingly important role in meeting these needs. And farmers and ranchers must continue to place more emphasis on management, record keeping and the projection of profit potentials."

Time—More Valuable Than Gold?

Experts say time is probably our single most priceless possession. Rich or poor, time is the one thing we cannot save. Each second that ticks by is gone forever.

Management consultants who specialize in devising time-saving methods for business and industry generally agree; we each have an "income" of 168 hours every week. How we spend our time can well determine our wealth.

We are a nation of clock watchers. We sleep, eat and work by the clock. We plan our days by the clock—when to catch a train or plane. We schedule meetings, lunches, coffee breaks and practically all our activities by the clock. Ever think how many times each day we check the time?

In Chicago during a recent time change from daylight

saving to standard time, 227,491 calls were made in one day to the local telephone "time" number. Time calls on an average weekday there number 110,000.

Look around, "time machines" are everywhere — on walls, on tables, on desks, on buildings, in buildings, on our wrists, in our pockets and on our clothing. There's a time-piece for almost every purpose — from swimming to flying.

It's estimated the clock market is worth \$400 million. Industry is keeping pace with the demand for accurate and versatile clocks. For example, Bulova — whose engineers developed the first electronic watch in 1960 — now has over 200 different clock models in its line.

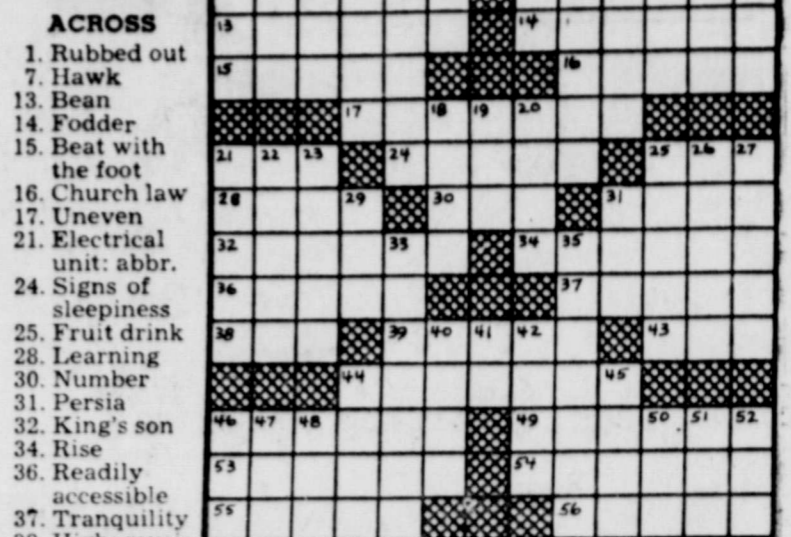

\$276,000 Federal Grant To Expand Texas 4-H Club

COLLEGE STATION — With the help of federal funds recently appropriated by Congress, the Texas 4-H program is expected to make new inroads for reaching more of the state's two-and-

a-half million eligible youth. Texas will receive some \$276,000 for expanding its 4-H program. "Our goal is to boost 4-H enrollment in Texas during the 1970's to 10 per cent of the eligible boys and girls, those between the ages of 9 and 19," points out Dr. Don Stormer, state 4-H and youth leader for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Extension Service is the parent organization of 4-H.

"Such an increase would mean a doubling of our present enrollment of 125,000 members," notes Stormer. Expansion efforts will initially concern the addition of new staff members to give added impetus and direction to 4-H activities. At present the state has three area 4-H and youth specialists located in various regions. This area staff will be increased so that a 4-H specialist will be located in each major area and serve either one or two Extension districts. There are 13 districts in the state. To provide for additional leadership at the county level, 4-H program assistants will be added to the county Extension staff in 46 counties, according to Stormer. "We need to improve the viability of our program and expand our overall efforts to reach more of the state's youngsters. Our youth today must cope with many problems and pressures, and we have a responsibility to provide them with information and guidance so that they will be better able to make intelligent decisions. We must especially offer more programs dealing with the social

and physical science and with the humanities," says Stormer. "4-H today has something to offer to every youngster who is inquisitive, who is interested in doing things, and who wants challenges. Whether living on the farm or in the city, boys and girls can join 4-H and can select projects and activities that are of particular interest to them. "Learning to live a life, a chance to grow and develop, that's what 4-H is all about," contends Stormer. Through this new expansion effort, 4-H should indeed continue to progress as one of the state's and nation's foremost youth organizations. The seven wonders of the modern world are the airplane, radium, antiseptics, antitoxins, X-ray, radio and the telephone.

Quick Help for Heart Attack Victims



Heart disease is America's No. 1 killer. Also, from 50 to 75 percent of deaths from heart attack occur outside hospitals. So a group of physicians, supported by the pharmaceutical-industry-sponsored Advanced Coronary Treatment Foundation, have launched a national program to bring life-saving medical equipment to the patient, rather than vice-versa. Inside this Mobile Coronary Care Vehicle which rushed to the heart attack site, a victim is receiving emergency care. Then he will be taken to a hospital intensive care unit. Communities wishing to organize such an early coronary care system can obtain information from the ACT Foundation, 575 Madison Ave., New York, N.Y. 10022.

Toys for Tots In 25th Year

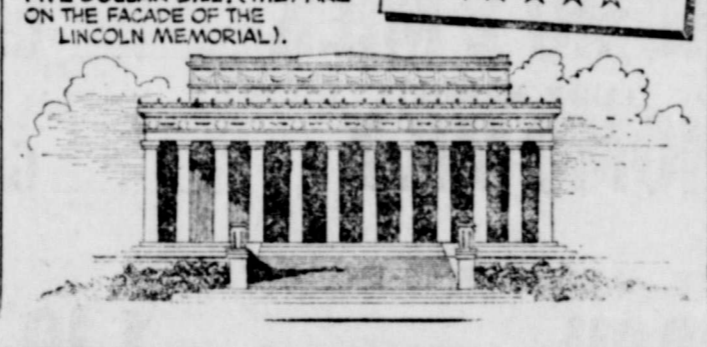

4-H's Earn Rewards Thru Decision-Making



SPECIAL — "Decisions... Decisions... To many people they are the culmination of soul searching and frustration. But they don't have to be," says Lois Howard, program associate with the National 4-H Service Committee, Chicago. To prove her point, Miss Howard calls attention to the national 4-H home management program supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service and supported by Tupperware Home Parties. "A major emphasis in the program is on learning to use the decision-making process," she relates. "We really want to help young people make sound choices and decisions based on their resources — time, money, energy, personal skills and knowledge," Miss Howard says. "And we encourage young people to think in terms of their own personal values, goals and experiences and the contributions their decisions can make to a happy home," she added. Some 45 4-H'ers from as many states who have made noteworthy achievements in the home management program will be attending National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 26-30. Judged tops in their respective states these young people will be the guests of Tupperware Home Parties. Previously having earned recognition in their counties, four medals of honor are offered in each county, they now become eligible for consideration in the awarding of eight \$700 scholarships. With her program skills she helped her family design their new house and then to make decisions about decoration, furnishings and painting. As a result, Miss Ballantine feels that all young people should be given an opportunity to show they can handle responsibilities. Another misconception of salvation is the one above stated. This concept came from the sincere urgent requesting of concerned people wanting their friends and loved ones to be servants of the Lord and were afraid they would wait so long death would claim their lives before they turned to serve the Lord.

Ephesians 5:15-17 "Look therefore carefully how ye walk, not as unwise, but as wise; redeeming the time, because the days are evil. Wherefore be ye not foolish, but UNDERSTAND WHAT THE WILL OF THE LORD IS." (A.S.V.)

So first let us gain one very important truth — God wants every human being saved from sin's ruin in this life and hell's punishment. "Who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth." I Timothy 2:4 (cf. II Peter 3:9 and Luke 15:11-32).

Second, don't use this love and longsuffering of God (II Pet. 3:15) as a "false hope" so you can continue in sin for the following reasons:

- 1 Once you get the taste of sin, one can easily become the servant of that sin. John 8:34 "Jesus answered them Verily, verily I say unto you, Whosoever committeth sin is the the servant of sin." (cf. Romans 7:15)
- 2 You don't know when death will claim you, "For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanishes away." James 4:14.
- 3 You do not know when Jesus will return to claim his own. "But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away... II Peter 3:10-14." Read II Thessalonians 1:7-10.

Thirdly, as long as you can repent there is forgiveness available from God through Jesus Christ by obeying his doctrine. (Luke 13:3; Romans 2:4-6).

It is possible for a person to reach a point of being unable to repent and turn from sin, thus anytime one puts off serving the Lord he increases the danger of eternal damnation, the conscience can become "seared" (I Tim. 4:2) and thus "after thy hardness and impenitent heart treasures up unto thyself wrath against the day of wrath and revelation of the righteous judgment of God." Romans 2:5.

DON'T WAIT TOO LONG!!!

Fourthly, we are "called" by the written gospel of Jesus Christ, "Whereunto he called you by our gospel, to the obtaining of the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ." (II Thess. 2:14) Thus in a very real sense as long as that gospel is recorded God will still be calling all to serve him. And thus not until your death or his second coming will he stop calling you.

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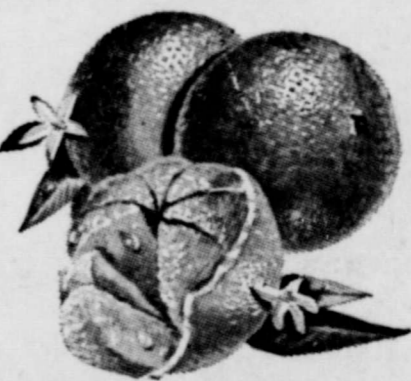
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
