Bovina Schools began the 1972-73 school year Monday. First day enrollment was 594, according to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent.

Of that total, 264 are in elementary grades, 143 in junior high and 175 in high school. Elementary includes the first five grades, junior high includes the sixth, seventh and eighth and high school is composed of the top four grades.

Last year's first day enrollment was 632, a record high. Jacobs points out that the high school has its largest enrollment in history while student numbers are presently down in elementary and junior high. The first grade has 42 stu-

dents. A total of 22 are enrolled in kindergarten.


## C. C. Christian Rites Sunday

# Large Crowds **Attend Events**

Bovina's community celebration, Bull Town Days 1972, was run off Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday and was considered another outstanding success by the promoters of the annual event and those attending.

Each of the individual events of the festivities was considered successful and enjoyed average or better attendance during the ninth annual celebration.

The added event in this year's expanded celebration --Sunday's AMA-sanctioned Moto Cross cycle races -- drew what was probably the second largest crowd of the weekend much to the surprise of BTD sponsors. The success of the races will, no doubt, call for an encore in '73.

A street-full of supper guests, estimated at 2,500, was on hand Friday evening for the free barbeque which traditionally attracts more people than any other single event. The meal featured choice Parmer County-fed beef with all the trimmings, including pinto be ans and Bovina-grown cantaloupe and onion slices. The cantaloupe and onion were provided by Gateway Farms. Remainder of the meal was paid for by donations from businesses and individuals and from income from other BTD sources.

The only flaw in the 1972 celebration was the failure of the band scheduled to play for the Western dance Saturday night which has, in the past, concluded the festivities.

Named queen of Bull Town Days '72 from a field of five candidates was Christi Trimble, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Trimble. It could have been the Trimble family night as another daughter, Cathy, 14, was named second runner-up. Michelle Bonds, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Bonds, was first runner-up. The new queen was sponsored by Bovina Roping Club. Miss Bonds was sponsored by Gaines Hardware and Miss Trimble by Bovina Woman's Study Club.

The queen was presented a bouquet of red roses and a silver trophy belt buckle by Bonny Jones, 1971 BTD queen, at intermission of the Thursday night Grand Ole Opry Show in Bovina Schools auditorium. The runners-up were pre-

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




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### Estimates 48 Fatalities

accidents over the Labor Day weekend will claim 48 lives.

The Labor Day holiday, as set by the National Safety Council, is a 78-hour period from 6p.m. Friday, September 1 to midnight Monday, September 4.

At the close of the Labor Day period last year, a DPS tabulation showed that 41 persons had died in 34 traffic accidents. Late deaths pushed the toll to 43 persons killed in 36 accidents.

Speir said the DPS and local law enforcement agencies would be taking all possible steps to reduce the holiday death toll. A special "Operation Motor-cide" will be in progress over will be in progress over the Labor Day weekend and tabulations of rural and urban fatal wrecks will be reported to the news media of Texas three times

As is customary on major holidays, all available DPS patrolmen will be placed on duty throughout the state. They will make full use of radar and breath testing instruments in an effort to curtail the major causes of fatal accidents -- excessive speed and drunk driving.

These educational and enforcement programs will have an impact, but a great deal of the responsibility for accident

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

The Prophet and the Preacher were kindred spirits in assionate delivery of their messages, as well as the content of their message-the word of God, God said to Jeremiah, "Whatsoever I command thee thou shall speak . . . Behold I have put my words in thy mouth" (Jer. 1:7,9). It can be no different now than it was then, His word is our only message whether we would speak it by inspiration or we speak it by reading it out of the Bible. One prophet expressed it perfectly: "Then spake Haggai Jehovah's messenger in Jehovah's message unto the people" (Hag, 1:13). That would be refresh-

Is it then possible to be in fact a gospel preacher and not know the gospel message? How can a man call himself preacher (Kerux) and never preach the Bible passages? The preacher's place in the pulpit is proclaiming the heavenly message to fleshbound souls hopelessly lost in sin without Christ. His motto expresses the philosophy of his life, Preach the Word! Paul charged Timothy, "do the work of an evangelist" (II Tim, 4:5). No greater or noble work exists than heralding the good news of the Savior.
