Governor Preston Smith has us convinced that he is not guilty of any wrongdoing in regard to the so-called "stock scandal," which turned out to be a bad deal for several Texas politicians.

While Smith didadmit to profiteering from the stock deal and it looks bad now to some extent, there really isn't anything wrong with what he did, on the surface.

Through his investments partner, he bought some of the stock back when there was nothing wrong with it and sold it at a profit.

Simple as that, as we see it. No questions were asked at that time and never would have been had not the illegality of the whole deal --- not Preston's part of it ---- been brought to

We've stated here previously that we probably won't vote for Governor Smith in his bid for the Democratic nomination in the May primary. However, our reasons are other than the stock scandal deal. We think Preston is innocent in this matter and that voters shouldn't hold it against him even if his involvement did turn out to be

Governor Smith has a couple of rough opponents in his bid for a third nomination from his party. This will be a tough fight and we're guessing he won't emerge as the winner this time. It might have been easier for him to drop out of the race. After all, he's already had two terms, but he has chosen to run again and he encourages the stock scandal deal as a campaign issue.

By so doing, he is indicating that it will be to his advantage for his opponents to bring the facts out in the open for public airing.

To us, that doesn't sound like a man who has something

Smith has his faults as well as his advantages. The stock scandal just doesn't happen to be one of the faults, is the way we feel about the matter now.

Ware kidded us a little last Fall, saying we ignored sugar beets in our crops reports. The criticism was probably justified and we listened to him carefully the two or three times he encouraged us to in-

clude beets in the stories. At that time, though, we'll admit that we didn't know Ware was the best sugar beet grower in Texas and New Mexico.

Anyway, congratulations, Leon, and from henceforth we'll treat you with the respect that the best sugar beet farmer in the area deserves!

Just give us another chance. Those farmers who decided after last year that sugar beets weren't a good deal influenced us too much.



Conservation, truly is "the key to survival" for us and for our children.







dditives may shun processed foods and make everything themselves. But they're still using food additives. Some ingredients not commonly thought of as additives have been safely used for years. I'm talking about spices, pectin, sugar gelatin and salt, which are used

Iodine was the first commercial food additive when it was added to salt to prevent simple goiter. Today we buy fortified bread, cereal products, milk and other foods to prevent vitamin and mineral deficiencies.

Preservatives that retard mold and bacterial spoilage are another group of additives. For example, salt is used as a curing agent in meat preservation. And sugar is used in preparing jams and jellies for canning and freezing fruits. (Of course, you may also can or

Consumers wary of food | freeze fruits without sugar.) Another additive is pectin, a natural thickener. Since many fruits don't contain enough natural pectin to form a gel, additional pectin is needed to make certain jams and jellies.

Food manufacturers add synthetic or natural food colors to processed foods when unwanted to flavor and preserve food, color changes occur, Many food colors are made from natural | as and the County of Parmer. food substances. For instance carotene a source of vitamin A found in yellow vegetables, may be used to color dairy products such as margarine.

> Although an additive may come from food or other substances, it's chemical by nature. The word 'chemical' doesn't mean somthing unnat-ural or dangerous. Don't let any food faddist tell you there's a difference between vitamin C in an orange and that made in chemical factory and added to grape or apple juice. They'r both good for you.




