SITUATION ETHICS # 2

Situation ethics futher states: "We ought not to hesitate to break a law that is in all conscience unjust, that is to say, unloving." The main "religious" advocate of situation ethics says four facts determine how love shall act in any given situation: "(1) the end; (2) the means; (3) the motive; and (4) the consequences. Whether any form of sex is good or evil depends on whether love is fully served." All situationists would agree with Mrs. Patrick Cambell's remark "that they can do what they want as long as they don't do it in the street and frighten the horses."

To put love against law is an insult to the Word of God and a descreation of love. No man can really claim to be loving people when he works against their eternal good.

There are two laws at work. One is the law of God, which is codified in the rules and principles found in God's revelation and especially the New Testament protion of that revelation. The other is the law of the flesh which says: "Do what you want to do - there are no binding rules - live anyway you choose - 'gather ye roses while you may' - let the situation govern your morals and lives."

Read what Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments."...He that hath my commandments, and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me: and he that loveth me shall be loved of my Father, and I will love him, and will manifest myself to him...If a man love me, he will keep my works: and my Father will love him, and make our abode with him. He that loveth me not keepeth not my sayings:..." John 14:15, 21, 23, 24. (Futher suggested reading(Romans 7:7,8; 7:12-14,16,22,23; 8:1,2,5-8,12-14; 6: 1,2; 3:8; Gal. 5:19-21). To say that obeying God is unimportant is to deny these passages as well as the Lord himself.

Ethics and morals and doctrines are not determined by the situation, but by the law of God, and sin is the transgression of the law of God (I John 3:4). If we are to please God we must in every situation obey the commands of God, for by so doing we serve the highest interest of mankind and our own salvation.


