
County Sheriffs Department, he was employed as Chief Jailor for the Taylor County Sheriffs Department.

Cotton Harvesting Is 30 Per Cent Complete

Classing Office graded 46,200 tal classed. Other grade discotton samples during the ending November 17. B. B. at 21 percent, grade 51 at 14 Manly estimates harvest to be about 30 percent completed in the area serviced by his office. A total of 169,000 samples have been graded to date this season, as compared to 25,500 that had been graded by this date last season.

The quality of samples classed continued to improve in grade and staple. White grades were assigned to 59 percent of the samples classed, and 39 percent were within light-spotted grades. Grade 41 was the most predominant

percent, grade 31 at 12 percent, and grades 52 and 32 at 9 percent each. Reductions in grade because of bark in samples declined to 18 percent. A wide range of staple lengths were classed. Staples ranged from 28 to 35, and were longer than during the

two previous weeks. Staple 31 continued as the most predominant length at 45 percent. Other staple lengths were as follows: staple 32 at 28 percent, staple 30 at 16 percent, and staple 33 at 7 percent. Micronaire readings were 4 percent in low micronaire ranges, 5 percent in high micronaire ranges, and 91 percent within the 3.5 to 4.9 range.

Pressley fiber strength tests showed average to strong readings during the week. Sixteen percent tested within the 75,000 to 79,000 pounds per square inch range, and 35 percent tested within the 80 to 84,000 psi range.

Cotton prices declined by 2 to 4 cents per pound during the past week. White grades of cotton sold for 3400 to loan rates, and light-spotted grades sold for 3200 to 3400 points over loan rates. The Agricultural Marketing Service reported a price range of from 51.25 to 55.50 cents Mr. and Mrs. B. R. Vancil per pound for premium micronaire, grade 4131 cotton.

Area Conservationist Transferred to Abilene

Joe J. McEntire, Area Con-servationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Big Spring was promoted and transferred to Abilene as Area Conservationist, effective October 28, 1973.

McEntire is a veteran of 22 years with the SCS with the past two years being in the Big Spring Area.

In his new field, he will have nine field offices covering 10 counties and in addition to being responsible for the administrative and technical phases of the SCS regular program of work, he will be responsible for the Great Plains Conservation Program that is applicable in the Abilene Area,

McEntire, a native of Comanch County, Texas, completed his requirements for a degree at Texas A&M University in 1950. He started his career with the SCS as a range conservationist at Fredericksburg, Texas. This was interrupted by two years of service with the First Marine Air Wing during the Korean conflict. On

his return to duty he served as district conservationist at Kerrville and Floydada, Texas. In 1963 McEntire was promoted to Area Conservationist at Uvalde and reassigned to Big Spring in 1971.

In addition to his regular duties, McEntire has been active in professional societies. He is a member of the Soil Conservation Society of America and a past director of the Texas Section, Society for Range Management. In 1970 he received an outstanding rating and Certificate of Merit for the superior manner in which he directed SCS operations in the Uvalde Area. Previous awards were received while at Kerrville and Floydada for sustained above average performance.



COLLEGE STATION --"Checking your furnace filters will help avoid problems when the heating season arrives," says W.S. Allen, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agri-

cultural Extension Service. "Most warm air furnaces in use today are equipped with filters. Keeping these clean can add to your comfort by reducing airborne particles in the air. Furthermore, a clogged filter can prevent pro-

per operation of furnaces," the Texas A&M University System specialist points out. A dirty filter may restrict

the air flow to such an extent to prevent proper heating of the house. Restricted air flow may also cause an overheated furnace, especially if the high temperature limit control should fail to operate.

FALSE VIEWS OF TRUTH #3 4. IT IS A FASE VIEW OF TRUTH TO HOLD THAT IT

IS NOT THE EXCLUSIVE MEANS TO SALVATION FROM SIN.

In a positive way, the Bible makes clear that those who both believe and obey the TRUTH will be saved. Jesus taught, that a person who both HEARS AND OBEYS his word is like a wise man who builds the "house" of his life upon a solid foundation (Matthew 7:21-27). According to the apostle Peter the souls of men are purified in their obedience to the TRUTH (I Peter 1:22). According to Jesus, I remind you, it is truth which makes men free (John 8:31, 32). In a negative way, the Bible makes clear that those who do not believe and obey the gospel will be damned to everlasting punishment. If one does not believe the gospel, he will be damned (Mark 16: 15, 16). Note please that it is not failure to believe some mere human creed or tradition which leads to damnation-it is failure to believe the gospel. Also, according to Paul the apostle, these who do not OBEY the gospel will suffer eternal punishment (II Thessalonians 1: 7-9; 2:10-12). This passage is so plain, so simple that none of us can have the slightest justification in not understanding the truth set*out therein. Bear in mind, please, that Paul does not condition eternal damnation upon failure to believe and obey some mere human creed or tradition-but upon such failure in rleation to the gospel of Christ. Further, it should be noted that he does not say that is is merely probably that dananation will occur if one does not obey the gospel; he plainly, unequivocally, unambiguously teaches that all who do not obey THE gospel of Christ will be punished eternally. Let no one-no matter how pious he may seem to be-deceive you into believing other-

5. IT IS A FALSE VIEW OF TRUTH TO HOLD THAT PREACHER CAN PREACH ANYTHING ELSE AND STILL BE PLEASING TO GOD.

Jesus did not commission his disciples to preach MERELY SOME RELIGIOUS MESSAGE. He specified the very message which was to be preached: THE GOSPEL (Matthew 28:18-20; Mark 16:15, 16). Paul made it clear that any man who preaches any other message will rest under the curse of God (Gal. 1:6-12).

It is becoming fashionable, it seems, to hear it proclaimed that DOCTRINE is not really important. The providers of such false teaching would have others to accept the view that the only truly important thing is to have a "pious" attitude. While it is true that in order to be pleasing to God one must be pious-it is equally true that one must also both believe and obey the truth.






