Hospital District Passes By Huge Majority Vote

Voters in Bovina and most of Parmer County gave a better than 3-1 margin in approving the creation of a Parmer County Hospital District in the special election last Saturday, May 18.

Final vote was 801 in favor, and 243 against, a favorable margin of 76.7 per cent.

Following are the box-by-box totals, with the approval totals given in parenthesis:

Friona: 503-127 (79.8%); Bovina: 120-57 (67.8); Lakeview: 32-6 (84.2%); Rhea: 40-4 (91.0%); Lazbuddie: 11-24 (31.4%); Absentee: 95-25 (79.2%). Totals: 801-243

Members of the board of directors of Parmer County Community Hospital and hospital officials hailed the vote, saying they felt it would save the hospital.

"We were gratified by the margin of approval, and felt that the voters spoke their minds in creating a hospital district," said hospital board member Dale Schueler.

"We can set our tax rate at 18 cents per \$100 and that should give us \$400,000 with which to operate the hospital in 1992," said board chairman Wendell Gresham.

This is the first year for Texas Tech to participate in the program. Currently, students from a dozen universities throughout the nation are participating in the project.

hearing that response, most normal people would assume that he was in the market for a new car or truck. Legislators, however, know that he was shopping for something entirely different.

What he was looking for were bills that had made it far enough through the legislative process, and were pending before the Senate, that he could amend to accomplish his purposes.

This close to the end of Session members and their staffs are simply not able to scrutinize pending legislation as closely as they could earlier in the Session when the sheer number of bills was much less. This provides an opportunity for a clever member to put an amendment on a bill on the floor of the Senate thereby avoiding close scrutiny in committee. The same thing happens in the House of Representatives.

Once you pass the 120th day of a 140-day Session, it is generally agreed that a Senate bill that has not passed the Senate has no chance of completing the entire legislative process before the end of the Session. The same is true with a bill pending before the House of Representatives after that date. So for example, a senator who has had a bill bottled up in committee will look for a bill that has passed the House and passed a Senate committee that can be amended on the Senate floor in a way that would accomplish the purpose of his languishing Senate bill. Thus the House bill becomes a "vehicle" for accomplishing his purposes.

The State Constitution and the rules of the Texas Senate and the Texas House require that any amendment to a bill

fully. If he does not do so, the amendment could be challenged successfully by raising a point of order alleging that the amendment is not germane to the caption of the original bill.

If the member is successful in amending the bill, and it's finally passed by a house of the Legislature, there remains one more challenge. The author of the amendment must then convince the author of the original bill in the other house to concur in the amendments put on his bill. If he does so, the bill sponsor will move to concur in the amendments put on his bill in the other house. If that motion prevails, the bill then goes to the governor for signature. If the member who amended the bill is not successful in convincing the author to accept the amendment, the sponsor of the original bill has two options. First, he could simply move not to concur in the amendments adopted in the other house. If that motion prevails, it would have the effect of killing the original bill and the amendment that was placed on it. His

other option would be to move not to concur in the amendments put on in the other house, but instead to appoint a conference committee to work out the differences between the two bills.

At this time in the Session, it is more than a full-time job trying to keep up with amendments to bills, motions to concur and motions to adopt conference committee reports. There is an old saying that there are two things you never want to watch being made: one is sausage and the other is law. I am sure this statement came from someone who had the misfortune of observing the last 20 days of a legislative session.


