


## Bovina High School Is Vandalized

On Saturday night, June 29, unknown individuals broke into Bovina High School and did a considerable amount of damage to the building.

Suspects gained entry to the building by breaking a window in room 118 on the south side of the school. Various rooms were broken into, but it is uncertain at this time what items were stolen during the break-in.

Doors to the gym, school office, band hall, Library and elementary P.E. doors were damaged. Some type of metal object was used to break out the glass on a 25-inch television set and VCR and the glass on the Coke machine in the teachers' lounge was also broken.

All the gas outlets were turned on in the science lab and had been left spewing gas throughout the school until Shirley Garrison, librarian, went to the school late Sunday afternoon to finish some work and found the school in disarray. She immediately notified school officials.

Fire extinguishers were used in the auditorium, on the seats and carpeting, which Charlie Teague said would be a big mess to clean up.


