School Board to Buy Air Conditioning Wiring

The Merkel School Board voted Monday night to install electrical wiring and water to each class room in the Merkel School System for air conditioning. A group of interested citizens and teachers met with the board at the meeting where personnel changes were also discussed.

The board estimated that cost of the materials for the wiring and plumbing would run between \$3-4,000. The labor for the project will be donated by several interested persons from Taylor Electric Cooperative, Inc. and other interested citizens.

"The board is making the necessary electrical and plumbing available to each room so that a teacher or any interested parent can put individual units in the room. Also, there is a possibility that some of the service clubs might want to air condition a room or group of rooms as a project. We wish that funds were available to completely air condition the schools. However, this is not so and this is the best we can do at present," board president Bobby DuBose said.

"About a year ago, the Board took hids to completely air condition the schools. The cost was about \$90,000. This was just too much. Our next approach was to have just wiring and plumbing put in each room. The bid for individual contractors to do this was around \$20,000. This was unacceptable. The plan





WASHINGTON, D.C. - Our State of Texas has a Health Department capable of determining the quality of drinking water. A county or city health officer can submit a sample from a water supply, and in short order, an analysis will be furnished by the Department of Health.

For more than two years now, proposals for imposing national standards for drinking water have been pending. On July 10, the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee of the House of Representatives voted out a measure to authorize the Environmental Protection Agency to set Federal standards for all drinking water. The Senate passed such a oill in 1972 and will likely to so again, if and when the House acts favorably.

The Committee reports the need was proved in 1973 when the General Accounting Office found that only 60 of 446 water systems studied met Federal standards. The GAO study estimated that 8,000,000 Americans consumed water not up to proper standards.

If 8,000,000 people - 2 good round number - do not have good enough drinking water, it is a good guess they do not have the system we have in Texas to assure good water quality. The bill voted out of the

House Committee on July 10 authorizes the Federal Government to force States to bring water quality standards up to the requirements set here in Washington. If a State does not so act, the EPA can sue the State for noncompliance. This is called 'backup authority." If the State does not exerciseits primary responsibility of enforcement of the national standards set, the bill requires the States to report on specific plans to see that the Federal standards are applied and enforced. If Federal authorities decide that the State is not properly acting then it steps in with its own enforcement, The Legislation also grants the EPA authority to set guidelines for State regulations for underground sourwater Con. eac of drinking

Historic Anthrax ... Agricultural Miracles ... Maize Harvest Continuing . . . Milk Production Down

THE OUTBREAK of anthrax in Falls County-which appears to be under control at this time--stimulated a little digging to find out about the disease. The Texas Department of Health, in one of its bulletins, speculated that Moses might have had anthrax in mind when he told Pharaoh that a "grievous murrain" would come on all cattle, horses, oxen and sheep in Egypt if Egyptains didn't stop oppressing the Israelities. It is known that anthrax has appeared world wide, that it will attack almost all animals, including man, but that it appears to prefer cattle and horses. Man and swine appear to have greater resistance to anthrax infection. Anthrax externally may appear to be sores or carbuncles. Internally, it may be mistaken for pneumonia or bloat in cattle. It is usually fatal to infected cattle in a very short time, and its germs may live for many months and be a source of danger in previously infested areas for years. The authorities say that anthrax should be suspected when animals die suddenly, especially in areas where the disease has been a problem previously. The great Louis Pasteur is responsible for developing a vaccine that can protect animals from anthrax.

AMONG THE miracles of agriculture are the increased yields made possible by new varieties developed in such crops as grain sorghums, rice, soybeans, etc. One of the most dramatic has been in sorghums (maize). Before 1956, yields of maize were seldom more than 1,000 pounds an acre. Then came the hybrids and yields rose to more than 2,000 pounds an acre; and eight or ten years ago, yields went to 3,000 pounds or more per acre. Now Texas experiment stations are working on twin-seed hybrids that may increase yields 10-20 per cent more. Work is being done to develop strains that are more resistant to drouth, to disease, and to insects. Production had already made grain sorghums the Number 2 crop (behind cotton) in Texas, and sorghums played a prominent part in the development of feedlots, another development in agriculture during the second half of this Century.


Patricia Jenkins, Named To Honor Roll at N.T.S.U.



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HARVESTING of maize is underway, or complete, all the way from the Coast through the Blacklands, as hot, dry weather allows in most places. Drouth on the High Plains delayed or prevented planting, and it appears that Texas' yields of maize this year may be below 1973. The estimate is that 6,600,000 acres were planted this year, compared to 8,100,000 last year . . . Acres in corn this year in Texas, however, is estimated at 980,000 acres, compared to 750,000 acres last year. Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says this is the largest acreage planted to corn in Texas since 1962

JUNE WAS Dairy Month, and milk production in Texas was 287 million pounds. That is two per cent more than in June, 1973, but five per cent less than in May, 1974. Average milk production per cow was 820 pounds during June, and that is 30 pounds above June, 1973 and 40 pounds below the average for May of this year. Price for wholesale milk for June was placed at \$9.55 per hundred.

PASTURES over Texas continue to get worse as hot, dry weather continues in most places. Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says that ranchers on the Cross Timbers, Edwards Plateau, and Low Plains started culling their herds earlier than usual. Some ranchers are having to feed their remaining stock.


