

Delayed Cotton Stripping Resumes

Prominent Community Leader --

O.W. Rhinehart Services Here

In Memory of Lyndon Baines Johnson 36th President of the United States

O. W. Rhinehart, 77, prominent Bovina citizen and long-time community leader, died Thursday at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at First Baptist Church of Bovina. Officiating was Rev. Larry Heard,

pastor. He was assisted by Cecil Bunch, minister of Bovina Church of Christ, and Rev. Howard Marcom, pastor of Bovina United Methodist Church.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery. Mr. Rhinehart, one of Bovina's first mayors, had been in

ill health for the past several months. He had been confined to the hospital eight days prior to his death.

A Mason and a Shriner, he was a leader in the city's incorporation in the late '40's, serving as mayor during those years. He served another term in the mid-'50's.

He saw a need for the town being incorporated in regard to high insurance premiums. As an organized city, the community could enjoy lower insurance premiums.

Mr. Rhinehart came to Bovina in 1929 from Oklahoma. He was born in Magazine, Ark., Feb. 12, 1895.

He opened a cafe when he first moved here. Later, he owned and operated a Phillips 66 service station and farmed. He also owned and operated the Phillips 66 distributorship prior to going into the real estate and insurance business.

He was active in his real estate business until shortly before he died.

Mr. Rhinehart used his influence in the late '40's to obtain two water wells and a storage tank from the Santa Fe railroad. His persistent effort to get the water facility for his community resulted in Santa Fe officials leasing it to the city for a token payment.

A strong believer in Bovina and its future, Mr. Rhinehart was instrumental in the early and mid-'50's in obtaining a bank for his community.

An early leader in Bovina's Chamber of Commerce, he was an organizer and a charter member of Bovina Lions Club. He was a Past Master of Farwell Lodge No. 977.

A veteran of World War I, Mr. Rhinehart was married to Miss Nettie Mays in Caddo, Okla., May 9, 1914.

He had been a member of the Methodist Church for 62 years.

An active Democrat, Mr. Rhinehart served as Democrat precinct chairman, resigning that position in the early '60's.

Survivors include his wife, Nettie; three daughters, Mrs. O'Lea Hagens of Scottsdale, Ariz., Mrs. Joyce Hammonds of Bovina, and Mrs. Gwen Williams of Clovis; his mother, Mrs. Luseena Rhinehart of Haynesville, La.; a brother, Lester of Bovina; a sister, Mrs. Myrtle Stafford of Longview; four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Billy Marshall, H. J. Charles, Winston Allison, J. T. Hammonds, A. L. Kerby and Clyde Blalock. Remembrances may be in the form of donations to Rhinehart Memorial Fund at First State Bank of Bovina to build a meditation area in Bovina Cemetery.

He's losing contact with the people, it seems. He's even more critical of the press and his ability to get along with members of the Congress evidently hasn't improved a bit.

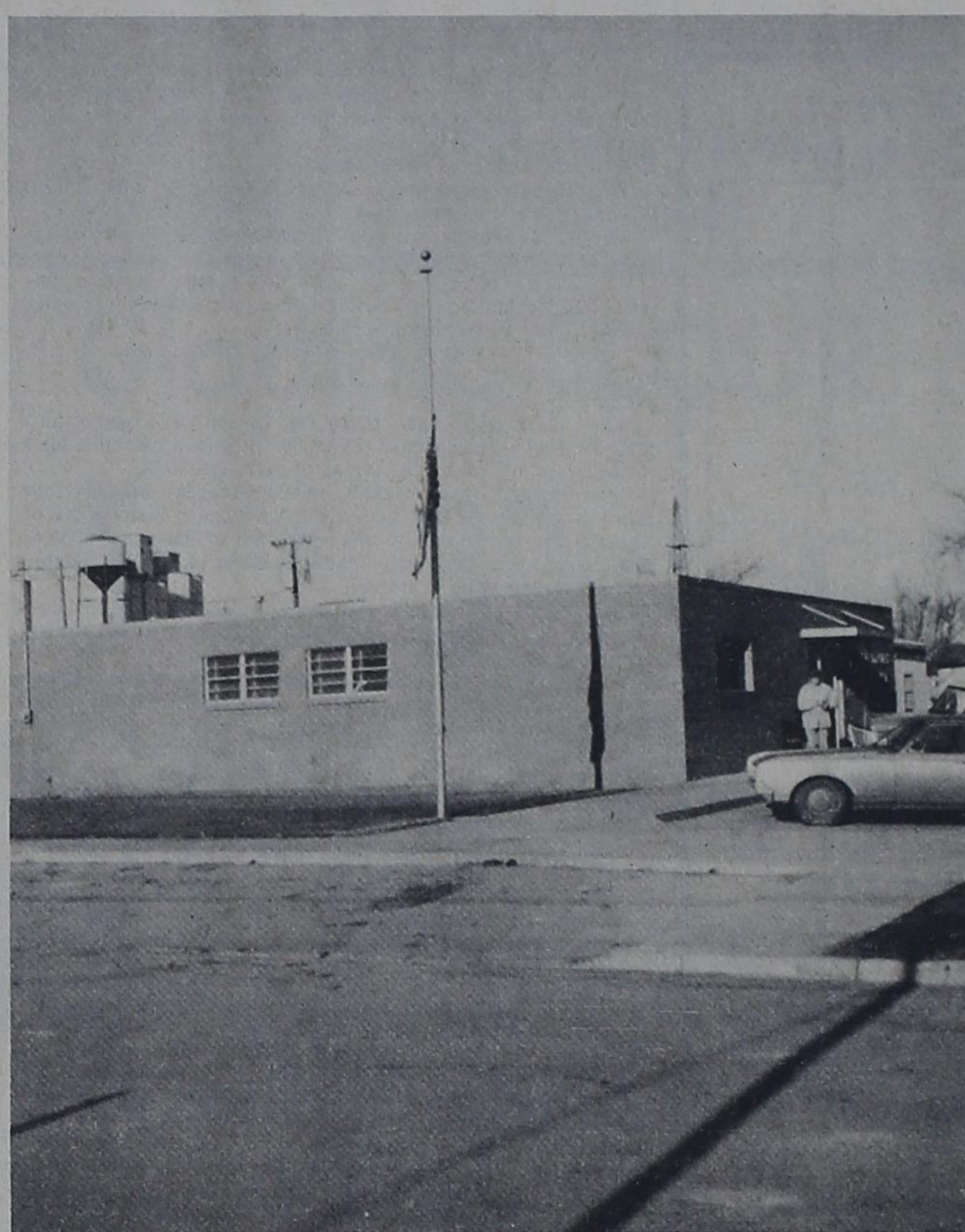
On the local level, right here at home, he's cut the farm program almost in half. That appears to be absurd and ridiculous!

A collision between a Bovina Schools' bus and a 1967 Mercury sedan about 7:45 a.m. Tuesday resulted in minor damages to both vehicles and no injuries.

Eugene Boaz, driver of the school bus, apparently failed to see Alton McCormick, operator of the Mercury, when he pulled out into the intersection of Seventh Street and the Dimmitt Highway. Charlie Teague, bus foreman at Bovina Schools, estimated the bus sustained about \$200 in damage.

'72 Harvest Now Latest In History

The unfinished job of stripping 1972's cotton crop was resumed again this week by farmers in the area.

The wet weather-delayed harvest will no doubt break all records for being the latest in history. It's not unusual for the ginning season to run into January, but this year, even with good weather, the cotton work won't be completed until February.

The cotton itself was reported to be dry by farmers who were resuming stripping operations. The ground, though, is still wet in some fields and won't allow the strippers to be run as close to the ground as the farmers think they need to be.

Stripping of the cotton crop was continually delayed during the latter part of '72, the normal harvest season, by wet weather, primarily snow. A weather break during the Christmas holiday period allowed stripping to begin again. This was stopped by a 10-day snow spell which started the first day of the new year. That caused damp conditions in the fields which lasted until this week when they were dried by sunny weather.

Ginners in the area, here and at Oklahoma Lane, are of the opinion that at least two weeks will be required to get all the cotton to the gin yards. This is assuming that the weather remains dry and favorable.

The ginners are also in agreement that some 25 per cent of the crop remained in the fields as of mid-week.

Some farmers aren't in any big hurry now to get the cotton out. They figure that they've already waited this long and it will be better to wait now until all moisture conditions are right.

Due to the fact that the gins have had ample time to "catch up" with ginning during the most recent wet spell, there will be plenty of trailers to handle the cotton which is still out. No shortage of equipment is expected now.

When the cotton is all in --- and that'll be next month --- the 1972 farming season will be over --- some 30 days later than usual.

Firemen Douse Grass Blaze In Vacant Lot

Members of Bovina Volunteer Fire Department were called to the scene of a grass fire in a vacant lot behind the home of Wilson D'Arcy at 1001 Avenue K about noon Tuesday.

The fire apparently started from trash burning in the alley, according to firemen. The blaze was extinguished before it spread to any of the homes on the block.

Rouel Barron was re-elected secretary-treasurer. James Lee Calaway was named vice president.

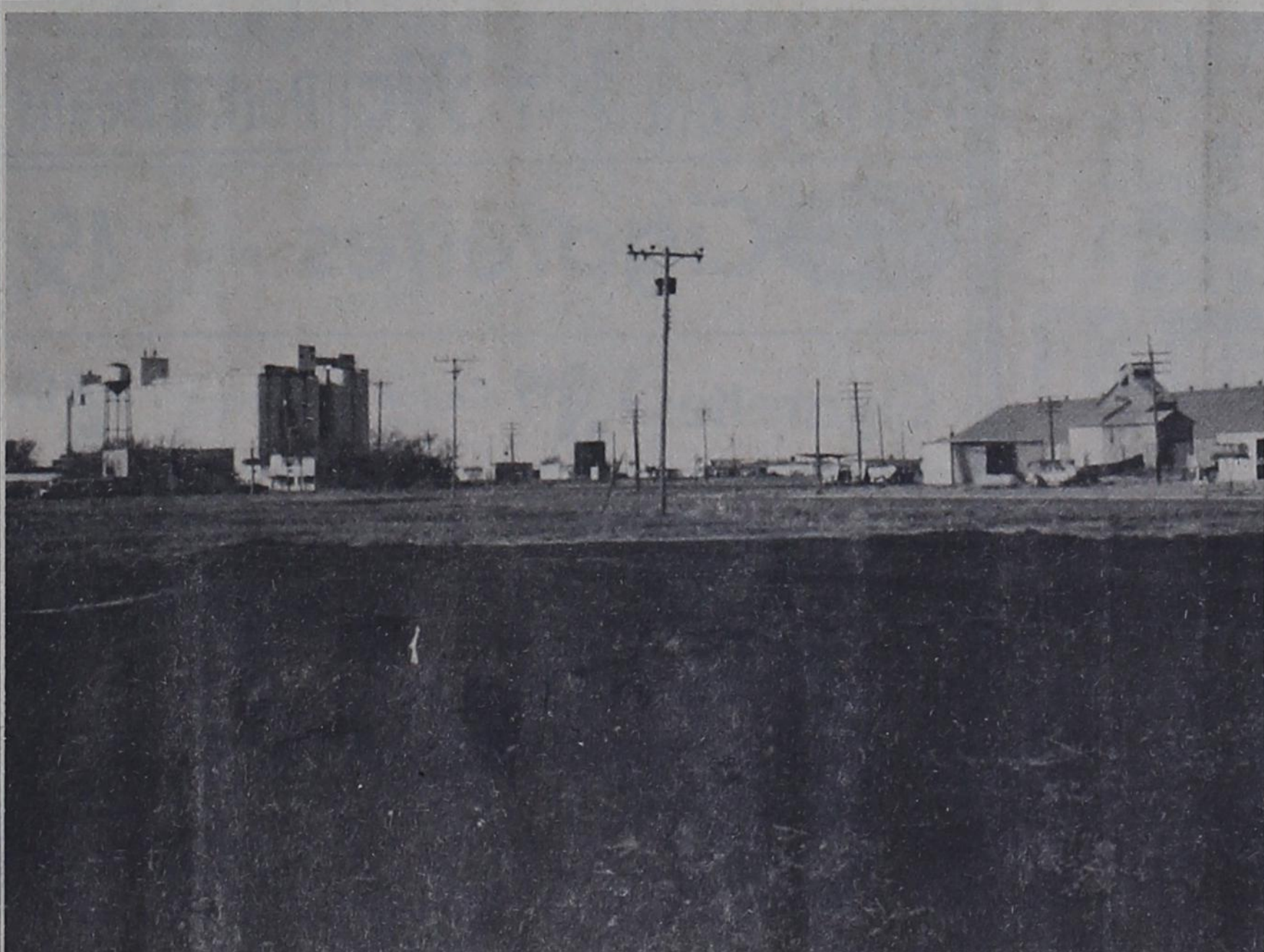
C. E. Trimble was elected parade marshal of the group with Tommy Williams named to head youth activities. Erith Hawkins was elected ring steward for the annual horse show.

Voter registration has "picked up" in Parmer County with a total of 1680 citizens from 21 to 60 filing an application for a "free" vote in Texas this year as of early this week.

Future Opportunity - -

Cattle Industry Presents Problem

Various surveys indicate that this area is in the middle of a growing cattle industry.

Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro Counties have a capacity to feed 6,000,000 head of cattle at one time. This is the highest concentration of cattle in the world, according to Herb Evans of the Parmer County Soil Conservation office.

With this number of cattle in feed lots, manure presents a problem at present but an opportunity for the future, says Evans.

Six thousand head of cattle will produce 1,250,000 tons of manure annually. In the three county area 450,000 acres of

grain sorghum is grown annually. When these figures are put together, there is only enough manure to cover the grain sorghum land once every fourth year at the rate of 10 tons per acre. At the USDA Southwest Great Plains Research Center at Bushland last week, researchers brought out the fact that 10 tons of manure annually is a satisfactory application rate, Evans says.

"So you see, rather than being a problem," says Evans, "the fact of having only a quarter enough manure to go around is the prospect for the near future."

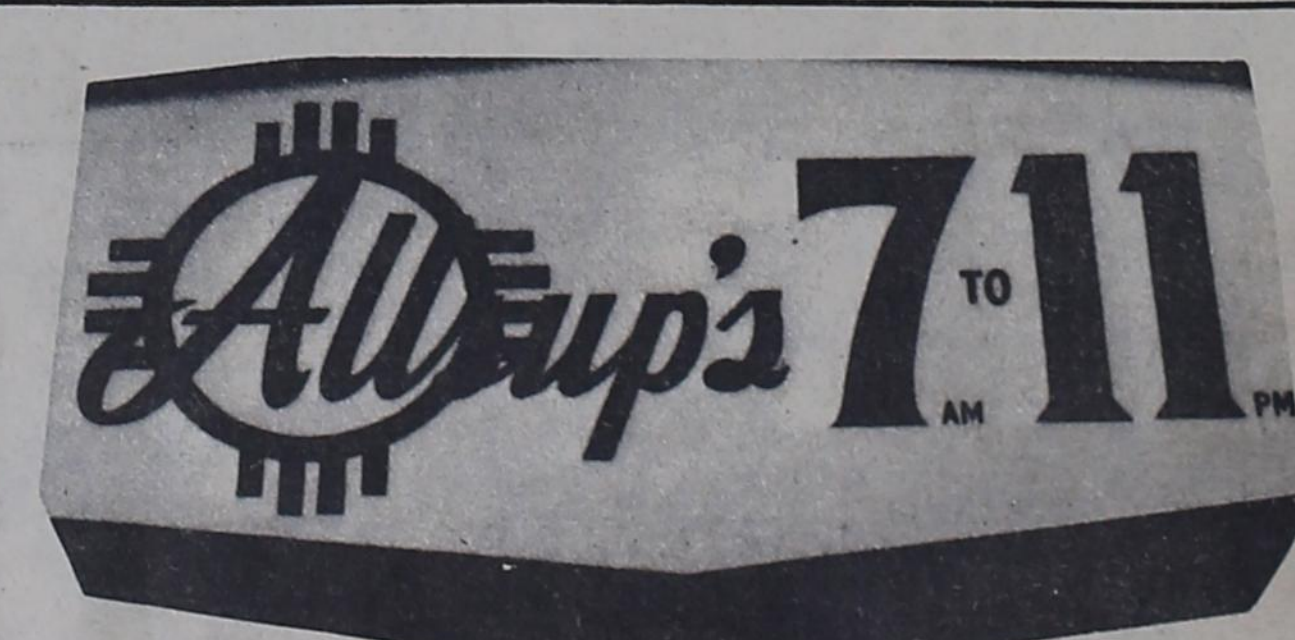

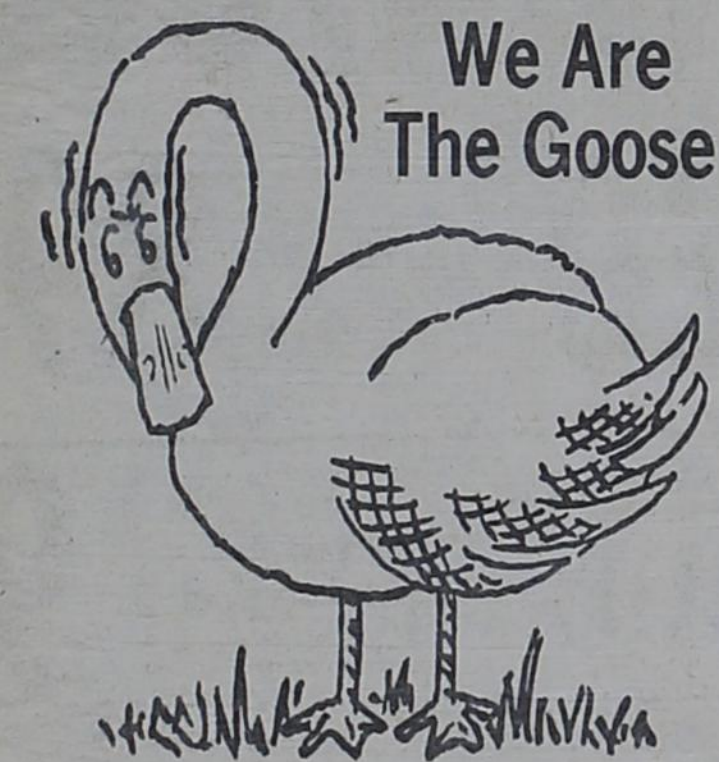

Assets Up 55.7% --

Credit Union Shows Growth

Growth in total assets amounting to 55.7 per cent during the past year has been announced by the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union.

Total assets at the financial institution amounted to \$907,528.99 as of December 31, 1972. This was an increase of \$324,837.32 over the total assets figure of \$582,691.67 recorded on the same date a year earlier.

"We have set a goal of reaching a million dollars in assets by March 1, 1973," stated Geneva Williams, Credit Union treasurer.

Other figures released by Mrs. Williams revealed that shares (savings deposits) at the Credit Union grew from \$461,349.31 on December 31, 1971, to \$697,679.59 this past December 31 -- an increase of \$236,329.78, or 51.3 per cent.

The amount of money on loan as of December 31, 1972 amounted to \$827,470.44. This compared to the figure of \$554,075.53 a year earlier, making a net increase of \$273,394.91 for the year.

ENJOYS GROWTH
"The Credit Union has en-

joyed a healthy growth during the past year. We feel that there is a definite trend toward using the Credit Union, not only by Friona residents, but throughout Parmer County," Mrs. Williams stated.

Other figures supplied by the Credit Union treasurer indicated that the organization made 1320 loans during 1972, compared to 900 in 1971.

Total loans made during 1972 amounted to \$1,059,240.43. This represented over one-fifth of the total amount that the Credit Union has loaned out in its history - \$5,021,498.04.

The Credit Union had a total of 1521 accounts at the end of 1972, compared to 1189 at the end of the previous year.

The local financial institution recently paid out a total of \$15,644.03 to its members in dividends, compared to \$10,858.09 for the same six-month period of 1971.

The Credit Union did not pay an interest refund this year, due to expenses incurred in moving to its newly remodelled location at Sixth and Euclid Streets.



At Home In Parmer County

First article in a three-part series on small electrical appliances:

Save those papers! I am referring to important "papers" in the box with a small electrical appliance.

You should read every word before using the appliance. Read and heed registration cards first. Complete them and mail to the manufacturer. These cards let him know where the appliance was purchased and where the product is in case a safety defect makes it necessary for him to notify the owner. Sending the registration card also may speed servicing.

Guarantee or warranty papers are second on the reading list,

and they mean about the same thing. Learn what they promise in writing on product performance, such as "guaranteed not to tarnish" or "guaranteed to be free of defects in material or workmanship." Some promise specific action, such as repair, refund or replacement if the product fails to meet standards of quality or performance stated in the guarantee.

Read until you find the following six points:

- (1) What it guarantees. It should list parts covered.
- (2) How long it is guaranteed.

The entire appliance or different parts may be guaranteed for different time lengths.

(3) Manufacturer or seller promises. If product is defective, they may furnish parts and labor or parts only, and they may replace the entire product or refund purchase price.

(4) Steps owner must take to receive benefits the guarantee promises.

(5) Limitations or conditions of the guarantee. It may tell the owner to complete and mail the registration card.

(6) Name of firm offering the guarantee and name or title of party responsible for keeping its promises.

Another "paper" to read is the use and care booklet. Instructions aim at helping owners get the most satisfaction and use from the product. Read the booklet carefully, and follow directions to the letter. Keep the booklet in a safe place. Appliance life usually depends on the care it receives.

County Campaign Collects \$264

Mrs. Pearl Cervantez stated today that 26 lung research projects seeking medical knowledge and training to help victims of emphysema, asthma, and other respiratory diseases have been funded by Christmas Seal monies for the current year, leaving

21 other projects approved but as yet unfunded.

"The patient entering the hospital for emphysema, asthma or pneumonia often is desperately in need of the medical knowledge this research can provide," she said. She added that a recent survey of area hospitals showed 687 emphysema admissions, plus 806 patients suffering with both emphysema and chronic bronchitis for a one year period.

She urged Parmer County residents to answer their Christmas Seal letters as generously as possible for purposes of community health programs and to supply the needed research.

Mrs. Cervantez is a local director of the Top of Texas TB and Respiratory Disease Association, serving with Mrs. Cordie Vargas, and Mrs. Lucille Walling, also of Bovina. Thus far, Parmer County has contributed \$264.50 in 1972 Christmas Seal funds.

WHAT ABOUT THE YOUTH CULT?

At a time when our society desperately needs mature leadership and guidance, many capable older people are shirking their responsibilities because they are intimidated by the youth cult. Instead of assuming their natural roles as teachers for the young, many highly qualified adults simply drop out. Others make a pitiful attempt to leap the age barrier by affecting the dress, speech and mannerisms of the "Now" generation.

As a result, radical youngsters who haven't lived long enough to acquire either wisdom or judgment are stepping into the vacuum and emerging as sages of our time. Many parents really believe that their children are smarter than they are - perhaps because kids have achieved a sort of super sophistication from watching the tube, or from the mass media of other sorts.

But this is not the in-depth wisdom that comes from experience. There are some lessons that come from only time and experience. There's no book or documentary that can equal the experience of actually living an event. Adults have no reason to apologize for what they've done when the youth attack the Establishment. Middle aged Americans advanced civilization in this country farther than any generation in history. So why are we apologizing to a generation that has accomplished nothing? The "Now" generation did not develop space technology, put men on the moon, develop the Salk polio vaccine or advance medical science.

The older generation must first accept their responsibility to understand the young and then lead them. We can't expect the young to understand us anymore than we understand our parents. As older people we can understand what it is to be their age but they cannot understand what it is to be our age. What we must have if this society is to survive is a bridge of understanding. When we can effectively combine the experiences and knowledge of age with the new ideals, enthusiasm and energy of youth, we'll be able to build something of value and solve our problems. But if we don't find that understanding and cooperation, we may find it too late to put the pieces together.

OF INTEREST TO CATTLEMEN AND FEEDERS OF LIVESTOCK

Livestock is assessed for tax purposes according to its location on January 1st, regardless of the owner's residence. All livestock in the Bovina School District on January 1st of this year must be rendered by the owners or those in charge or possession. Taxes will be due the following Fall and payment should be made to this office.

PERSONAL PROPERTY IN THE CHARGE OR POSSESSION OF SOMEONE OTHER THAN THE OWNER SHALL BE ASSESSED TO THE PERSON HAVING IT IN CHARGE OR POSSESSION. (Art. 7160, 7152.) Therefore, if you have cattle on your property or if you are looking after someone else's cattle, you are responsible to this office for the owner's name and address and the number of cattle. Please get this information to this office as quickly as possible so that we may get the ownership confirmed or these cattle will be charged to you. As soon as the ownership of the cattle in your possession is confirmed you will have discharged your responsibility for the tax.

Since by law the rendering of property is the responsibility of the owner, it is hoped that the livestock will be properly rendered to the Tax Office by all owners. A 100% count is expected. This will prevent inconvenience and liability for feed lot operators and others in charge.

WHENEVER THE TAXPAYER REFUSES TO MAKE RENDITION OR TO SUBSCRIBE TO THE OATH, THE ASSESSOR SHALL PROCEED TO ASSESS THE PROPERTY OF SUCH TAXPAYER, AND THE ASSESSMENT SO MADE SHALL BE AS LEGAL AND BINDING AS IF RENDERED BY THE TAXPAYER, (Art. 7193.)

The eighth grade girls suffered the only loss of the evening at the hands of Kress' eighth grade, 10-25.

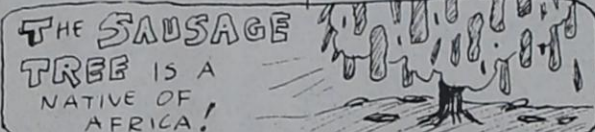
Tammy Christian sank eight points and Kim Ware two for the Bovina team. K. Street hit 10
