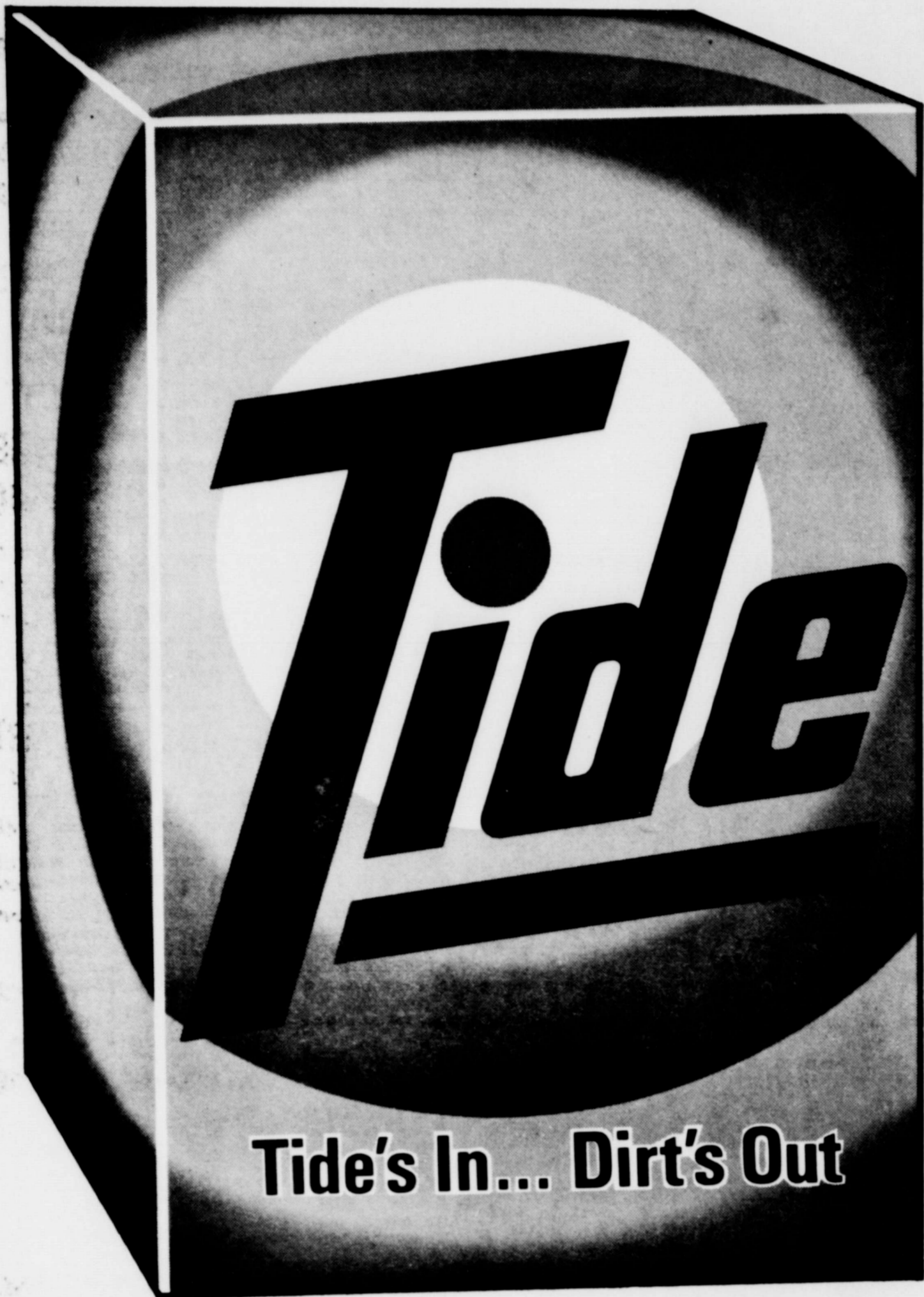

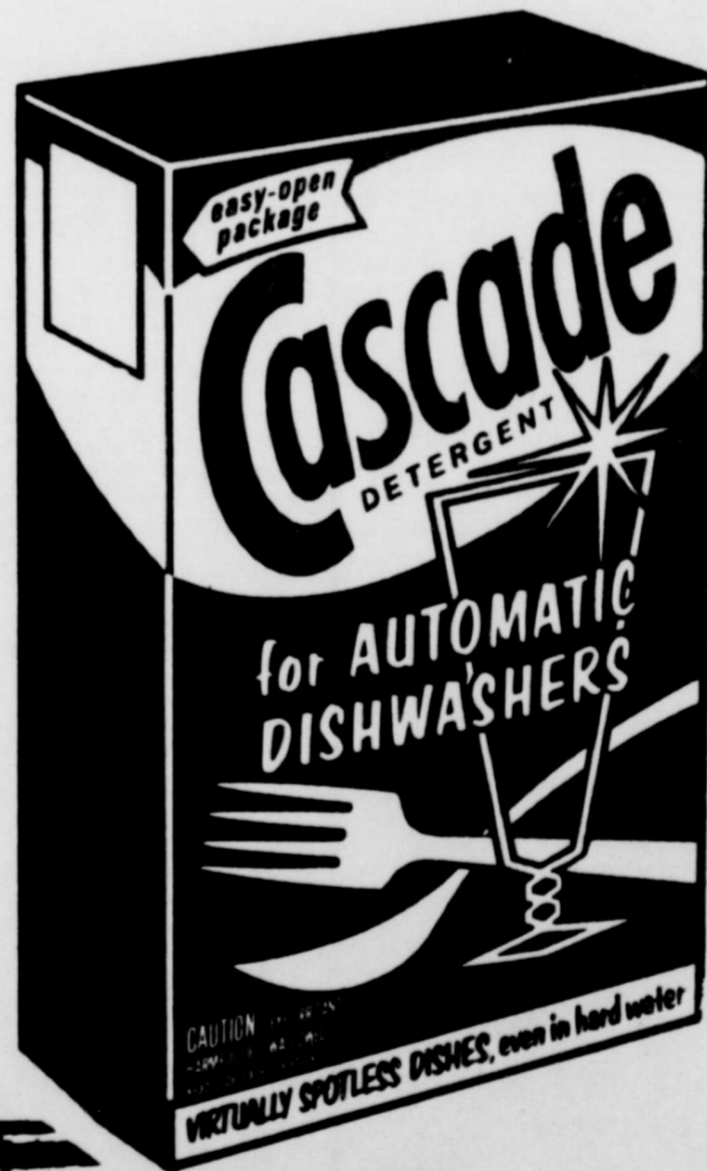

Just try walking more when you don't have to ride. Walking is a fine way to keep yourself in good shape. It stretches the muscles and gives your heart the exercise it needs.

### Grant Helps Expand Texas Tomato Breeding Program

Texas doesn't produce nearly enough tomatoes for its own use. You've probably noticed that shortage reflected in the high prices you pay at the supermarket for both fresh and processed tomatoes.

Texas once had a thriving tomato industry. However, because of high temperatures, high humidity, diseases and labor shortages for harvesting, the industry declined and moved to other states and foreign countries. But now Texas production is increasing, thanks to improved varieties developed recently by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Weslaco.

Funds granted by the H. J. Heinz Company to the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station will enable expansion of tomato breeding research by Paul W. Leeper, Associate Professor, at the Weslaco Research Center. These funds plus recent breakthroughs in tomato breeding will enable a three-fold increase in the Weslaco program and will aid in cooperative evaluation of the Weslaco developed lines in other states.

Dr. Jarvis E. Miller, Director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, states that release of all varieties to Texas growers as well as growers in other states will still be subject to decisions and actions of the Texas Station. Director Miller emphasizes that "the expanded program is expected to result in the development of improved varieties that benefit producers, processors, and especially consumers."

Leeper says that breeding emphasis will be placed on development of high-yielding, high-quality, disease-resistant varieties adapted to both processing and fresh market which will set fruit at extremely high temperature and high humidity conditions. All varieties will be adapted to machine harvest and should aid Texas growers in expanding the Texas industry.

The soundness of the approach to tomato breeding being carried out in this program is indicated by the eleven varieties developed and released which have proven to be useful to the Texas industry as well as tomato industries in other states and nations. Because of its wide adaptation to extreme weather conditions, Chico III, released in 1969, is now grown in more parts of the world than any other tomato variety. Chico III is the leading machine harvested variety in all U.S. tomato producing areas east of the Rocky Mountains and in Canada as well.
