School Board Sets Election, Hires Computer Firm

called for a trustee election April 5th at its Monday night session. Two members of the current board filed for reelection. Three members of the board have their terms expired this year. They are Bobby Toliver, Charles Jacobs and Johnny Teaff. The voters will also have to fill the unexpired term of Danny Doan, Doan resigned last month to take employment in San Angelo. His term has two years to run.

Superintendent Mack Fisher explained that persons wishing to run for trustee will have to indicate which place they wish to fill. The terms of the expiring board members will be for three years while the persons seeking Doan's unexpired term will be for two years. 'We will have to have two columns on the ballots. One for persons seeking the three year terms and one for persons seeking the two year term.

Filing for re-election were Bobby Toliver and Charles Jacobs. Persons wishing to file have until March 5 to

The Trustees also named the election judges for the April 5th election. The Judge for Tye and his helpers are Floyd Kimmey, judge, and Elva Holloway and Buna Kimmey, assistants, For Merkel. Bill Button was named judge with Mrs. Mary Russom, Nina Bell Hughes and Troy Sloan serving as assistants. There will be two boxes for voters. One will be at the Tye Elementary School and the Merkel box will be at the school gym. Absentee voting will be held at the Merkel City Hall.

The Board met with a representative of Wester Data Service Inc. of Waxahachie. The firm specializes in computer tax service. After a presentation by the firms representative, the board decided to have the firm put the Merkel Independent Schools tax roll on the computer. Cost will be about \$1,200 per year. Tax payers will receive notices similar to the ones Taylor County now uses. The firm also handles Taylor County. Mona Faye Bartlett also met with the board and said that she was pleased with the firm and that it would save her tax office a lot of work and

The Board met with a representative of the First Southwest Company of Abilene. The firm has served as financial advisor to the district in the past. Joe Smith told the trustees that the Mer-District was in excelat financial shape with just over \$150,000 in outstanding debt. He explained what the procedure would be should the district decide to have a bond issue for construction purposes. He said that should the Trustees decide on a bond issue they would be better served to have the bond maturing in as short a time as possible. He said that 10 to 15 years would offer the district the best advantage.

The board heard a proposal for a pre-fabricated building from Big Country Construction Co. of Abilene. The building would consist of 2,160 square feet and could be used as a new home economic building or a class room facility. Estimated cost would be \$22,788 for the home economic use and \$19,400 for class room use.

The board extended all the Merkel principals new three year contracts. They are Gene Stuckey Tye Elementary, John Cain, Merkel Elementray and Travis Davis, Merkel High School.



Taxpayers Urged To Use Labels

Taxpayers expecting refunds on their income tax can speed up those refunds by filing now and using the preaddressed label and envelope that came with their tax packages, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) said today.

Arthur Fogle, Director's Representative of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for the Abilene area, said taxpayers filing their returns now can expect to receive their refund within four to five weeks. Those who wait until March or April to file, he said, could face a delay of up to 12 weeks.

Fogle explained that the Austin Service Center can process returns faster if they arrive with the labels affixed

the IRS. The envises are magnetically code auto-. matic sorting and the preprinted labels are designed to save time in the actual processing of the return.

Even if you have moved or some information is printed incorrectly on the label, the IRS prefers for the taxpayer to simply correct the label rather than discarding it.

"We're obviously very busy at this time of year." Fogle said, "but we try to get the refunds back to taxpayers as soon as possible. With many people a little short of cash right now, we hope taxpayers will help themselves by using these time-saving features."

Plan Grazing System for Spring

ULVALDE-Ranchers looking for ways to ease the present pain in their pocketbooks should take a close look at an improved grazing system.

And the time to plana grazing program for the coming year is now, so that it will be ready to put it into practice by the time maximum forage growth begins in spring and early summer.

"A properly planned and operated grazing system can mean lower operating costs per head, better breeding efficiency, greater gains per acre, reduced costs for vehicles and labor, and reduced supplemental feeding," says Dr. Richard Bjerregaard, area range specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Most ranchers can initiate a deferred rotation grazing system with little or no initial expense if a moderate amount of cross-fencing and stock water development has already been done," points out Bjerregaard. "In some cases all that is required is to close gates between pastures and to move livestock from one pasture to the next in a planned time sequence that is compatible with management goals."

A grazing system need not be complicated, emphasizes the Texas A&M University System specialist. Two pastures and one herd make a working system. However, size and complexity depend on what a rancher wants to accomplish in terms of improved livestock and rangeland production in light of

available resources. "There are about as many grazing systems as there are livestock producers," notes Bjerregaard. "However, in every case the goal is the same; to grow more and better quality forage on fewer

acres at less expense." Information for planning and operating a successful grazing system is available from county Extension agents

is set at 72, and that is down two points from a month ago. All in all, it means continued declining prices for farmers, ranchers, dairymen, poultry producers, and others who are engaged in food and fiber production.

Officially, the all farm products index is at 433; this is a drop of 25 points or five per cent from a month ago and is 25 per cent under a year ago. The livestock index is 35 per cent below a year ago.

Perhaps the most significant thing about the price report is that all feed grains (oats excepted) showed declines. Continued downturns in feed grains can mean an increase later on in cattle on feed.

All classes of livestock except sheep are at below parity levels. Hogs are \$10 under parity; beef cattle are half of parity; calf prices are a third of parity; sheep are 40 cents

NATIONWIDE and Texaswide, cattle numbers are up as of Jan. 1. In Texas, the inventory of Texas cattle and calves totaled 16,600,00; this is two per cent above a year ago. And there were five per cent more calves born on Texas farms and ranches, which is five per cent above the previous

Nationwide, there is a three per cent increase in the cattle and calf category. But indications are that a decline in cattle numbers will continue through 1975.

A 53 PER CENT decline in sheep and lamb feeding is reported in Texas Feb. 1 compared to a year ago. Placements during January totaled 24,000 head. Marketings are 49 per cent below those sold during January

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
