

Abilene Savings Applies For Merkel Branch


Abilene Savings and Loan Association of Abilene has filed and amended application with the Savings and Loan Commissioner for permission to open a branch office in Merkel.

Merkel Gets \$5,330.45 In Sales Tax

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AUSTIN - Comptroller Bob Bullock surprised 809 Texas towns and cities Thursday with \$64.1 million in quarterly city sales tax payments coming a full month earlier than usual.

"I said we would speed up the payments and we did," Bullock said.

The payments covered the October-Decmeber, 1974, quarter. Last year payments for that quarter were sent on March 25.

The City of Merkel received \$5,330.45. Bullock said the early pay-

ment will help all cities with cash flow problems but he so noted that the total pay-was worth some \$40,000 a one month's interest alone if the cities simply invested the money.

In a letter accompanying the checks to the cities, Bullock said he will try to further improve the service and said his office is continuing to work on a plan to make payments more frequently

than once a quarter. Speedier handling of the city money was one of Bullock's primary issues in his election campaign.

The \$64.1 million for the October - December, 1974, quarter compared to \$58.7 million for the Christmas shopping quarter of 1973.

"High costs of machinery, fuels and fertilizer now require the farmer to invest up to \$300 per acre in their 1975 corn crop, and as much as \$200 per acre in wheat. They must get high enough returns to pay for these when they sell their commodities. If they don't buy these farm inputs, then lower production will result in scarcity and higher costs to all consumers. The farmer's problem today is the consumer's problem tomorrow."

"The U.S. Department of Agriculture recommendation that farmers produce from fence to fence is reckless and foolish in the absence of price floors to assure fair returns over the costs of production," the statement said. "Leaders of labor and consumer groups have expressed their concern over the current situation - and the problems that will be created for urban consumers. They are looking to farmers leadership to give guidance to the farm portion of a commonsense national food policy. The Farmers Union calls on all farm, labor, and consumer groups to join in the project."

SCHOOL PLANS IN

Governor Briscoe's school finance revision plan hit legislative hoppers this week, and committees of both houses prepared to begin hearings on the high priority topic soon.

Briscoe's bill calls for a weighed pupil" approach to distributing state aid and would cost \$589.9 million during the next biennium (\$919.9 million overall).

Cost compares with \$2.7 billion for the Texas State Teachers Assiciation school finance bill and about \$1 billion for one proposed by Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale, former House Education chairman.

Briscoe proposed to increase teacher salaries from \$6,600 a year to \$7,430 during the next year and \$7,840 the next. TSTA is aiming for \$10,000 a year starting teacher salary and Kubiak recommended \$8,400.
