Come to think of it, I believe it rained on us a little bit coming back home from the hospital.

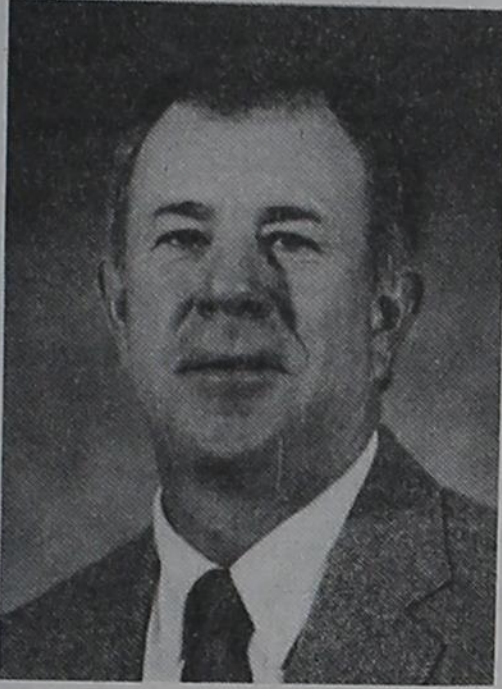

WT Rural Telephone Sets Annual Meeting

The fortieth annual membership meeting of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative will be held Tuesday, March 22 at the Hereford Bull Barn.

Among highlights of the event will be a barbecued beef and sausage dinner catered by K-Bob's of Hereford, beginning at 6 p.m.

Entertainment will be provided by The Texas Country, a Hereford group which performs country, bluegrass, gospel and 1950s music. Members include Billy, Kristi and Jo Jo Lytal, Natalie Sims, Weldon Stephan, Paul Guerrero and Eddie Gallagher.

A business meeting, which will include election of directors for the Dawn exchange in Deaf Smith County and the Hub and Parmer exchanges in Parmer County, review of financial reports and drawings for over \$1,000 in door prizes, begins at 7 p.m.

The terms of incumbent directors, Dick Fellers of Dawn, Charles Myers, Jr. of Hub and Floyd Schueler of Parmer are expiring.

Cooperative members from all nine exchanges are eligible to vote in the election. In keeping with the by-laws of the cooperative, a nominating committee composed of representatives from the nine exchanges in the WTRT system met on January 15 to propose two nominees for each of the director posts.

Incumbent directors are eligible for re-election and all three incumbents were nominated. Also nominated were Roy Johnson from the Dawn exchange, Terry Copley from the Hub exchange and Butch Preston from the Parmer exchange.

Fellers has represented the Dawn exchange on the board since 1984 and has served as board secretary and vice president. He has been a cooperative member since 1968. He is engaged in family farming in the Dawn area along with sons, Randy and Will, and wife, Pam. He is a board member of the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association and the First State Bank of Happy.

Johnson is a lifetime resident of Dawn, where he farms with his brothers, Ronnie and Jerry. He is a member of the board of directors of Hi-Plains Industries, Inc. of Dawn and has served as secretary of that board. He is a member of the Dawn Volunteer Fire Department and a deacon and member of the board of the Dawn Baptist Church.

Myers, a farmer in the Hub area of Parmer County, has served as the director for the Hub exchange since 1973 and has held the offices of president, vice president and secretary/treasurer during that time. He serves on the Program Planning Committee of the National Telephone Cooperative Association, which he chaired for several years,

and is a member of the Economic Development and Finance Committee of the NTCA. He is a board member of the Parmer County Farm Bureau.

Copley operates a hog farm southeast of Friona and is a self-employed building contractor. He served as plant manager for Panhandle Concrete Company in Friona for 23 years. He has served as superintendent and assistant superintendent of the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show, serves as an adult 4-H leader and has been active in coaching youth sports.

Schueler has served as the director on the WTRT board for the Parmer exchange since 1985, and has held the office of secretary/treasurer. He farms near Friona and is a lifelong resident of Parmer County. He is also a member of the Rhea/Hollene Volunteer Fire Department.

Preston farms northeast of Friona, having come to Parmer County at the age of 20. He is a deacon in the Calvary Baptist Church at Friona and serves as vice president of the Friona School Board.

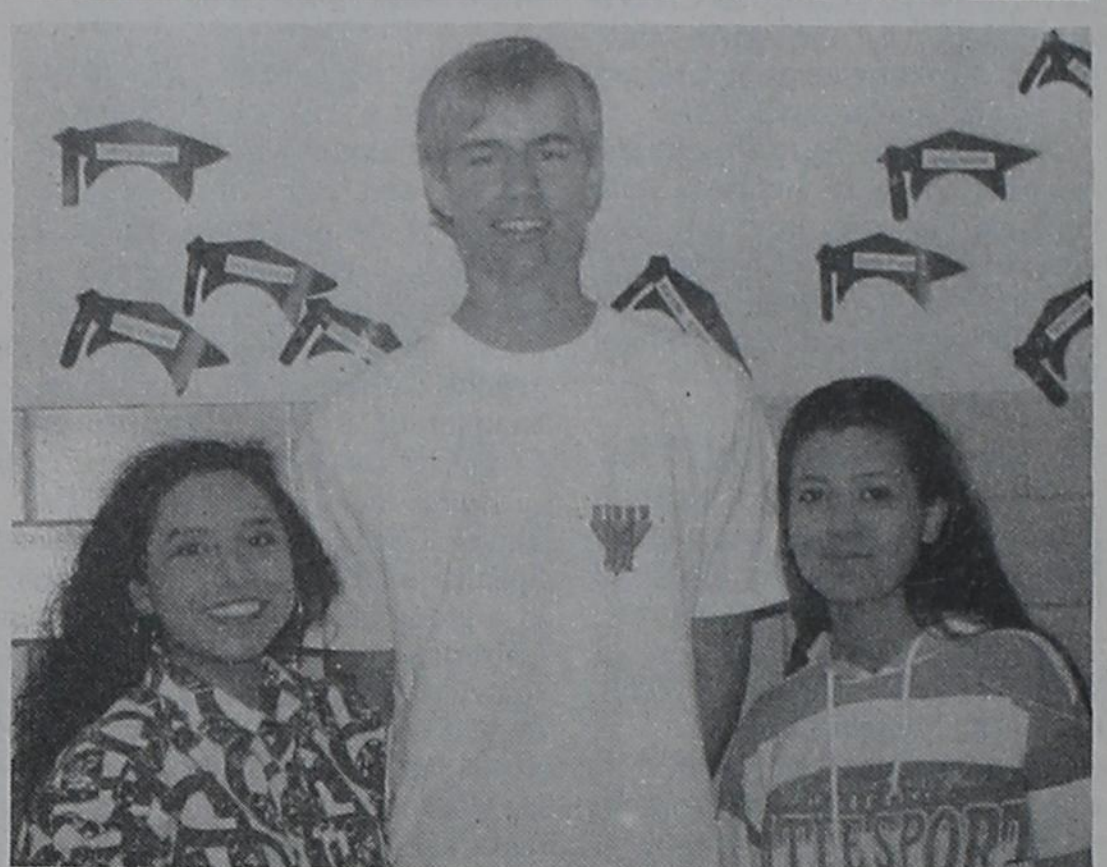

Sam Sides Receives 50-Year Lodge Honor

A longtime resident of the Oklahoma Lane Community, Sam Sides, 95, was honored by the Grand Lodge of Texas and Farwell Lodge #977 in Bovina on Tuesday evening with a 50-year service certificate and pin.

Sides is now a resident of King's Manor in Hereford. He has lived in the Deaf Smith county seat since 1955.

He was born September 26, 1898, at Springtown, in Parker County, Texas. Sides moved with his family to Young County in 1906, and a year later to Burkburnett in Wichita County.

He came to Parmer County in December of 1925, and married Janie Palm December 21, 1926. The couple farmed in the Oklahoma Lane Community until his retirement 39 years ago.

"I've been a subscriber to your Bovina Blade ever since it started, and I never miss an issue," Sides said in an interview with publisher Bill Ellis this week.

He calls the last 100 years "the most exciting in history. There's never been anything like it."

Like other folks who have gone from the horse and buggy era to the space age, Sides is amazed at the accomplishments of his lifetime.

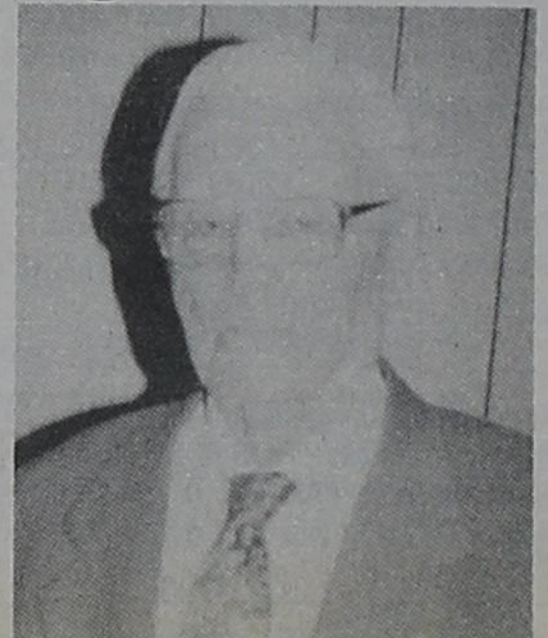
"The trip to the moon and invention of television are the most important, I think," said the retired farmer. Television is especially important to him now, since he is somewhat limited in other activities.

"I watch lots of sports," he said. "Especially the Dallas Cowboys." He was especially pleased to be able to root the Cowboys to their second Super Bowl title this season.

"One of the reasons I moved to Hereford when I retired was the fact that out at Oklahoma Lane, our TV reception was not too good, and very limited. Also, I enjoyed watching the W.T. football team, and I was much closer at Hereford. I used to go to all their games," the oldtimer said.

"I used to go to all the games," he said, "but, when I got to be 90, I had to curtail my activities."

After he left farming, he took up fishing and spent many miles on the road, pulling a boat, to good

fishing holes. But, nowadays he puts out a line only while visiting family in the Victoria area.

"My grandson called me the other day and asked me to go fishing with him and his boys in Montana but I told him I couldn't go," he said. "That's too far from home for me."

Sides and his wife were married 66 years before her death in 1988. He's lived at King's Manor the last few years.

Sides enjoys a game of dominoes, or 42. But he passes many enjoyable hours in front of the television set.

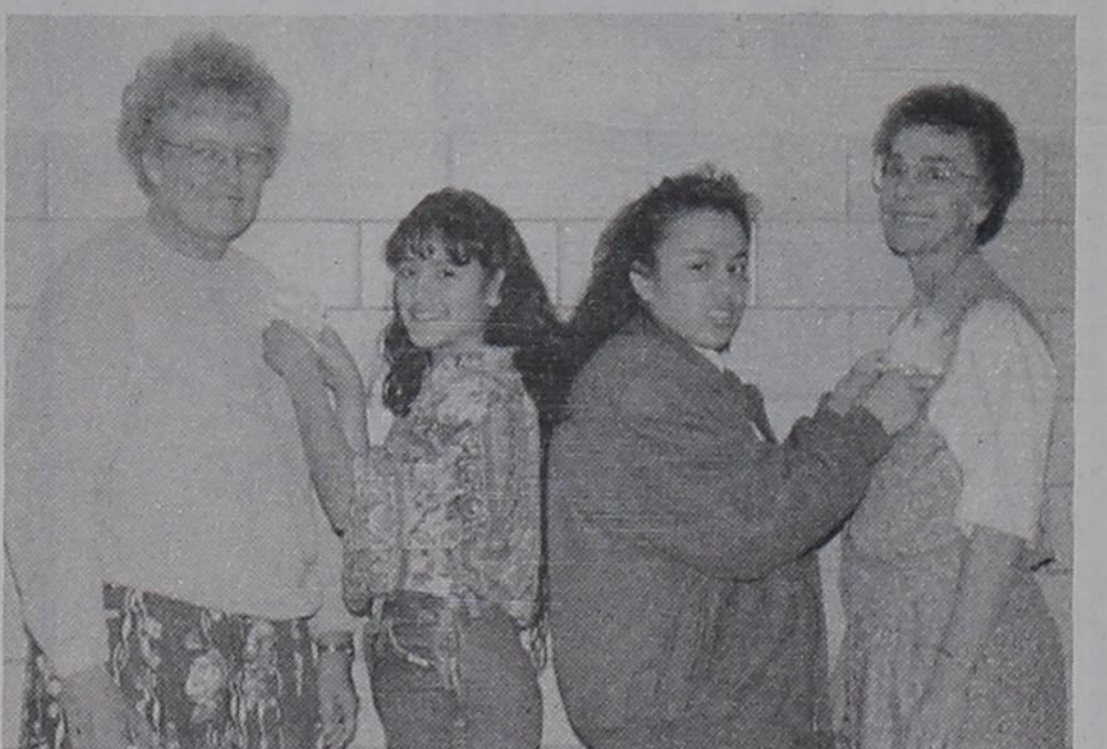
"It's wonderful...you can go from one thing to another just by touching the button on the remote control," he said.

Since his birth during the McKinley Administration, 17 other men have taken the oath as President; two World Wars were fought but didn't succeed in "ending all wars" as hoped; men have hurtled into space and come back to earth, and the miracle of television brings the latest news and sports into the living room instantaneously.

Sides views these accomplishments with some amazement.

"But the biggest surprise of all is I never expected to live to be 95 years old," he laughed.

Commerce as "Teacher of the Year".

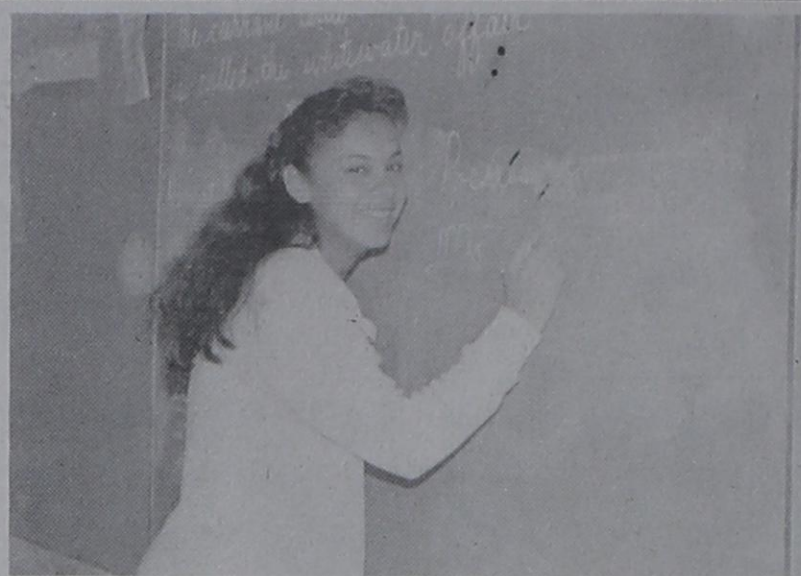

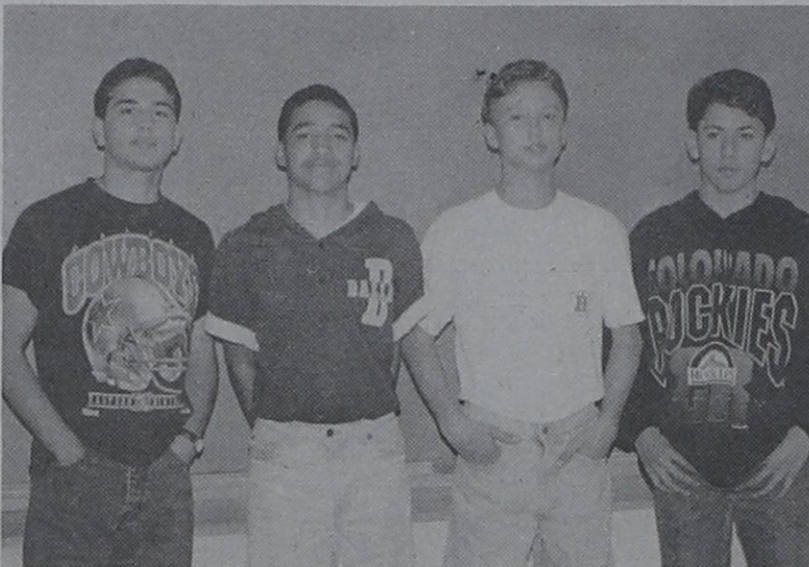

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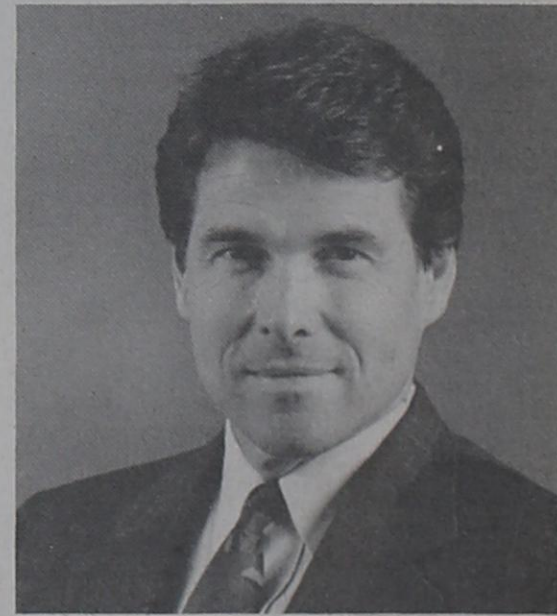

Happy Homemaker

Thanks to a suggestion by an out-of-town reader, the Happy Homemaker is taking on a new dimension. She suggested that we make the column an exchange of household and gardening hints, interesting tidbits and other information.

If any of our other readers need something or have something to share, just let us know and we will pass it on.

By the way, if you'd rather we didn't use your name, please make a note of it. Otherwise, we'll presume it is all right to use it.

This sounds like a very good idea to me. After all, isn't that what being a good homemaker is all about—sharing recipes, cooking and baking hints, gardening suggestions and other items of interest?

In addition to making this suggestion, our reader requested three recipes. She is a former Friona resident and wrote, "Do you have the recipe Decimae Beene used for yeast rolls?"

Her letter continued, "Her rolls were so delicious and she was very generous in sharing them with others. Very often, she would pop in with a pan of raised rolls just ready to put in the oven about lunch time."

My answer to that question is positive. The Floyd family just happened to be one of the many lucky ones she shared rolls with and we've had the recipe many years.

We call it "Decimae Rolls" and here it is:
 2/3 cup sugar
 1/4 cup shortening
 1 teaspoon salt
 2-1/2 cups hot water
 3 well beaten eggs
 1 package dry yeast
 6-8 cups flour

Mix sugar, shortening and salt. Add hot water, stir well and let cool. Add eggs. Dissolve yeast in small amount of lukewarm water and mix well. Add flour. Refrigerate overnight. Keeps very well.

We use this recipe for cinnamon or other sweet rolls and like it very much.

She also wrote, "I would like to have a recipe for an oriental 'pile on' that we enjoyed about 20 years ago. It was served at a party and each guest was asked to bring one item to contribute to the meal. Some of the ingredients I remember were chow mein noodles, cashews,

pineapple, bean sprouts and chicken. Then, my memory fades out. If any of your readers could furnish me with the recipe by sending it to you for publication, I would appreciate it."

Now, folks, we need your help. Maybe some of you were at that same party, or know about the ingredients needed to finish it. If so, please send them to me.

Her third request was for "Play Doh."

I don't have one with that particular name. However, I do have the following, which is called "Creative Dough."

1 cup all-purpose flour
 2 teaspoons cream of tartar
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 cup water
 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
 1 teaspoon vanilla, if desired
 About 15 drops favorite food coloring

Cook all ingredients in 1-1/2 quart saucepan over medium heat 4 to 5 minutes, stirring vigorously, until mixture forms a ball. Remove dough from saucepan and let stand on counter 5 minutes. Knead dough about 30 seconds or until smooth and blended. Cool completely. Store in airtight container in refrigerator.

Another out-of-town reader sent the following cobbler recipe. I've not tried it yet, but it seems that nothing could be simpler.

MEXICAN COBBLER
 1 can apple pie filling
 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 12 flour tortillas
 1-1/2 cup water
 2 cups sugar
 1/2 cup oleo

You may need to chop apples. Put 1-2 tablespoons filling in each tortilla. Sprinkle with cinnamon and roll. Place in baking dish. Heat water, sugar and oleo until oleo melts. Pour over rolled tortillas. Cover and chill overnight. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

She added, "We have let it set as little as 4-6 hours and have also baked it immediately after getting it prepared. Cherry, apricot, blueberry or whatever pie filling would probably be just as tasty."

About ten years ago, the American Heart Association sponsored a "Cooking For a Healthy Heart" seminar in Amarillo. It was conducted by

Irene Keating, Potter County's home economist.

At the close of the seminar, the attendees were presented a leaflet containing some of the recipes which had been recommended during the course. Three of my favorites are being shared with you this week. Here they are:

DATE-NUT ORANGE BREAD
 2 cups pitted and chopped dates
 1/2 cup boiling water
 1 medium orange
 1/3 cup sugar
 1 egg or equivalent egg substitute
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
 1 cup white flour
 1 cup whole wheat flour, minus 2 tablespoons
 1 teaspoon baking soda
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 to 1 cup chopped walnuts

Pit, chop and cover dates with boiling water and set aside. Grate the rind of the orange. Peel off and discard the white membrane of the orange. Cut up pulp, remove seeds and blend in blender until nearly smooth. Combine date and water mixture, orange rind and orange pulp. Add sugar, egg (or egg substitute), extract and oil. Mix thoroughly. Sift together flour, baking soda and salt. Add to wet ingredients. Stir until moist. Fold in chopped nuts. Fill two small (approximately 7-1/2 x 3-1/2 inch) loaf pans about half full. Bake at 325 degrees 35 minutes or until toothpick inserted in middle of loaf comes out clean. Yields 2 small loaves, approximately 124 calories per serving.

APPLE BRAN MUFFINS
 3 cups raisin bran flakes
 1-1/4 cup skim milk
 1/2 cup cooking oil
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 eggs
 2 cups flour (1 cup may be whole wheat flour)
 1 tablespoon baking powder
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 cup chopped apple

Combine cereal and milk. Let stand until softened. Add oil, sugar and eggs. Add combined dry ingredients, mixing just until moistened. Fold in apples. Spoon into greased (I use Pam) muffin pans. Bake at 400 degrees until done about 15 to 20 minutes. Makes 24 muffins. Muffins can be frozen and reheated in the microwave.

PEPPER STEAK
 1 pound lean boneless sirloin steak, trimmed
 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
 1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon ground ginger
 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 3 large green peppers (or 2 green and 1 red), cut in strips
 2 large onions, thinly sliced
 1/4 cup soy sauce
 1/2 teaspoon sugar
 3/4 cup beef broth
 6 ounces water chestnuts, sliced (optional)
 1 tablespoon constarch
 1/4 cup cold water
 4 green onions, cut in 1/2 inch pieces

Freeze steak for 1 hour to make it easier to slice. Cut slices 1/8 inch thick across grain. Heat oil in skillet. Add garlic, salt, pepper and ginger. Saute until garlic is golden. Add steak slices and brown lightly 2 minutes, remove meat. In same pan, add green peppers and onions. Cook 3 minutes. Return beef to pan, add soy sauce, sugar, broth, water chestnuts, constarch dissolved in cold water and green onions. Simmer about 2 minutes until sauce thickens. Serve over hot cooked rice. Yields 6 servings, approximately 230 calories per serving.

The following two recipes were left overs from my previous two columns and I thought you would enjoy them. They came from Friona State Bank's cookbook of its customers' favorite recipes.

FROZEN DESSERT
 By Nita Clark
 1-16 ounce can cranberry sauce
 1 package (12 ounce) small marshmallows
 2 (1/2 pints) whipping cream
 1/2 cup nuts
 2 ripe bananas (mashed)
 Whip cream until stiff, adding 2 tablespoons sugar. Stir in cranberry sauce, small marshmallows, mashed bananas and nuts. (Save out 1 cup of marshmallows to line a 13"x9" pan.) Pour mixture over marshmallows and freeze for at least 6 to 8 hours before

serving.

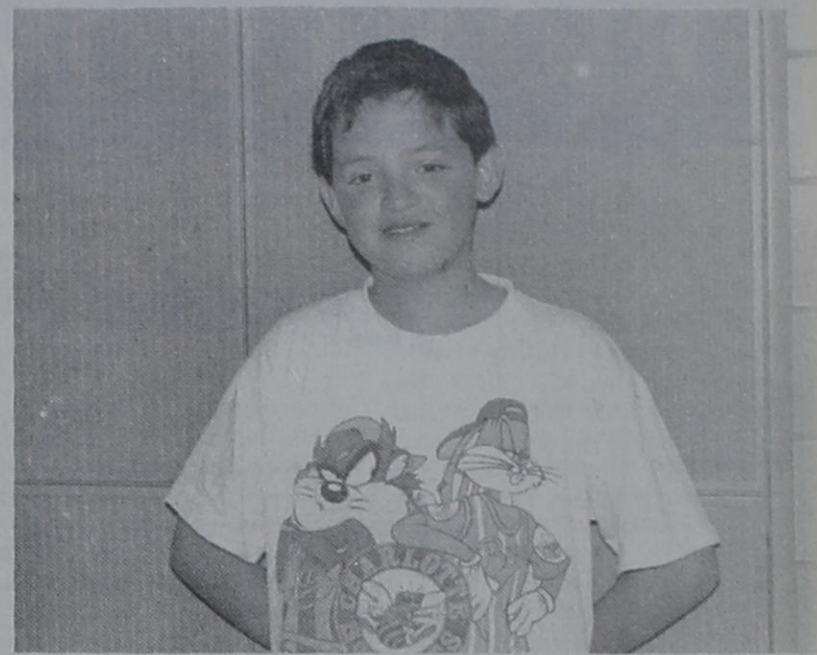
FRUIT ROLL

 1-14 ounce can (sweetened condensed) Eagle Brand milk
 4 tablespoons lemon juice
 1 cup glazed (candied) cherries
 1 cup candied pineapple
 1 pound package dates (pitted and chopped)
 1 cup nuts (walnuts or pecans)
 1/2 pound miniature marshmallows
 1/2 pound graham crackers

(Take out 10 crackers and roll fine for covering.) Roll remaining crackers rather coarse.

Mix Eagle Brand milk and lemon juice well. Add cherries, pineapple, dates, nuts, marshmallows and coarsely rolled graham crackers. Mix well. (Best to mix with hands.) Form into 2 rolls and cover with finely rolled crackers. Roll until all cracker crumbs are used up. Store in refrigerator. Will keep in refrigerator from 3 to 4 weeks. Freezes well.
