Natural Gas Rates To **Increase**

Lone Star Gas Company has established new industrial gas rate schedules for all its standard industrial contracts in the state of Texas, with the exception of Dallas and Irving. The new rates will apply to approximately 3,400 Texas industrial customers that presently receive the Company's services. Lone Star anticipates the new rates to increase revenues by \$9.9 million annually when fully effective based upon sales volumes to these customers during the twelve months ended September 30,

Filings have been made with the cities of Dallas and Irving and upon approval by their respective city councils, new industrial rates will be implemented in those cities.

The new industrial gas rates will apply immediately to new contracts and will be effective after January 1. 1976, on the anniversary dates of existing contracts which will expire throughout the calendar year.

It is said to be airtight and indestructible by the elements of time.

Sam Swann Killed In

An 83-year-old Merkel man, Samuel Dean (Sam) Swann, was killed in a twocar collision at 10:20 a.m. Saturday three miles west of Wichita Falls at the intersection of Farm. 369 and Loop

The Department of Public Safety reported that Swann was going north of Farm 369 when his car was in collision with a car driven by Tyra Wilkinson of Iowa Park, which

was east-bound on Loop 370. Swann was pronounced dead at the scene. The woman was listed in good condition Saturday night at Wichita Falls General Hospital with a head injury.

Mr. Swann was well-known in Texas and the nation as a Polled Hereford breeder.

Services were at 2 p.m. Tuesday in First Baptist Church of Merkel. Burial was at Rose Hill Cemetery, directed by Starbuck Funeral Home.

Born December 22, 1892, in Taylor County and moved to Merkel with his family in 1905.

He finished school in Merkel in 1912, attended Byrnes Business College in Tyler and went to work for Farmers State Bank in Merkel as a bookkeeper in 1913.

He married Agnes Powell of Leonard August 8, 1919. Mrs. Swann died December 12. 1966.

Mr. Swann had claim to the oldest Polled Hereford operation in the world in the continuation of an operation started by his father in 1905.

He worked at Farmers State Bank until 1918, when he resigned as assistant cashier to serve in World War I. He accepted a position as auditor of First National Bank in Wichita Falls in 1919. He returned to the Merkel bank in 1920 and became cashier of Guaranty State Bank in Abilene the same year.

He resigned from the Abilene bank in 1922 to operate a cotton gin at Merkel. He ran the gin until 1935 and was president of the West Texas Cotton Ginners Association in 1928.

Accident Near Wichita Falls Merkel Time Capsule Sealed

An early morning blaze claimed the contents of Castille Hardware in downtown Merkel Monday, November 24. The blaze was discovered by the Jerry Byrds when a noise awoke them around 5 a.m. According to Byrd the noise sounded like something inside the store exploded. Mrs. Byrd called the owner of the business, Mrs. Pat Castille who in turn called the Merkel Fire Department.

Merkel Fire Chief, Waymon Adcock and 15 Merkel volunteer firemen were on the scene in a matter of minutes and had the fire extinguished by 7 a.m. "Those three or four minutes it took the fire department to get there seemed like hours," stated Byrd Monday night.

Little, if anything, can be salvaged from the burned structure according to Fire Chief Adcock. Primary estimation of damage is in the \$45,000 range, however a definite dollar figure won't be known until investigation is complete. or two, in a child's development can make quite a difference in that child's ability to cope with toys. "That's the reason manufacturers are required to place pre-cautionary labeling on toys," says Harold Ray, director of the Department's Division of Product Safety. "Consumers should look

for the warning label on a toy which states that the toy isn't recommended for a child under a certain age," Ray said. "If such a label warns that the toy is too advanced for the child in mind, the purchaser should heed the warning and find one to fit the child."

Ray noted that a testing process has been used in determining the right toy for the right child. During the past year the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission issued final regulations for use and abuse testing of toys. While not banning toys, the regulations provide tests for impact, bite, Flexure, torque, tension and compression -- 211 of which simulate normal and reasonably forseeable use, damage and abuse of toys, games and other articles by children at play. These testing levels were used reflecting the ages of children for whom the toys are intended. These age

Toy buyers in the family should reject those with obvious hazards -- sharp points; rough or unfinished surfaces; small, detachable parts that may be swallowed; brittle plastic or glass that breaks easily and leaves sharp edges that may cut; poorly constructed toys with sharp spikes or pins that are exposed when the toy is pulled apart by a curious child; toys with triggers, gears, or other parts activated by a spring or motor that may

pinch fingers or catch hair. Most of these types of toys have been eliminated through Consumer Product Safety Commission standards. But, some 5,000 new toys enter the marketplace each year. The holiday season will find more than 150,000 different kinds of toys for sale in an estimated one million retail outlets. Despite the efforts of toy manufacturers, retailers, state and federal inspectors and different gov-

ernmental agencies, it is impossible to inspect every toy. It is possible, however, for parents, relatives, friends pleasure to their young and older sisters and owners. brothers to check every new toy they buy and every old toy around the house for possible hazards.

There are some specific things you can do in thinking toy safety. These suggestions include:

*Buy toys that suit the

*Watch out for toys that have sharp edges, small parts or sharp points.

*Avoid toys that produce extremely loud noises that can damage hearing, as well as propelled objects that can injure eyes.



AUSTIN - State government ended its 1975 fiscal year with a record cash surplus of more than \$1.4 billion, but if the legislature continues its spending ways it may not last long.

This was the good news and the bad news of Comptroller Bob Bullock last week as he released his annual financial report for the fiscal year which closed August 31.

"We're in the best shape ever for now," said Bullock. 'But our analysis consistently shows that if spending increases as ususal in 1977, we will face a tax bill in the \$1 billion range."

The Legislature this year passed a \$12.1 billion biennial appropriations bill.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe and others have predicted that, with reasonable economies and continuing high yield from sales and oil and gas taxes, a major state tax bill can be avoided in 1977 as in the last two legislatures.

Bullock said the state had \$6.9 billion in the last fiscal year to meet an expenditure level of \$5.5 bill-

Revenues, the Comptroller said, increased 13 per cent over 1974 income reaching \$5.7 billion.

'The real story," said Bullock, "is that revenue increased because of inflationary prices while the tax base remained the same. Spending jumped 21 per cent over the previous year. If legislators want to increase spending another 25 to 30 per cent in the next biennium, they had better have that billion dollar tax bill ready.

GOP Moving

Texas Republicans outlined major plans for 1976 campaign activities at a meeting here recently.

The State GOP Executive approved Committee Chairman Ray Hutchison's proposal to establish a powerful new executive campaign committee and central political fund.

Special recruiting committees were also appointed to seek out qualified congressional and legislative candidates.

Republicans decided to conduct their presidential preference primary on a congressional district basis. Ninety-six of the 100 GOP presidential nominating delegates will be elected at the polls May 1, and only four will be picked at the June 19 state party conven-

tion in Fort Worth. Mrs. Pat Archer, wife of Houston Congressman Bill Archer, was elected new GOP National Committeewoman to succeed Mrs. Rita Bass Clements of Dal-

las who resigned. **Hutchison** named Ernest Angelo of Midland to head the new 15-member GOP executive campaign committee. Bob Flournoy of Lufkin was designated vice

The Consumer Alert

by John L. Hill Attorney General

AUSTIN-A number of Texans will be shopping for new or used cars this fall. Most are aware that one important indicator of how much wear and tear a car has received is the number of

Of course, if an odometer reading has been altered, the ability to assess the car's value, reliability, and safety is impaired.

miles shown on the odometer.

But what some car-shopping consumers may not be aware of is that since 1973 the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act has provided protection against sellers who disconnect, turn back, or reset the odometer of any car or truck so as to reduce the number of miles shown.

Anyone who suspects odometer tampering should contact our Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division immediately. If they are correct, the law provides that the seller can be enjoined from such practices and that the buyer is entitled to restitution. Or a consumer can consult a private attorney and collect three times the amount of damages, plus attorney's fees and court costs, if a judge finds the suit is valid.

Our lawyers have won a court judgment against a car dealer who was picking up new cars in one city, unhooking the odometers, driving them to another city several hundred miles away, and selling them there as brand-new cars with little or no mileage on them.

And we've received reports of a few dealers who routinely unhook odometers on demonstrator cars, use them for test drives or as personal transportation, then sell them as new when they may have several hundred or thousand miles on

Sometimes used car shoppers discover a "bargain"-a car several years old with a minimal number of miles on it. Such a car may have had its odometer "rolled back" to show far fewer miles than it actually has.

In addition to protection from such deception under Texas law, there is a federal law that requires anyonedealer or individual-who sells a new or used car to give the buyer an odometer "disclosure statement" which gives the car's true mileage reading and a statement that the information is correct. If the seller doesn't know the true mileage, he must declare that it is unknown. Then if a consumer can prove he was sold a car by someone who violated these requirements, or gave false information, he

can collect three times his damages or \$1,500, whichever is greater, plus attorney's fees and court costs.

But even with protection under both state and federal laws, it's still better to avoid problems with false odometer readings. Our Consumer Protection attorneys recommend the following precautions:

*Trade with a reputable dealer or individual and get an odometer disclosure state-

ment. *Be suspicious if the speedometer and odometer aren't working when you test-drive a

new or used car. "If a car looks "well-worn" but the mileage is low, be suspicious of possible odom-

eter tampering. "Get a history of a used car's title from the Texas Highway Department's motor vehicle registration division. Then check with previous owners if possible for information on the car and its mileage.

Texas Taxes

Austin-There is frequently confusion among retail merchants about the use of sales tax Exemption Certificates and Resale Certificates.

A Resale Certificate can be used only by a person or business holding a valid sales tax permit and buying an otherwise taxable item from another person or business holding a sales tax permit.

An example of this might be a small auto repair shop buying parts from a large store or distributor who does both wholesale and retail business. The auto repair shop -- which would have a sales tax permit -- would give the distributor a Resale Certificate and not pay sales

tax on the parts purchased. The repair shop would then sell the parts to its customers, charging them the sales tax and remitting it to the state. The distributor, meanwhile, would use the Resale Certificate to prove to the state why that amount of his sales weren't taxed.

The Comptroller's Department has a suggested form for the Resale Certificate and usable copies are usually available at business houses which deal in both wholesale and retail. The important line on the form is the sales tax permit number of the buyer.

Persons dealing in both wholesale and retail should never let a customer sign a Resale Certificate unless the customer can provide his sales tax permit number.


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
