Forty thousand pounds of tomatoes per year will be grown in Merkel for sale commercially starting this year in a complex of greenhouses to be opened by Dwain Burnett of Merkel and Lynn Talley of Abilene.


The two men have started building four greenhouses, each 36 feet wide by 96 feet long, at the corner of Fifth and Haynes in Merkel. By March, they will have planted 2,000 tomato plants in the greenhouses, and will begin harvesting tomatoes from them in June. Each plant is expected to yield 20 pounds of Flordale tomatoes annually. Expected growing time is 120 days. The product will at first be sold directly to supermarkets, Burnett said. Total investment for the venture will run about \$20,000, Burnett noted.

Burnett, a sales representative for National Cash Register, Inc. in Abilene, is a new Merkel resident, hav-


ing moved here January 5. Burnett said that the new company might sell the culls, the imperfectly shaped tomatoes which taste the same as the perfectly shaped fruit, to the public at a price somewhat cheaper than tomatoes can be bought on a retail basis.

Both men said their whole families will be involved in the venture. . . "especially around picking time," Burnett grinned.

Burnett said he foresees a need for at least one fulltime worker to be hired by the operation in the future

Doctor **Rongers**' Column

Hypertension or high blood pressure is the largest contributing cause of death in the United States today. Most of the 24 million Americans who have hypertension don't know that they have it. And those who know it, too often

neglect it. Everyone has blood pressure. Blood pressure is simply the pressure exerted against the walls of the artery by the blood as it flows to

all parts of the body. Blood pressure varies from day to day and from minute to minute. It goes up when we get excited and it goes down when we rest or sleep. These changes are perfectly normal. They take place in people with high blood pressure, low blood pressure and in those whose blood pressure is in between. There is a considerable range of normal pressure from 90/60 up to 140/90. But when pressure goes much above that and remains elevated, a person is considered to have high

blood pressure or hypertension. Hypertension puts an extra share of work on the heart and arteries. The heart must pump with increased force and the arteries must carry blood that is moving under increased pressure. When high blood pressure is present for long periods, the heart enlarges. Eventually, under the continued strain, the heart weakens, loses efficiency, and pumps less blood with each beat. The kidneys, unable to function properly due to reduced blood flow, fail to excrete enough fluids, and tissues become water logged, adding still

more to the burden of the heart. The arteries of the body, including the heart and brain become injured by the excessive pounding of high blood pressure. When arteries becomedamaged, there is an increased rate of development

within the walls of the arteries. These arteries become clogged by the fatty deposits and choke off blood supply to the heart, brain or kidneys, leading to heart at-

tack, stroke or kidney failure, How can you tell if you have hypertension? You can't, Many people with hypertension have no symptoms at It is simple for a physic to detect but not for the pson to know he has it people were aware of dangers of high blood prosure, it wouldn't be so di ficult to get them to have

regular blood pressure check-ups. Despit e the seriou. dangers of hypertension, not everyone with a slight elevation of blood pressure needs immediate medication, Such a condition may call only for increased watchfulness, and often can be overcome by weight reduction or reduction

of salt intake. If you know you have hypertension, here are some general rules to follow:

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

About Half Of Normal . . . Crying Time? . . . April 15 Important To Agriculture . . . Exports Significant For Livestock.

Take a look at the rainfall totals for various crop reporting districts in Texas and you can understand why many of the state's farmers are worried about lack of

More than half of the crop reporting districts report rainfall at half of normal for the last three months of 1975. And according to statistics for the first half of January in the state, only the east Texas area has had as much as a half inch.

Only the southern half of the Low Plains and the Upper Coastal Bend section of the state reported above normal rainfall during the late fall and winter months. The far west Texas area had only a third of normal rain during

Due to lack of rain, wheat on the High and Low Plains is furnishing very little grazing with the exception of irrigated stands. Oats are also at a standstill in many areas of the state due to lack of rain.

Although crop producers can wait awhile yet for rain, the livestock producer and dairyman are finding lack of rain "a tough row to hoe."

THIS MIGHT BRING TEARS TO YOUR EYES later this year. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes that the state's spring onion crop is estimated at 23,500 acres. This would be 38 per cent larger than the 1975 harvest and the largest projected acreage since 1964.

If good weather prevails now and through February, harvest of early fields can begin by mid-February and general harvest will be underway in early March.

APRIL 15 IS INCOME TAX DEADLINE for most Texans, and it also is important for agriculture producers. That is the date of the next prospective plantings report. Survey information for the report will be gathered around April 1, which will permit producers to report their plans just prior to the major planting period for spring crops.

It will contain information for corn, sorghum, cotton, oats, barley, soybeans, wheat, rice, peanuts and other crops.

LIVESTOCK EXPORTS FROM TEXAS continue to set new records. During 1975, a total of 25,417 head of livestock were shipped from Texas.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is in charge of the six quarantine and inspection pens from which the livestock are shipped.

Cattle were at the top of the list, followed by dairy animals. Beef breeds purchased by foreign buyers were Angus, Beefmaster, Brahman, Brangus, Charolais, Chianina, Hereford, Santa Gertrudis and Simmental. Brahmans led the total with 1,130.

Mexico was the major importer. Other countries involved in the export marketing venture during 1975 included Nicaragua, British Honduras, Bolivia, El Salvador, Panama, Brazil, Venezuela, Ecuador, Guatemala, and Argentina.

In addition to beef and dairy cattle, other kinds of livestock exported were hogs, sheep, dairy goats, and
