Texas Classroom Teachers To Convene Some 1,200 teacher repre-

sentatives from all areas of the state will meet in Dallas February 19-21 for the 21st. annual convention of the Texas Classroom Teachers Association.

The major decision facing the teacher delegates this year is whether or not to adopt a major restructuring of the organization as outlined in the proposed new bylaws. Approval of the bylaws would trigger such changes as consolidation of committees, guarantee ethnic minority representation, establish a judicial committee, and eliminate the office of president-elect,

The bylaws also would require each member to be a member of the United Teaching Profession, which in-cludes the National Education Association (NEA) and the Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA) in addition to local teacher organiza-

tions. Delegates to the convention also will elect state and




