HEMORRHOIDS Hemorrhoids are a very common condition. Fifty per-

cent of people over 50 years old have some evidence of hemorrhoids. Over 25 percent of people between 25 and 50 years of age are also afflicted. Teen-agers and younger children suffer from them occasionally and the condition is more frequent in

males than females. Hemorrhoids, also known as "piles," form as the result of a rupture or tear in one or several of the small veins in the rectum. This tear causes a swelling buldging, or dilation of the



We do not experience dilated veins in the head, but dilated veins do occur as hemorrhoids around the rectum, varicose veins in the legs and varicoele in men. which is a condition of di-

lated veins in the scrotum. There are two types of hemorroids, external and Internal. An external hemorrhoid forms at the anal opening as a protruded swelling . or as a small ball-like mass. The term "piles" is derived from the Latin word "pila," meaning a ball. This protruding mass or ball can usually be felt and seen upon examination. Sneezing and coughing will usually cause the swelling to protrude still further. The external nemorrhoid usually causes the most itching, pain and swelling and unless it becomes inflamed or irritated, may require no treatment,

a fly-in committee that called on 6 Congressmen and 2 Senators in Washington. In addition to these calls, he and Joe Montgomery had a 2 hour meeting with Congressman Omar Burleson.

One of the main purposes of the fly-in was to urge members of the House and Senate to support a resolution soon to be introduced by Sen. James Abourezk (D-S.D.) and Rep. Bob Bergland (D-Minn.) The proposed House and Senate concurrent resolutions declare it to be "the sense of the Congress" that price support levels for 1976 should be increased to 90% of parity on wheat, corn, feed grains, soybeans and milk. While the concurrent resolution could be ignored by the Ford administration, Abourezk told Montgomery

and Clemmer and the other fly-in representatives, that the resolution would express the will of Congress.

"This resolution will show that the secretary of agriculture, without any new legislation, already has the authority to raise support levels sub-stantially," Abourezk said. He also said that the current crop loan and target prices are well below the typical cost of production. and that stronger action by the USDA is not only possible but essential in the face of the "plight of the American farmer due to spiralling production costs and an uncertain
