

In Merkel recently to visit her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ford Smith Jr., Mrs. Wood gave a talk to the Commrads Class at First United Methodist Church on her special interest

In addition to raising a amily and taking care of her home and attending to church activities, Mrs. Wood finds time each week to write to more than 30 prisoners. Then it is not uncommon for the wood family to pack a picnic lunch on a weekend and trek to a prison to visit with some of her prisoners.

She often helps fill their lonely hours with her visits, books and Bibles which she pays for herself because "It is something Barbara wants to do" to help those less fortunate.

She started the letter writing and visits a year and a half ago and it has grown. She originally started visiting inmates in the city jail twice a week (all she was allowed to visit) and reading the Bible to them and taking cookies and fresh fruit. Since then she has started visiting with the inmates in the five prisons and her activities have grown.

In addition to cooking birthday cakes and sharing her weekends with the inmates she also has been furnishing Living Bibles and the book "Wanted" written by evangelist Richard Coss who is an ex-convict who travels over the country talking and preaching to orisoners.

Mrs. Smith visited with Mrs. Wood in Pauls Valley, oklahoma and made a trip to

the city jail with her. "I visited them with her one Sunday and it surely made me have a different feeling toward things," Mrs.

Smith said. Mrs. Smith tells of one incident: "One of her women prisoners in Oklahoma City had five little girls and one was soon to have a birthday. "The lady said she wished she had some material as she knew how to sew and the prison had machines that she

could make her little girl a dress. "So when Barbara Jean left she not only bought material for one, but for all five. Needless to say the lady was overjoyed and I'm sure the little girls were also.

"The lady is out on parole now and Barbara thinks she will make it okay."

Upon her return from the talk to the Merkel group, Mrs. Wood wrote:

"I got a letter from sister Ann. She said several people had ask her if they could send things to the inmates and if they could what they could send. Yes they can have certain things.

"I know they can have toilet articles, such as shaving soap and brushes, toothbrushes, electric razors, comb and hair brush. They can have underwear and socks and handkerchiefs but other than that they wear uniforms and shoes furnished by the state. "They cannot have belts

or anything in a tube such as toothpaste, groom 'n clean, etc. They can have stationary and envelopes and pencils and pens but cannot mail them stamps.

"You cannot mail them food of any kind. At the penitentiary there is no air conditioning of any kind and in the summer it is really hot in there in those cells.

The league not only needs supplies and workers to clean the practice field and get the playing field into condition before the season can start, it needs more coaches and managers.

and land is getting more scarce. However, today's cost may be nothing compared to that of the future.

For instance the future farmer or rancher may have to go into the highrise co-op business. Highrise for the animals, that is.

South Dakota State tells about a 15-story highrise of the future that will house 2,500 feeder cattle, 600 cowcalf units, 500 dairy cattle, 2,500 sheep, 6,500 finishing hogs, 150 sows and litters, 1,000 turkeys and 15,000 chickens. It also will contain power and administrative facilities, repair shops and research labs.

All this is planned for the future. Feed and water will be stored on the top level and will drop to lower levels as needed. Animal wastes will be treated, dried and recycled to the occupants to more fully utilize protein from the original feedstuffs. It's also foreseen that two veterinarians will be employed fulltime to transplant embryos from superior donor cows to recipient brood cows. This will allow outstanding donors to have as many as 1,000 calves in their lifetime, instead of today's average of 10. ...

Finally, someone once said "Make your job important and soon it will return the favor."

"Some of the men have electric fans in their cell which they can have if they buy the fans or if their parents or someone sends them one. "There are several of the ones I work with that don't have a fan, so if anyone wanted to buy them a small fan they could. I watch for them all the time at garage sales. I saw some nice ones advertized in the paper the other day for \$14.95.

"They get one free letter a week and unless their folks send them money to buy stamps with that's all they can write. You can't send them money, but you can send them a money order and the warden keeps it and gives it to them as they need it for stamps, candy, cigarettes and things like that.

"I wouldn't ever send over \$5 at a time if you were going to send money. They can have papers, magazines, books and Bibles."

Mrs. Smith said she has several names of prisoners if anyone want to correspond.

Several of the people in Merkel offered financial assistance to the Woods which was declined.

However, Mrs. Wood says. "After I got home Richard (Ric hard Coss of Prison Ministries, Inc. Del City, Oklahoma) sent me a paper in the mail of his schedule of places where he is going and Kenneth and I see on it that they are trying to get a new panel wagon to travel in and they need donations to buy it with. So if those people who wanted to give me a donation would like to give it instead for this car for Richard and Buddy, it would please me more than anything and whatever they donate is tax deductible. Also if anyone sends packages of any kind

they are also tax deductible. The evangilists are attempting to buy an \$8,000

van to replace a small Honda car they now travel in. It was pointed out that

"When you put books, Bibles, two guitars, clothes and two men the size of Buddy Green and Richard in that Honda car, it's full."

Buddy Green is the other evangilist working with Coss. He is an ex-night club performer. Last year he was offered \$50,000 to sing for the Holiday Inn nightclubcircuits but turned down the offer to devote his life to singing for Jesus."

He is now working tulltime singing in prisons, churches and wherever their ministry takes them.

Their prison ministries schedule includes stops in Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma, Wisconsin, Missouri, New Mexico and Iowa.

She plans to buy 18 of the books by Coss which has been widely praised by inmates and then she "will still like 16 more,"

Too, her work doesn't end when an inmate is released. She reported, "One of my prisoners called me this morning on the phone. He just got paroled and he wanted me to know he was out. Said he would come and see us as soon as he could. He lives in Ardmore. I have been working with him a year and a half.

"Andy Register and his family are going to church with us this week and then I invited them over for dinner after church. Andy is out on parole."

So, Mrs. Wood and her family are not just talking good deeds, they are living them.

ARTHRITIS AND RHEUMATISM

PARTI Arthritis and rheumatism are among the oldest diseases known to affect human beings. Evidence of the occurrence of these diseases have been found in mummies and excavations from other ancient civilizations. The terms "arthritis" and "rheumatism" have been used to mean the same thing, but there are different types of arthritis and different types of rheumatism, Arthritic diseases are those that affect the parts of a joint, namely, the cartilage, the adjacent bone and the synovial

membrane which lines theinside of the joint cavity. Theumatism, by contrast, affects tissues outside the joint, referred to as "the soft tissues." These tissues in-

clude the fibrous tissue or capsule immediately surrounding the joint and also lining or enveloping bundles of muscles and sheaths of nerves, ligaments, tendons and bursae. Terms such as "fibrositis," "tendinitis," 'bursitis," "myositis," or 'myalgia," depending on which structure is affected,

or the term "periarthritis," meaning around but not in the joint itself, may be used in describing the location of rheumatism. Rheumatism may affect a person who also

has arthritis, but rheumatism can and often does occur without arthritis. The most common type of arthritis is known as Osteoarthritis. It is as common in

men as in women and can be found to some extent in almost all persons past middle age. Thus, this type of arthritis is often attributed to the results of "wear and tear" of use of joints of the body over a long time. Osteoarthritis is a degenerative condition of cartilage and bone with no



local signs of inflammation, deformity is moderate, and pain is usually absent.

Another type of arthritis of particular significance is rheumatoid arthritis. This type of arthritis generally occurs in people under forty years of age and is more common in females. One out of three patients who have arthritic symptoms have rheumatoid arthritis. The cause of this type of arthritis is mostly unknown. It is an inflammatory condition, manifesting swelling, atrophy of muscles, extreme pain and marked deformity. It is characterized by its migrating habits, that is, you may have it in your right elbow one week, in your left knee the next, and in your back four months later.

Some forms of arthritis can be treated satisfactorily when the cause can be determined, as in the arthritis caused by tuberculosis, scarlet fever. typhoid fever, tumors, gout, syphilis, gonarrhea and other forms of infection.

Osteoarthritis and rheumatoid arthritis, which cause degenerative and inflammatory changes of a joint, are much more difficult to treat simply because the cause is generally unknown.






