To watch Mr. and Mrs. Mack Fisher absorb all the praise heaped upon them during their special day Friday, kept wondering when the two would slip into a phone booth and come out as Mr. and Mrs. Superman, Mr. Fisher

is retiring after 27 years as Merkel School Superintendent. That the two gracious people are deserving of such praise and having a special day to honor them was evident by the especially large and varied number of people singing their praises.

Too, when school-aged youngsters (from kindergarten through high school) enthusiastically endorse a person, you can be sure there is just cause for all the stupendous

Still, it was nice to find out that School Superintendent Fisher is human as pointed out every now and then throughout the reception and program Friday night.

For instance, his driving habits came in for a good bit of good-natured kidding by some of those who have ridden with him on past trips. But, it was duly noted that Mr. Fisher's driving improved "somewhat" with the invention of the automatic transmission.

Too, it was hinted a time or two among the hundreds of words of praise that Mr. Fisher does have a slight temper and has been known to use it on occasion, although most admitted they had to search their memories to recall such occasions.

But, it was discovered just how "human" Mr. Fisher really was when it was revealed he couldn't win coin Supping contests for home sites for football playoffs. Chester Collinsworth was the culprit that spilled the fact that Mr. Fisher has failed in something after all when he related a story about a particular meeting of school officials to determine a playoff site.

"He had lost the flip of the coin so many times in the past, we decided to not let him flip anymore." Collinsworth laughlingly recalled.

'However, before the official coin flip, Mr. Fisher flipped the coin just for practice. He lost, And, to show their good faith the other side let him flip it nine more times. He never did win."

Collinsworth added, "So, as a coin flipper he's a

flop." And, when Collinsworth presented the Fishers a television set as a gift from the Merkel Independent School district employees he commented: "Now you can watch a few football games and practice a few coin flips." But, this was all in the way to show there was a human side to a man who has presented a dedicated life to help-

ing people -- especially young people. There were many words of praise from the very dedicated converts of "Fisherism:" "to a friend," "to a great person," "to one who loved everyone," to a "man who has left us with a balanced school budget," to "he was a father to me "

There was no end to the praise heaped on this physically small, but exceptionally large individual this May 14. There was even the reference that Webster must have

been talking of Mr. Fisher when he put the word "integrity" in the dictionary. It means the state of being entire, wholeness, probity, honesty, uprightness, truthful and free from pretense. That one word and its meaning in its various forms and acts was what had been heaped on this modest man and his charming wife all day Friday -- and justly so.

Perhaps, however, the most important aspect preseited by his many loved friends and former teachers is that he has left behind to live on through others. Bille Evans of Tye Elementary probably expressed t best when she told the huge turnout, "He probably heled shape the lives of many thousands of children anny his career and this will go on for many years through them."

I was pointed out time and again during the testimonials d low Mr. Fisher never failed to communicate and to take an active interest in the students from the first grade through high school and of how he always had time to stop and talk with them -- or to listen.

"He would often get down on his knees and talk to them at e level," was the perfect example of a man thoroughly eaping his work with all youngsters as explained by relating first grade teacher Jo Barnett, He never became to emportant in his job to forget the primary reason

for his profession, Yes, a part of Mack Fisher will live on through many generations because he loved his job and cared enough

to take the time to get involved. Come to think of it, Mr. and Mrs. Fisher didn't need to slip off to a phone booth to change into their superman costumes. They wear them daily.

# Whisenhunt sworn in, Cage coach hired

The Merkel School Board voted Dink Whisenhunt to fill the vacancy created by Whisenhunt and hired a new basketball coach at its four and a half hour meeting Tuesday hight.

Whisenhunt was sworninto a 1-year term after Superintendent Mack Fisher read a letter from Attorney General Mark White stating that Whisenhunt would be eligible to serve if he is a legal

voter. He became a legal voter April 26. Board member Don Hart made the motion to name Whisenhunt to fill the vacancy and the motion passed.

Whisenhunt won the original place in the April 3 election but was declared ineligible to serve when it was found he had not registered to vote 30 days prior to the Abilene area civic leaders April 3 election -- a require-

Superintendent After Whisenhunt was sworn in the Board heard a report from Leon Harris on and approved the cooperative agreement for the Taylor - Calahan special education program. Also, the cooperative teachers were

rehired. Then, they launched into a detailed discussion on the current vouchers and financial reports.

President Charles Jacobs was seeking a detailed accounting of how much actual funds the Board will have available to do special jobs of repair and building in the near future. However, a comprehensive breakdown on the particular fund Jacobs requested was not available at Monday's meeting.

The report shows the District has \$167,346.09 on deposit in the bank and \$205,883.30 in certificates of deposit.

The bank balance includes \$146,086.53 for general operating, \$3,594,45 for transportation, \$1,691.91 for consolidated application and \$15,973.20 for interest and sinking fund.

The District spent \$101,732.20 last month. It was pointed out that most of the school's income for

the current year has been received and the bank balance will decline until the new year starts in October, Superintendent Fisher did

attempt to give a picture of the financial outlook and the possible balance at the end of the year but since no percise figures were available on exact expenses and income, the Board is asking for more information for the next

The Board also heard the membership reports, approved lunchroom application papers to continue the commodities program, named Davis to replace Fisher as custodian of the books, tabled the issue on athletic insurance after recognizing that the school will probably have to add insurance for

girls and other sports besides football; approved a bus seminar in Austin for Leon Harris; tabled any action on the bus barn and yard; voted to hire three boys at minimum wage to help with the painting this summer; agreed to buy a check writer for \$375; and signed diplomas

for 46 students.

Davis explained that the \$1,200 for paint as approved at the April meeting was for interior only and not for exterior and interior as he had stated.

The Board agreed to the change and it was discussed as to the additional cost for painting the exterior trim and doors.

Davis did not have the exact figures but agreed to furnish the figures at the next meeting. It was estimated that at least \$600 more would be needed for this project.

An increase in the out-of district tuition cost was discussed but no action was taken. Presently the four students are charged \$170 which the two of the other district schools pay, Fisher said. The issue came up when it

was revealed that a Trent student is requesting to transfer to Merkel. The Board determined that there are presently enough regulations to handle the situation and left the issue of the transfer up to the Superintendent. As to an increase in the fee, the Board discussed raising the fee to \$300, but took no action.

keeping the tax formula for what the possibilities are,"

taxing personal property on cars at 60 per cent of the Blue Book value and increased the fee for driver training this summer to \$22.50. There will be 60 students taking the driver training course during the fourth semester this summer.

The Board also took up the matter of buildings. Davis told the Board that

"We need some room," Davis said.

He also told the Board that in two years when kindergarten becomes mandatory there will be a definite shortage of classroom in Merkel.

Tye also has growing pains. Next year there will be two first grades if enrollment holds and Davis said the bus barn would either have to be renovated into classrooms or the sixth grade moved to Merkel.

Too, he pointed out that should the kindergarten at Tye be too large then there won't be any choice but to renovate the bus barn.

The Board discussed metal buildings and costs of construction of both temporary and permanent structures.





ALLERGIES Reactions of hypersensitivity or allergic reactions may affect tissues involved by arthritis and rheumatism. Unusual sensitivity to drugs or substances which are "foreign" to the human body may result in arthritis or rheumatism. This type of arthritis or rheumatism can be described as an inflammation without an infection.

TUMORS Like other organs of the body, the joints may be affected by new growths or tumors, but fortunately these are rarely encountered in persons who have arthritic and rheumatic diseases.

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

# Summer program set, Fee raised

raised the fee for the summer program, set the dates and named a committee to conduct a feasability study for a civic center at its regular

meeting Monday afternoon. The Chamber Board of Directors elected to start the summer program June 14 and run it six weeks through July 30.

The High School gym will be open from 9 a.m. until noon and from 2 until 5 p. m. each weekday during this period. Also, there will be swimming available daily in the afternoon for those enrolled in the program.

The fee was increased from 75 cents per day to \$1.25 per day. The weekly fee would be \$4.50 instead of the \$3 of last year. For the six weeks, it would be \$20. For two children of the same family the 6-week recreational program will cost \$30 if paid in advance and for three or more children of the same family the fee will be \$35

in advance. The increase was voted to help cover expenses of hiring personnel for the pro-

gram. Band director Daryll Kair€ has asked for the job and is planning to hire two or

three assistants. The Chamber of Commerce estimated it cost \$1,140 to go through the 6week program last year.

It is estimated that an additional \$600 will be needed to get the program through the six weeks this summer. Thus, the increase in fees,



Sadler has recommended and the City Council approved on a tentative basis that 20 per cent of the \$39,673 (\$7,934) be spent for public safety, 25 per cent for environmental protection, 15 per cent on public transportation, 10 per cent on health, 25 per cent on recreation and 5 per cent on lib raries.


