

- 2 cans (61/2 or 7 ounces each) tuna in vegetable oil Hot cooked rice Toasted slivered almonds

Heat butter in large saucepan. Add onion and garlic; cook until tender. Stir in undiluted soup, cream, Tabasco, salt and brandy. Add peas. Cover and simmer 5 minutes. Uncover and add olives and tuna; heat. Serve over hot cooked rice and garnish with slivered almonds.




