"Since 1960 skunks have become the most ing eliminates matted hair frequently reported rabid and removes dirt, loose animal and the most probably common source of human rabies in the United States. In Texas skunk represent 35 to 60 percent of all known rabid animals on a yearly basis," he

Rabies virus may be

secreted in skunk saliva as much as 18 days prior to death, but the animal may not show any signs of illness until the last three days. In one case a pet skunk had been in a household for 18 months before it developed rabies and it is thought that the animal incubated the disease for that length of time. According to Dr. Bilderback there is no certified rabies vaccine to immunize skunks and other wild animals against rabies.
