CONGRESS IS STILL hung up on passing the Federal Budget, and the feeling is that it may not get one passed before the October 1 deadline.

One editorial writer said this week that the real problem seems to be that too many Congressmen simply refuse to "bite the bullet" and make the cuts which need to be made.

Instead, staying on the path the Liberal Democrats have paved in Congress the past 40 years, the talk is now of abolishing the 1983 third phase individual tax cut, passing even more taxes, and perhaps adding a four per cent surcharge on those with income of \$40,000 or more per year.

The worst part is that no meaningful cuts in spending are being advanced by the Congress--no cuts in Social Security fringe benefits, or welfare.

Members of Congress need to realize that the nation's taxpayers can't go on forever supporting so many who don't or won't work. This seems to be an ideal place to cut the budget, to one average taxpayer.

As to the proposed four per cent surcharge on those making over \$40,000. Their idea seems to be that the rich can better afford higher taxes.

The fact is that the bulk of savings comes from the five per cent who make more than \$50,000. At this particular time, the nation desperately needs more saving and investment, and an additional tax on this bracket could depress the economy even further.

What would be wrong with congress doing what every individual taxpayer has to do, and simply throw out all the things which are unnecessary and unaffordable? Would this be too simple a solution?

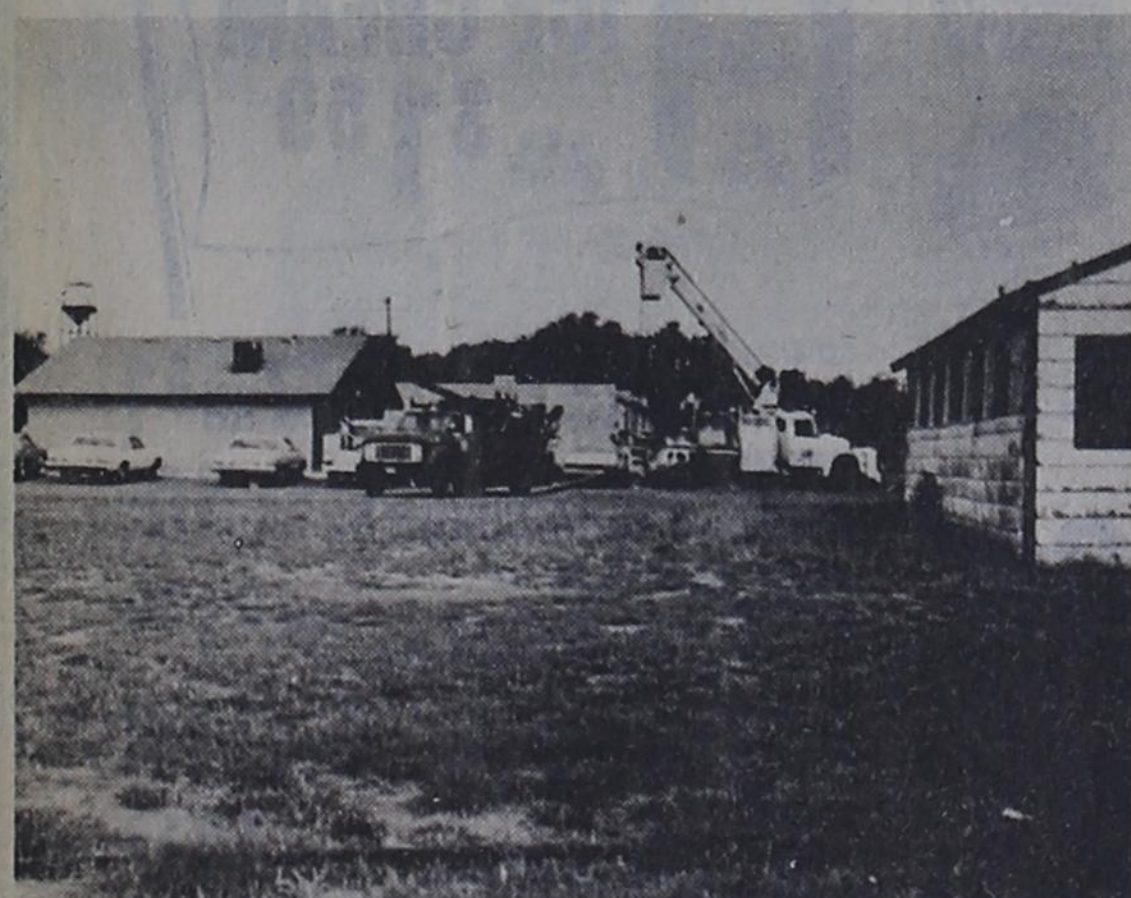
New Sweeper Now In Use

The City of Bovina is expecting to use the new equipment on the average of one time weekly, according to sources at City Hall.

The sweeper was purchased from Deckard Equipment Company, Amarillo, which presented the City Council with the lowest bid for the new sweeper, and the brand of the sweeper is Elgin.

School Board Hires Three New Teachers

Three new employees were hired by the Bovina School Board in their last meeting. Two teachers and a high school principal were offered contracts by the board.

The new high school principal will be Danny R. Cochran, 28, formerly of Poteet, Texas, where he was junior high principal there for one year.

A native of Booker, Cochran graduated from Booker High School, and attended Ozark Bible College, WTSU, Panhandle State University, Northwestern Oklahoma State University, and the University of Texas at San Antonio while getting his degree in Spanish and English. He also has hours in psychology and education.

Prior experience has taken Cochran to Buffalo, Oklahoma as a high school English and speech teacher for one year, then to Cherokee, Oklahoma as an English and speech teacher for the 1977-78 school term.

He has also had experience in Booker, Texas as an English teacher,

and in Aldine, Texas as an administrative counselor prior to his taking the position as junior high principal at Poteet.

Cochran is married and he and his wife, Earlene, have one child, a daughter, Tiffany, who was born December 3, 1981.

They will be moving to Bovina in mid June. Mrs. Cochran will teach Junior High School.

Another new addition to the staff at Bovina schools will be Marka Herbert, who has been hired as the new homemaking teacher.

Mrs. Herbert is a native of Portales, N.M., and has a degree from Eastern New Mexico University in home economics.

She is married, and her husband is a coach at Friona, where they will make their home.

Mrs. Karen Helton, wife of the new head coach and athletic director, will also be teaching in the Bovina school system this year, but her assignment has not yet been handed out.

Ordinance Prohibits Trashy City Lots

As a result of last week's picture of some property in town, we have learned that having trash, rubbish, or weeds on a person's property in Bovina is a violation of city ordinances.

According to an ordinance passed on May 29, 1967, the law states: "Weeds and grasses to be cut upon the premises and that rubbish and trash be removed therefrom; and fixing a penalty for failure to comply with such an ordinance, and providing that the same shall be done by the City in the event of such failure

and providing for the fixing of a lien upon the property for the expenses incurred in the removing and declaring that weeds to grow and trash and rubbish to accumulate to be a nuisance."

For assistance in picking up trash, rubbish or having weeds cut, on property within the city of Bovina, property owners should call City Hall and ask for assistance from the sanitation crews. They will be there to offer assistance when time permits.

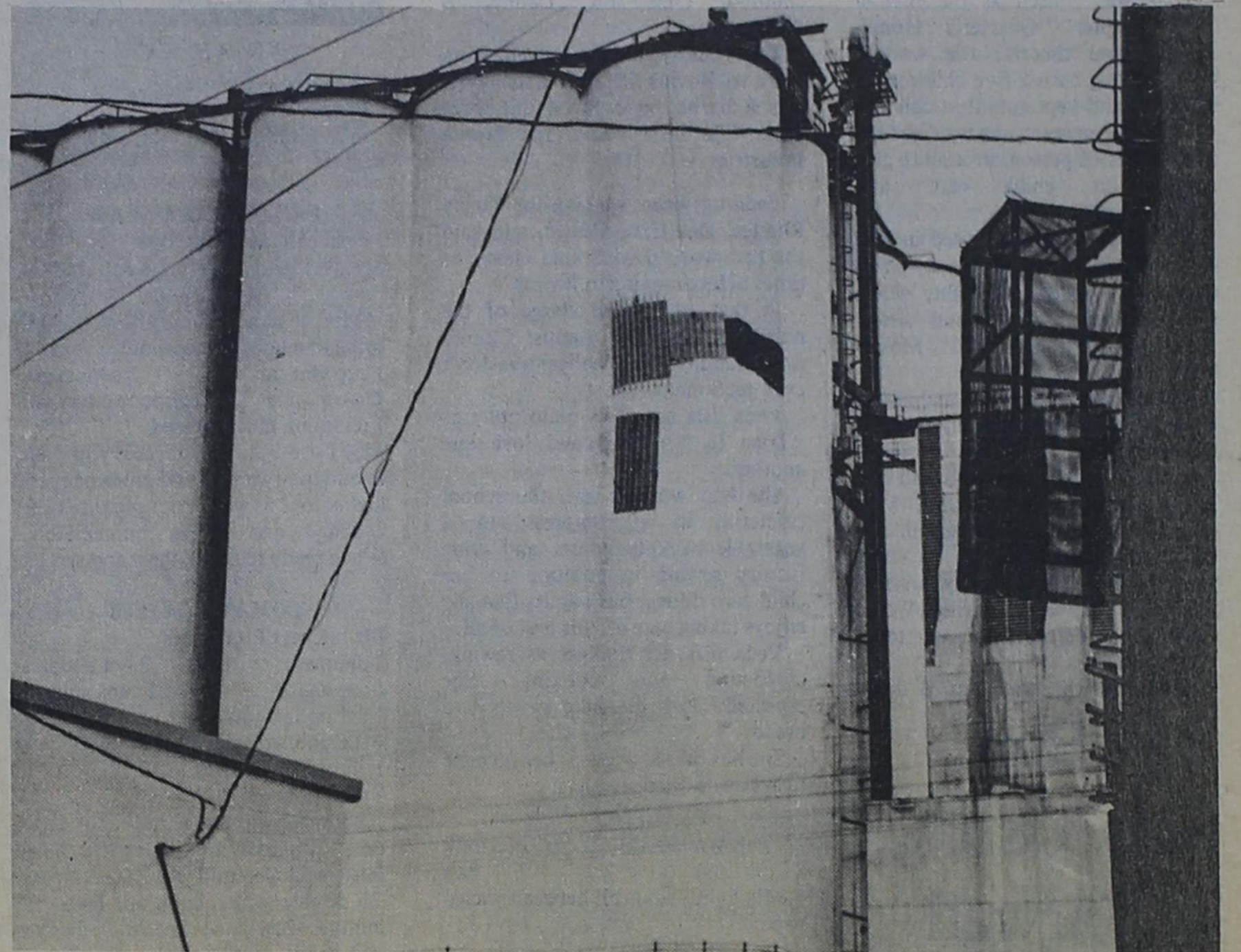
By reducing the amount of trash, weeds and rubbish on in-town property this will also lower the possibility of a large number of mosquitoes and other undesirable pests, since hot weather seems to attract these pests and they like to live around weeds, trash and rubbish.

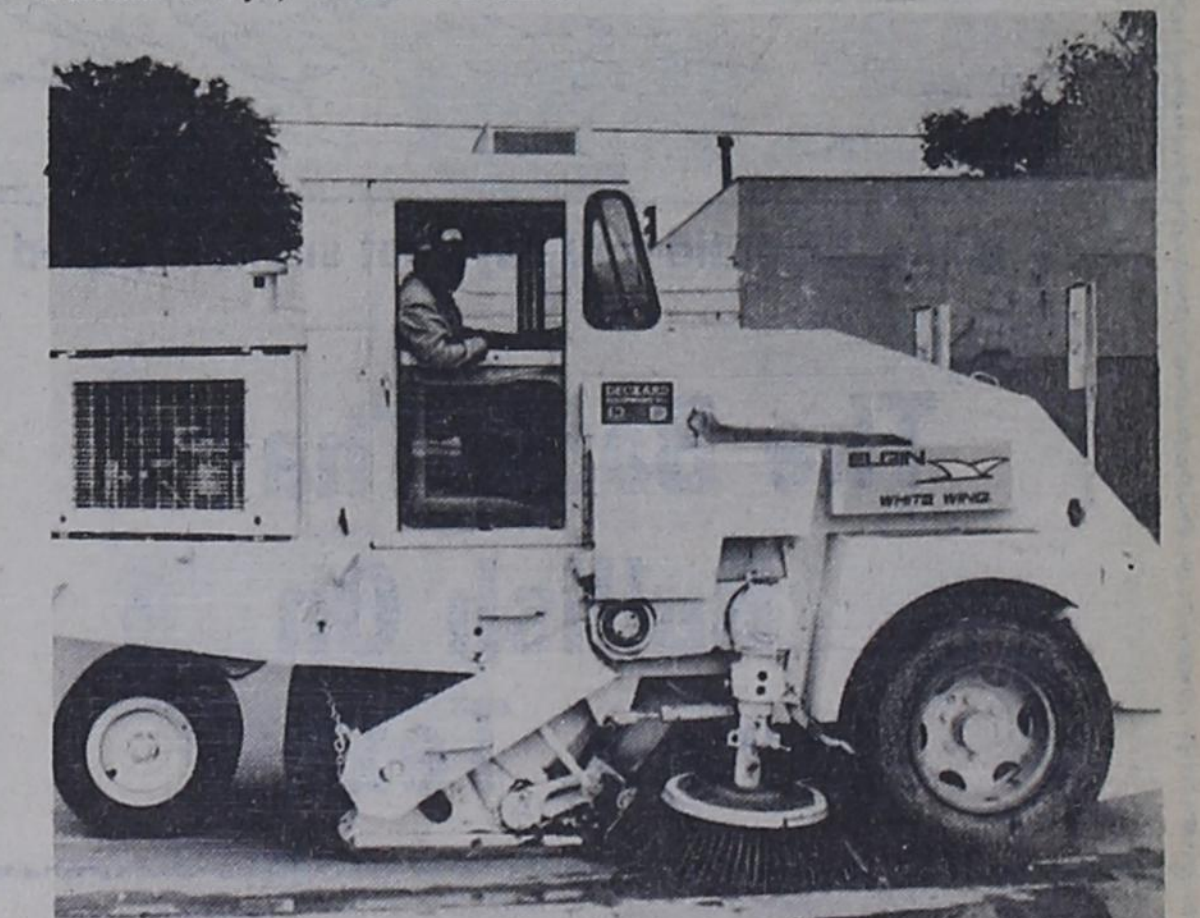

When one sees Veda McKay there is almost always a group of young children around her. She is the perfect grandmother type, and confesses that she adores small children and would rather be working with kids than doing just about anything else.

Veda was chosen as the Bovina YHT chapter "Quarterly Homemaker" and there's little wonder why. Having raised five children of her own, and kept countless children for working parents, she is one of the most qualified persons around to give advice on child care and homemaking.

Veda was born and raised in Red River County, close to a small community called Fulbright, where she and her brothers and sisters attended Fulbright and Moseley Schools.

Veda had nine brothers and sisters originally, but there are only seven of them alive now.

She has five living sisters and two living brothers. Her mother, Mrs. Rosie Osburn is also living still and resides in Estelline.

Elmer and Veda McKay married December 28, 1942 during World War II, just before Elmer was to be shipped out.

After the war, they settled down

One son, Danny, is deceased.

She has shared a few of her favorite recipes with Blade readers:

FRUIT PIE CRUST

2/3 cup Wesson Oil 1/3 cup milk
2 cups flour Salt
Mix lightly and roll between waxed paper.

SPUDNUTS

Scald 1 cup milk and cool
1 cup mashed potatoes
1/2 cup shortening 1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar 2 beaten eggs
1 cake yeast dissolved in lukewarm water (1/2 cup water)
6-8 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder

Let dough rise until double after mixing all of the above ingredients. Then roll dough out and cut doughnuts. Let these rise until double and cook in hot fat.

ICING

2 1/2 cups powdered sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla



VEDA MCKAY

1 unbeaten egg white
4 teaspoons cream
Mix thoroughly and dip doughnuts in glaze.

FROZEN COLE SLAW

1 head cabbage, shredded
Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon salt and let set one hour
Mix together the following and bring to a boil, then let cool.
1 cup vinegar 2 cups sugar
1/4 cup water 1 teaspoon celery salt
1 teaspoon mustard seed

May use 6-8 stuffed olives if you want to and may want to add green peppers and onions as well. Pour mixture over cabbage and freeze immediately. When ready to serve, thaw and serve.

TOMATO CATSUP

Big bucket of tomatoes
3 onions 2 hot peppers
1 cup sugar 2 cups vinegar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon allspice
1/4 teaspoon cloves
3 teaspoon salt

Mix contents together and cook until tomatoes are done then pour into collander and cool until thick. On double recipe, cook one hour, 15 minutes then pour through collander and cool until thick. Bottle as directed.

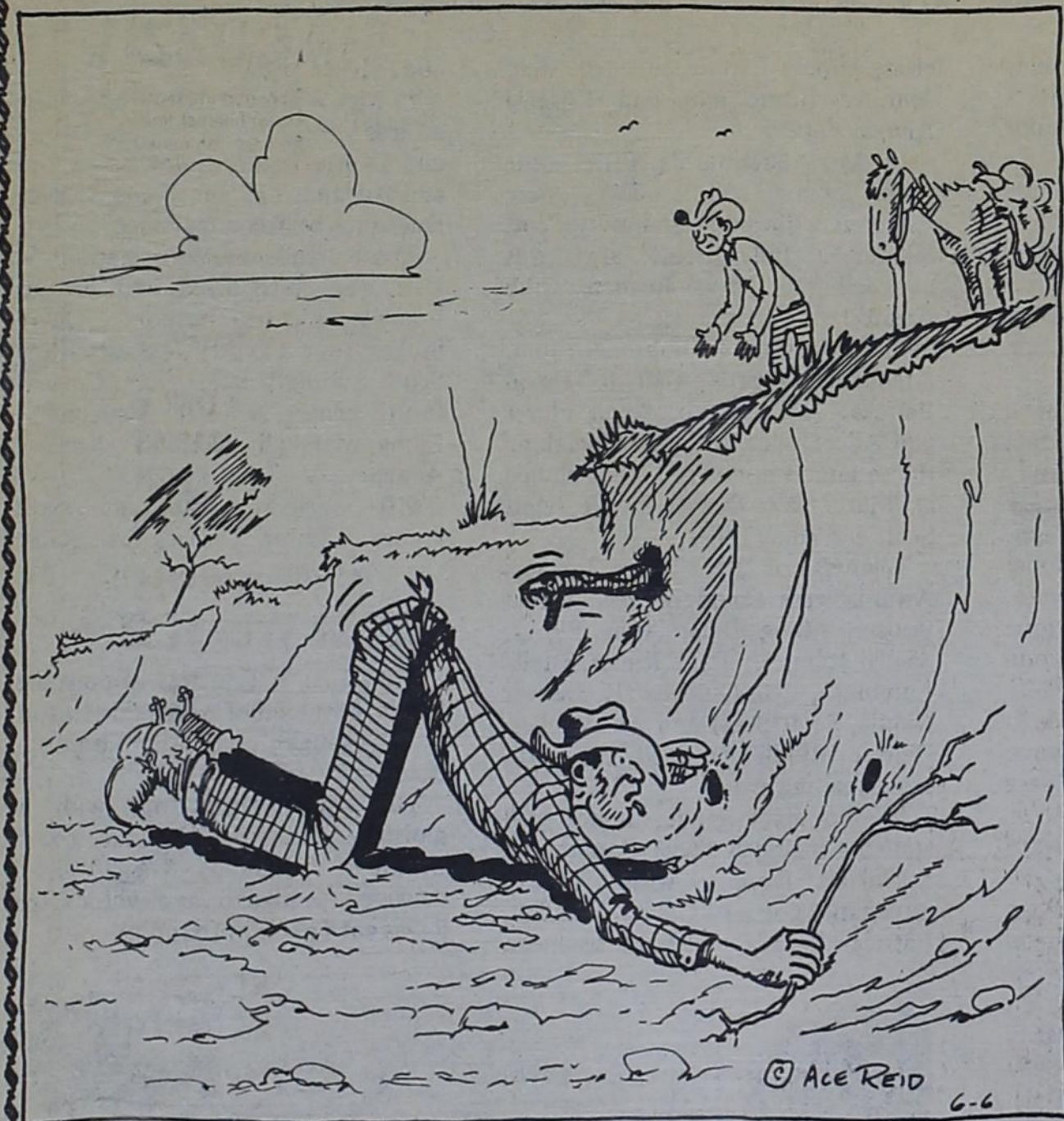
The Utility intends to change its service rules and regulations including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Ricardo wrote an accompanying letter about his French trip.

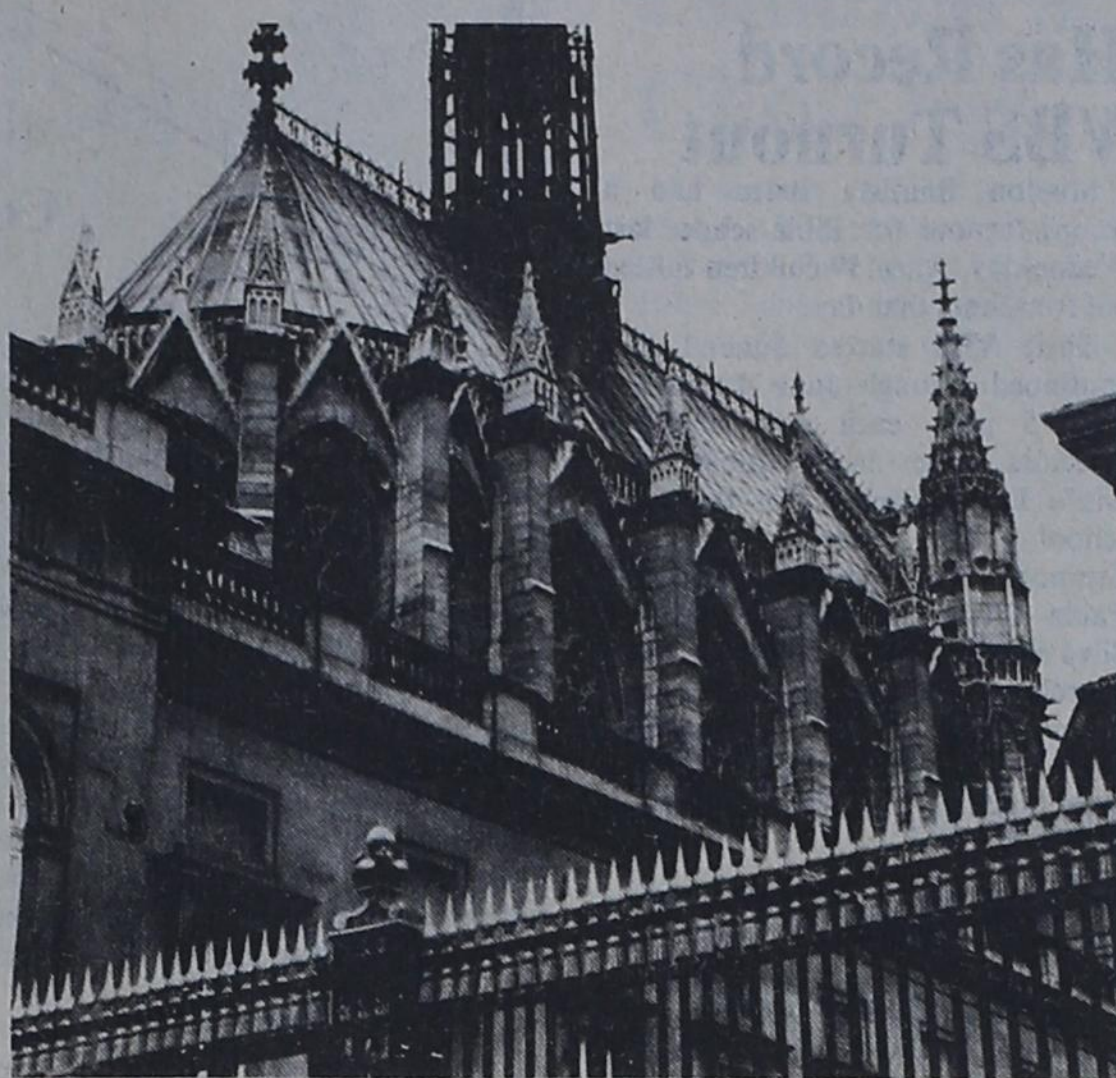

But the places that I saw and went to were terrific. They toured us all around Paris. The next day we went to the Eiffel Tower. I went all of the way to the top, and the weather was nice. It was a clear day so I got to see the whole city. After that we walked down the river and saw the original Statue of Liberty. Then, we went to Concorde Square and saw the oldest monument of Paris, and also saw the American Embassy and the Arc De Triomphe. They also have a Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

"We went to the museum, and there were many paintings and statues. I saw the painting of the *Mona Lisa* and the painting of the *Last Supper*, and many more. Before going back, we stopped at the Reim Cathedral and stayed there awhile just to look around.

"We also saw the Notre Dame Cathedral, and it is really big. It was a wonderful and worthwhile trip."

SPS Offers Annual Fed Cattle Survey

A wall poster-map showing locations of all the major cattle feed lots and packing plants in the four-state area served by Southwestern Public Service Co. is available free at SPS district offices, said Sam Thomas, SPS manager of agricultural development.

The poster shows locations of 101 lots with a feeding capacity of 5,000 or more animals. Eighteen meat packing plants, in the Oklahoma Panhandle, the south plains and Panhandle of Texas, and in eastern New Mexico, are pinpointed.

Indexes listing all the feed lots and packing plants also are on the poster. The poster-map, about 23 inches by 27 inches, is suitable for framing. Approximately 500 have been printed, Thomas said.

SPS issued a similar map in 1976. It has been used by bankers, ranchers and farmers, trucking companies, the feed lots and packing plants, government officials and others with a vital interest in the fed cattle industry, Thomas said.

The poster-map complements the recently released SPS annual feed lot survey, which summarizes the state of

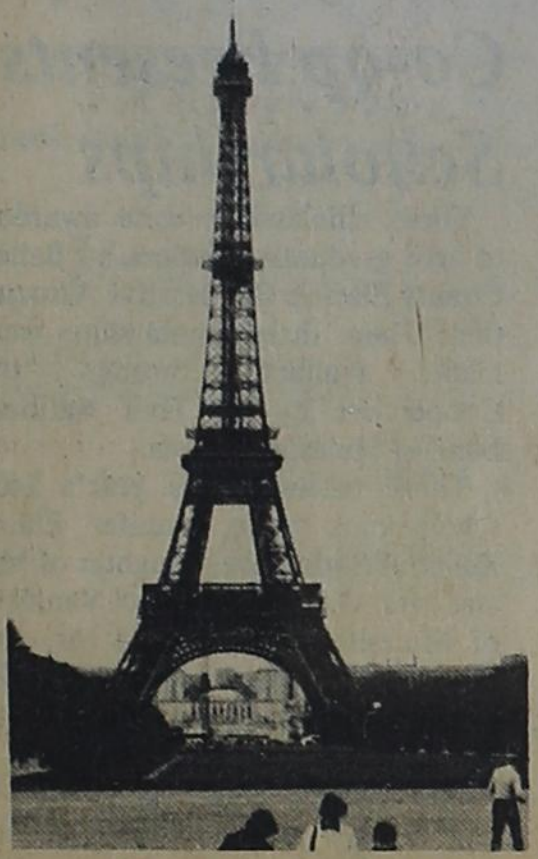
the fed cattle industry in the area in 1981. Copies of the survey also are available at Southwestern Public Service Company offices.

The survey reports Southwestern's 45,000-square-mile service area produced 4,045,004 fed cattle during 1981, which was nine per cent below 1980.

The 4,045,004 head represented a farm sale value exceeding \$2.7 billion, and an area business value of \$9.7 billion, Thomas reported.

Packing plants in the service area slaughtered 4,004,094 cattle in 1981—20,000 more than in 1980. Packing plant gross sales totaled \$2.7 billion, with a value to area businesses of an additional \$10 billion, Thomas calculated.

The SPS annual Fed Cattle Survey has been compiled since 1966. It is the oldest continuous record of cattle feeding in the area served by the company. SPS primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than 1 million in the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

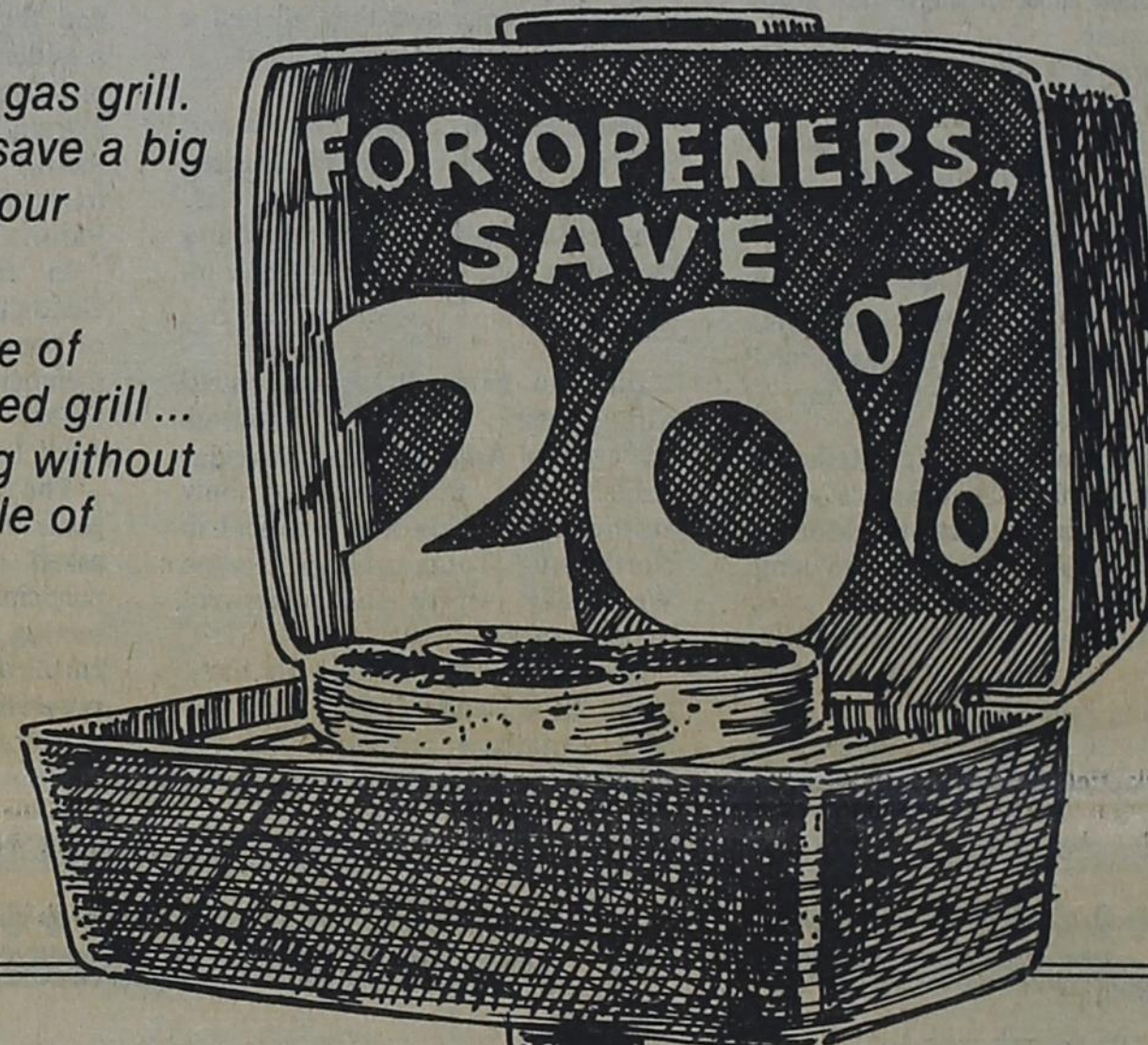
