Aliens To Report During January

District Director, Joe F Staley, San Antonio, Texas of the Immigration and Naturalization Service estimated that 120,000 aliens will report their addresses in the San Antonio area during January under the Federal Alien Address Report Program.

Mr. Joe F. Staley said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status and foreign representatives of certain international organizations are required to file the

address report. He added that any alien who willfully violates the address report requirement may be subject to

serious penalties. In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their addresses to the Service within 10 days after their return to this country.

The District Director said that address report cards will be available at United States post offices and at the Immigration and Naturalization Service office at San Antonio beginning January 1, 1978.






