ONE OF OUR FAVORITE columnists, Jenkin Lloyd Jones, wrote a master-piece recently, in which he derided the country's foreign policy, and challenged the nation's leaders to turn things around, to reflect the type of attitude that the majority of Americans have on most subjects.

Many times in the past we have dipped our head at the way America lets many of the so-called "Third World powers" denunciate America—even to the point that in one case, we agreed to give up the Panama Canal, rather than have Panama's upstart dictator mad at us.

Jones pointed out in his recent piece that he felt it was about time that the United States, in its foreign policy quit "walking on eggs, turning the other cheek, speaking softly and carrying a small stick, etc."

Wonder if this type of foreign policy was not the major factor in the problem currently involving Argentina and Great Britain, in the Falkland Islands? Argentina, having seen what its neighbor Panama accomplished, probably decided that the time was ripe for them to pick the "prize plum," on which it had had its eye for some time.

The British are to be commended on their nationalism. It has been refreshing to see one of our allies stand up on its feet against communism. And, it's refreshing to see our country rally to Britain's side.

Had the Falklands issue happened in recent years, and the islands had been U.S. territory, we wonder if our cheek-turning policy would have allowed the country to have retaliated? Or would we just have increased the attacking nation's foreign aid, so they would have the capital with which to adequately run their new possession?

Speaking of the situation in the Middle East, Jones said the U.S. should send a message reading "We're tired of financing and arming old terrorists posing as patriots and religious fanatics self-billed as the Swords of God. No more aid or arms until Israel retires from its Six-Day War conquests and the Arab world swears on the Koran to let Israel live."

Another of our problem areas lies with the People's Republic of China, which would like for the United States to quit selling arms to Taiwan, and embrace the "one China" theory.

Columnist Jones suggested that we send Peking this note:

"We had a one-China policy when we thought there was still a possibility that Chiang Kai-shek could engineer the counterrevolution that would throw you Commies out.

"Now we've got a two-China policy. To hand over Taiwan, which violated practically none of the ideals expressed in the UN Charter, to a government that has violated practically all of them, is for the birds, until and unless Taiwan so chooses.

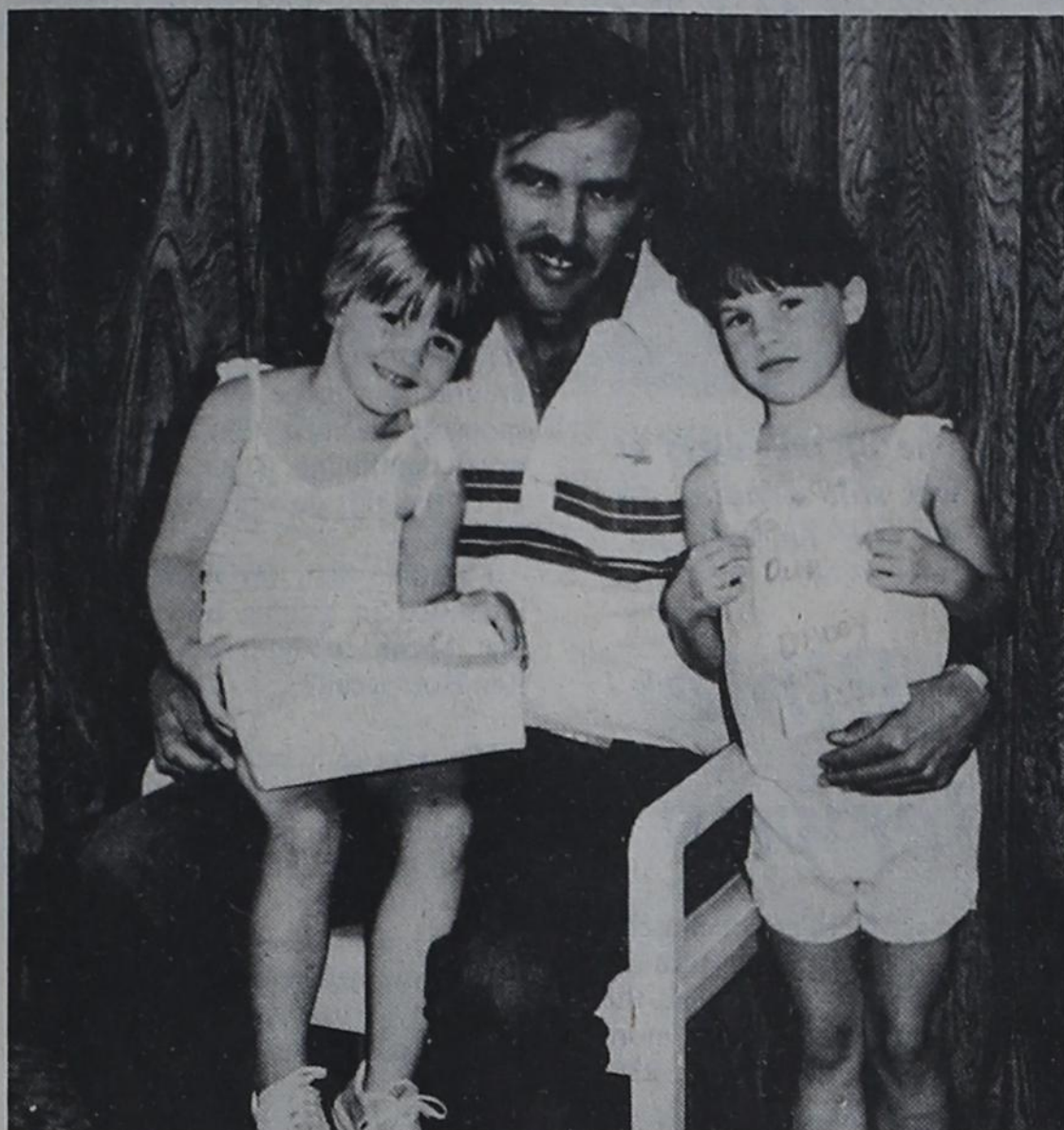
"We know you got yourselves into a mess with the Thoughts of Mao and the Great Cultural Revolution. We'd like to help you. But if the price of your friendship is our acquiescence to imposing your types of controls on 18 million presently free people, forget it."

Jones admits that polished diplomats would never say such things as he suggests, but wonders if it isn't about time for the majority of fed-up, under-polished Americans and their feelings, to at least be heard in the foreign policy chambers.

## Bovina City Council

### Met June 10 & 14

The Board of City Aldermen for Bovina held two sessions, one on June 10 and another June 14, in which items of business were discussed.

In the June 10 meeting, present were Mayor Dale Gober, Aldermen Larry Scott, Dudley Hughes, Garry Beauchamp, Joe Jones and B.J. Charles, as well as City Manager Tom Bonds. Others present were Eugene Griffin of Southwestern Public Service Company, Ralph Shirley of Energas, and Richard Morris, a representative of Merriman and Barber Engineering firm.

Larry Scott made a motion to pay the bills and it was seconded by Joe Jones and passed.

Scott also moved that the Council ask Energas for an increase of \$300 for an office space and service to Energas.

The meeting was cut short due to foul weather, and resumed June 14, with Mayor Gober, Aldermen Charles, Scott, Jones, Beauchamp, City Manger Tom Bonds, and Eugene Griffin of SPS.

It was decided to deny Southwestern Public Service a rate increase, and the motion to deny this increase was made by Alderman Scott, and seconded by Beauchamp.

Charles moved to accept the specs and designs of Merriman and Barber

for the new well, tank, and lines for the new water system.

Larry Scott seconded the motion and it carried.

The meeting was then adjourned.

## Weather Hampers Harvest

Wheat harvest is slowly getting started, but there may not be much left to harvest after the violent storms took their toll last week.

According to Harry Johnson of Sherley Grain Company in Bovina, there has been a few token loads brought in the past week, those coming from Robert Wilson (brought in the first load), Nick Treinen, Les McCain, and R.Q. Silverthorn of Hub.

Most of the wheat which had been brought in had tested out with a moisture content of about 14 and 15, according to Johnson.

Johnson said that he did not think any of the irrigated wheat had been harvested as yet.

"Hail has gotten at least half of what ever wheat was left, if there was any left," said Johnson.

# Okla. Lane Area Battered By Hail

Parmer County was once again hit by stormy weather last Thursday evening, and the loss toll was again high in some areas.

The greatest loss from the Thursday storm appeared to be at Bovina Feeders, located 6½ miles west of Clay's Corner.

As of Monday the crews and management of Bovina Feeders were still digging their way out from under mud and drowned cattle, but were making headway, according to the manager, Gail Morris.

Morris said that as of Sunday they were finally able to drain out enough water from their feed mill that they could begin mixing feed for the cattle again.

Also encouraging was the fact that the feed yard operators were expecting to only lose about 400 head of cattle instead of the 500-1,000 figure given to the papers earlier.

Morris said that the feed yard was finding some live cattle which strayed from several of the pens which were underwater, which had originally been counted as lost.

Although there are still drowned cattle being pulled from the pens that are underwater, business is going on as usual, as best that it can, at Bovina Feeders.

With time, and lots of work left, there will be a time that the feed yard will be back to normal. Perhaps very soon, but it will be a long time before Gail Morris and his staff forget last Thursday night storm.

Ronnie Hanaberry, assistant manager of the feedlot said, "It apparently hailed for two to two and one-half hours, from marble to golf-ball in size. It also came a flood of rain, which caused the lower end of the feeding installation to be under water. Stacks of ice from the Thursday hailstorm were still evident on Friday.

"The rain gauge showed 4½ inches of rain, but I'm sure it couldn't have caught it all," the feedlot spokesman said.

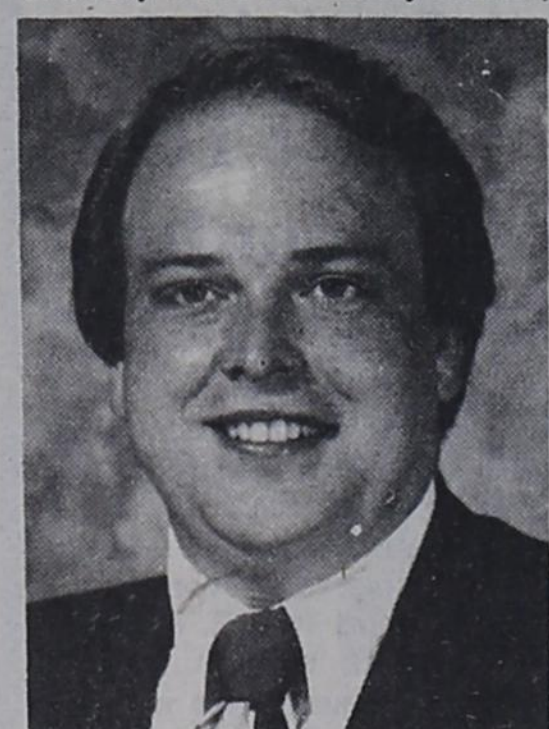
The control room of the feedlot's mill was flooded, and had shut down the feed mixing operations on Friday morning.

More crop damage was sustained from the storm, particularly in the Oklahoma Lane area. At least one field of wheat had been reported as wiped out by the hailstorm, which is the third one for that area this spring.

Golf-ball sized hail was also reported southwest of Friona during the storm, although the city was once again amazingly spared any major hail damage.

One motorist, enroute to Clovis on Highway 60 during the storm, reported lost their windshield, and they had to pull off the road. "It was scary," the source said.

From Friona on eastward, the Thursday storm left mainly rainfall,

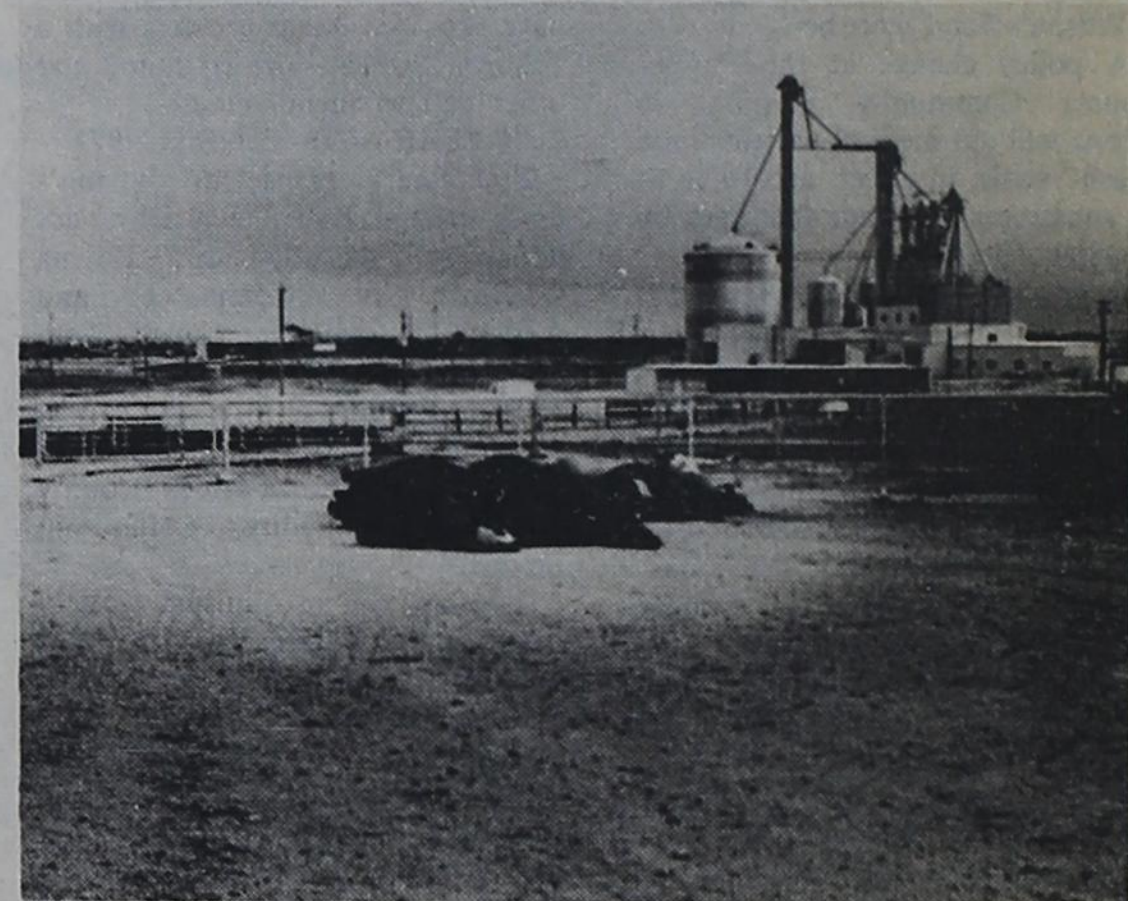

with some scattered reports of hail damage. The official measurement in the city was only .17 inch, although farmers in the outlying area reported as much as an inch of rain. Some were lucky enough to get only

rainfall, which was much needed.

Most of the hail damage was between State Highway 214 and Oklahoma Lane Road 1731. Ice was stacked on the dirt roads, making them virtually impassable.

## Commissioners Court Has Routine Business

Approval of expenditure for carpeting the County Extension offices at the court house was on the agenda at the County Commissioner's final May meeting.

The carpet was a budgeted item, and after considering three estimates, the court awarded the job to Poarch Furniture of Friona in the amount of \$1,335.03.

Approval of a bill from Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley, on the reapportionment of commissioners' precincts, services through May 15, was granted. The bill amount was \$458.19.

A request for right-of-way easement for 173 feet of buried cable in Precinct 1 by General Telephone Company was approved.

Approval of a small bill from Texas A&M for maps in connection with the 1980 census was approved. The bill amount was \$10.71.

It was noted that County Clerk Bonnie Warren was to attend a meeting for county clerks on June 14, the regular commission date, so that meeting was changed to June 11.

County Extension Agent Laura Jacobs reported that she has purchased a tester for pressure canners, and has already tested several home canners.

Approval was given for payment of \$6 for 4-H supplies.

Approval was also given for soil conservation work by county equipment when it was not in use and in the areas needed, for David Dalton, Leslie McCain, Carl Schlenker and Wm. Gromowsky in Precinct 2, C.A. White trust, W.L. Fritz estate and Gerald Norton in Precinct 3.

## New Basketball Coach Is Hired

Marks Lanham, formerly of Vega will take over the reigns of the Bovina Mustang basketball team next year, it was announced by school sources Tuesday.

Lanham was a coach at Vega prior to coming to Bovina and is married. He and his wife, Kathy, are the parents of one son.

They are planning to move to Bovina in the near future, according to the school source.

The next meeting of the Bovina Board of Trustees will be July 13 and there will be at least three more coaching positions to be filled before the upcoming school year.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 19, 1957

They are a great bunch of people and deserve better than they got last Thursday night from "Mother Nature."

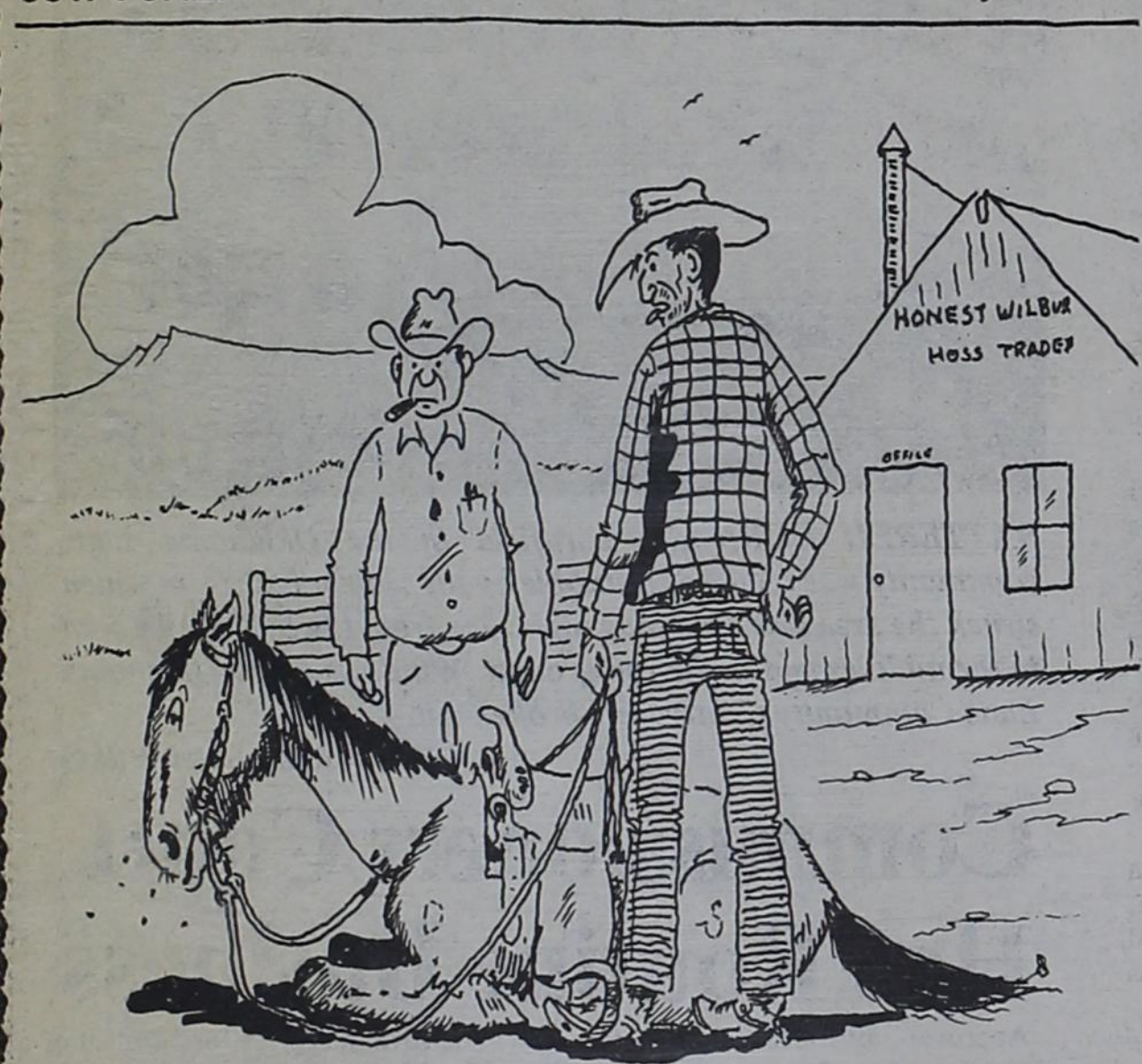

Rebecca's grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Adam Gomez of Bovina and Mr. and Mrs. Joe Guerra of Friona.

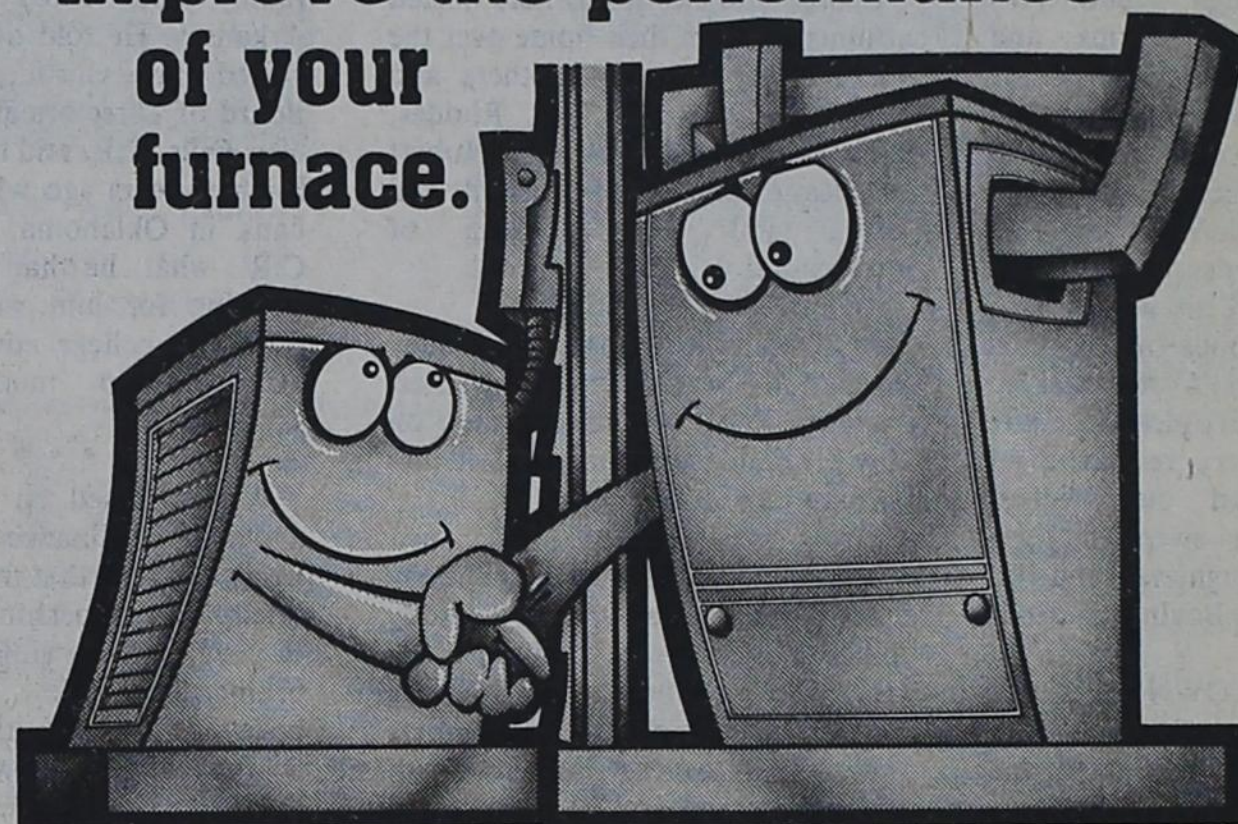

## TML Attacks GTE Rate

In testimony filed this week with the State Public Utility Commission, Texas Municipal League rate experts challenged the request of General Telephone Co. of the Southwest for a \$110 million rate hike.

The League's testimony was filed in advance of utility commission hearings, that begin April 15, on General Telephone's application for rate increases that would raise the monthly charges for some customers by as much as 71 per cent.

The Municipal League's analysis concluded that General Telephone's request for \$110 million was far in excess of the amount justified to keep the company financially sound. The cities' study of the company's books indicated that General Telephone was legitimately entitled to a rate hike of just \$23.3 million--about 21 per cent of the amount asked.

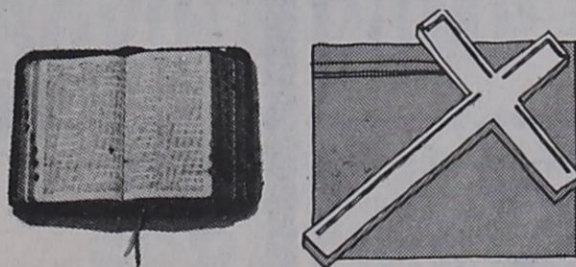

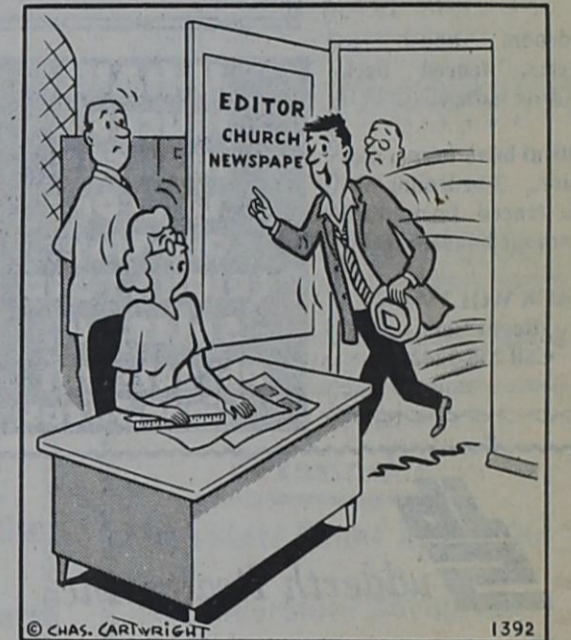
