

Tye PTO, Merkel officials getting ready for 13th hearing

Tye residents and school lawyers are sharpening their pencils in preparation for the Feb. 13th hearing, granted on a request of the Merkel Independent School District concerning a suit alledging non-representation on the Merkel Board of Trustees.

The Austin based-Texas Education Agency has scheduled "Administrative hearing" in the suit brought by the Tye Parent Teachers Organization.

Tye residents point to a paragraph in the Texas Education Code that states that citizens of a school district that is consolidated with another, is allowed board representation garanteed them.

Merkel school officials maintain that that segment of the law, applies only for the period directly following consolidation.

Both sides in the dispute don't have much to say about it publically, but both agree that the TEA hearing will probably end up being round

According to Mrs. Don Rogers, court reporter for Judge Don Lanes' 42nd District Court in Abilene said "no dates have been set for a hearing. The tye group filed suit in that court on Jan. 9 and since that time nothing else has officially happened."

Students being re-vaccinated

Dr. Curzon C. Ferris of the Abilene Taylor County Health Department has released the following statement:

There is increasing evidence to indicate that a statewide epidemic of measles (rubeola) will occur this year. Many cases are being reported among secondary school students (grades 7-12) in East Texas. 8 other states are already reporting epidemics as a result of these outbreaks and subsequent investigations are recommending that all students vaccinated prior to '68 or before their 1st birthday be revaccinated.

In order to cor dations, the Abilene-Taylor County Health Department, in cooperation with the Merkel I.S.D. and Trent I.S.D., has agreed to conduct a measles clinic at Merkel Middle School Library

on Feb. 15 from 9-12 a.m. Students who need revaccination will be receiving forms through the school that need to be signed by the parent and returned if you would like to take advantage of this free clinic. In case your child has been revaccinated since the date we have on our records, you will need only to send a physicians certified immunization record to school to update our records. Since Merkel schools have over 200 students who will be receiving letters, it is hoped you will seriously consider this situation and see that your child is fully protected against this disease. Back in March of 1978, the City Council of the City of Tye passed Ordinance 78-2 in which prescribes general speed limits within the

city limits. Section 1-a of the ordinance states, "NO person shall operate or drive any vehicle on any street within the city at a speed greater than thirty (30) miles per hour, unless signs which designate a different speed are erected in accordance with this ordinance". This means that all streets in Tye are 30 miles per hour speed zones EXCEPT around the Tye Elementary School which is 20 Mph. Tye judge former Air Force

film-maker

The movie business and the United States Air Force doesn't really seem to go together, but D.C. Hodges, now the municipal judge in Tye, spent 30 years in the Air Force and a good part of those years in various facets of the movie industry.

Judge Hodges at seventeen opted to join the Air Force instead of finishing high school in 1939. (He later finished high school.) He was assigned to Randolph A.F. Base in San Antonio.

At Randolph, Judge Hodges was the manager of the movie theaters on the base.

In 1944 Judge Hodges got caught up in what he called "the old switcheroo," where the Army runs short of personel from casualties so it transferred wounded to the Air Force for new

"The best thing about this was the Army assigned you to your code (what your particular field is) so I ended up in special services and that is the deluxe tour," explained Judge Hodges, "A team of us would go up to the front lines with our projectors and go to each camp and stay for two or three days to show a different movie each night.

The movies were sent to us over seas even before they were released in the states," said Judge Hodges.

Occasionally sniper fire would cause them to shut down during shows, "but we just turned it off and waited for things to cool down then start it back up," Judge Hodges said.

He stayed over seas for 16 mouths then returned to Randolph where he stayed until 1952 at which time he left for Denver for his third movie related job, supervisor to technical film

crews.

USDA has good news for Texas farmers

A top U.S. Department of Agriculture official ddn't have especially good news for farmers when he addressed the 1979 Texas Farmers Friday night. Union State convention

Dr. J.B. Penn, deputy administrator for conomics with the USDA's Economics, Statistics and Cooperatives Service, predicted that net farm income in 1979 will be about the same as in 1978, "or down slightly.

He said that while gross income is expected to increase about 3-4 percent for grain farmers, and somewhat more for livestock producers, heavy inflationary pressures will drive up production costs about the same pace.

Dr. Penn also suggested that it is unlikely that farmers will be able to exert sufficient political pressures on the upcoming session of Congress to change that status quo forecast. "It will be very, very difficult to get any changes in target prices and loan rates from this Congress" because of its sensitivity to the inflationary spiral, said the **USDA** official

Dr. Penn disagreed with those who are precasting a deep recession or a depression. He said nationwide purchasing pover will be up 2-3 percent in 1979, unemployment wili remain about the same and the inflation rate will be brought down only slightly

"So the indicators are that we will not have a deep recession, if we have one at all," said Dr. Penn.

Still, inflation will be the "overriding, underlying issue" in the upcoming political season, with Congress and the Administration reacting to a general public that has "swung a ittle to the conservative side.

"Whether or not the present administration shows any tangible success in the fight against inflation will be a critical factor in the next dection," declared the government official.

'So every expenditure will be closely scrutinized as an effort is made to pare the national deficit to \$30 billion.

Farm Bureau says keep USDA intact

Waco -- The Texas Farm Bureau is urging the Texas delegation in Congress to reject any proposals to strip "vital functions" from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In a letter to the 24 Texas Representatives and two Senators, IFB President Carrol Chaloupka said, "I want to place the Texas Farm Bureau squarely on record in opposition to the proposed transfer of major USDA functions to other departments."

Chaloupka referred to proposals by President Carter to create a new Department of Natural Resources and a new Department of Community Development, and have them take over certain functions of USDA.

"We believe that such transfers can only result in programs less responsive to the needs of Texas farmers and ranchers," Chaloupka said. "When
