City council coming up with an enforceable dog ordinance

The Merkel City Council met Friday and decided to have city manager J.A. Sadler put together a dog ordinance that can be enforced. The current city dog ordinance was written in 1966 and is vague as to what type of dogs can be considered a nuisance or a threat. Richard Holcomb and wife appeared before the council Friday morning to speak for the adoption of a dog ordinance. She told the council her six year old child had suffered a puncture wound from a dog bite last Monday and said she felt that the "People that owned the dog got off a little too easy." City Manager J.A. Sadler read portions of the dog ordinance from the city of Eastland and said that ordinance would be good to use as an outline for the new Merkel ordinance. Council unanimously agreed that a new code should be drawn up and that copies of the proposed code be displayed publically so that the citizens may voice their own inputs. Kent Satterwhite said, "I am running for reelection and I may get beat for saving this, but

I think it is time we do something about the dog problem." Council members agreed that whatever ordinance is passed will meet some opposition, but Satterwhite said, "You are going to upset some folks no matter what you do, but I'd rather see them upset over us trying to do something about the problem." When Sadler asked the council how tough of an ordinance they wanted him to write, council responded it should be as tough as needed to solve the problem. Sadler told council he would report on the progress of the ordinance at the next council meeting, scheduled for March 23rd at 7 a.m. at City Hall. The council was also informed that the West Central Texas Council of Governments will be footing the bill for four employees to fill the potholes in Merkel. The federal grant will last for approximately 18 months and the city will be responsible for providing materials, a truck and supervision for four employees.

City's pothole problems may end

The West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG) approved an application Tuesday that should put an end to the city's pothole problems. City Manager J.A. Sadler met Monday with a representative of the WCTCOG and asked the council of governments to provide salary for four persons to fill and patch potholes in the city. Sadler estimated that the city has 23 miles of streets inside the city limits. The federal government will pay the salary of four persons who will be filling and tamping potholes on paved and unpaved roads. The city will be responsible for providing a

vehicle, buying the material for filling the potholes as well as supervision. The funding is coming from Title 6 money in the Comprehensive Education and Training Act. The WCTCOG is seeking four persons that have been unemployed for 10 of the last 12 weeks. These four people will work on the potholes for approximately 18 months and will be paid at the rate of \$1.55 per hour. Persons interested in employment should go by the WCTCOG office on the 4th floor of the Alexander Building at 104 Pine in Abilene. The project will get underway as soon as four employees are hired.

Board delays bid opening

The Merkel Independent School District Board of Trustees met Monday night in a special session and took action on a number of matters. due to five days of lost time due to inclement weather will be made up to be in line with state statutes of minimum instruction days. Merkel students will attend classes March 19, 20, and 21. Those days were previously scheduled for spring break. Students will also attend school on April 16, a day that was originally designated as an Easter holiday. The board also agreed to move the date of bid openings for construction of academic facilities. The bids will be opened on April 3rd at 7:30 p.m. at a called meeting of the board. During the school board meeting Monday night, Charles Harper of Harper and Associates, the architectural firm in charge of Merkel school construction, informed the board that the Wylie ISD bid openings had found the low bid to be Rose and Sons in Abilene at \$45 per square foot. Those bids were out of the money.

Superintendent Dr. Raymond Etheridge asked the board for permission to use money in the Merkel ISD Construction account to pay off some of the debts from the demolition of old facilities as well as bills for architectural work, soil samples and financial advice. The board unanimously approved a motion giving the superintendent that authority. Dr. Etheridge also informed the board that a drawing was held for placement position on the ballot in the upcoming school board election. Barbara Kotrliek will be in position one on the ballot in the place two race between Mrs. Kotrliek and James Boyd. In place one Vicki Spur's name will appear first on the ballot in her race against Dink Whisenhunt. Dr. Etheridge also discussed tentative plans to turn large room being used for storage into a special education-special reading room. Etheridge said the change would free three academic classrooms at Tye Elementary to allow for future growth.

Four candidates file on last day

Four candidates waited until the last minute before filing for positions on the ballot in the upcoming city school election scheduled for April 7th. Those filing Wednesday in the city election are Joe Bigbee for mayor and Paul Crouse for city council. Filing Wednesday for school election are Vicki Spur and Barbara Kotrliek. Bigbee joins Ike Maxwell and Lou David Allen in the race for mayor and Crouse along with Kent

Satterwhite and Emma Lois Shugart seek two available positions on the city council. Mrs. Spur filed for place one on the school board facing Dink Whisenhunt and Mrs. Kotrliek will oppose James Boyd. The candidates received letters of invitation to a question and answer session being co-sponsored by KBGG and the Merkel Mail. The session is scheduled for March 30th at 10 a.m. in the KBGG studio.

Merkel Moto-Cross club completes track

The Merkel Moto-Cross Club spent Saturday and Sunday constructing their moto-cross track at the city landfill. The Merkel City Council gave the club permission to use the east corner of the landfill as a race track. The club made the mile and one half dirt track with jumps and tight curves using a bulldozer the city had rented for some upgrade work on the landfill.

The club spent Sunday testing the track to see what curve banks needed to be built up and to smooth out some of the rough spots. The Merkel Moto-Cross Club can now hold races here, they have been traveling to tracks across the Big Country to participate in races. Club members said the new track would have been impossible without the help of J.A. Sadler and Robert Harris.

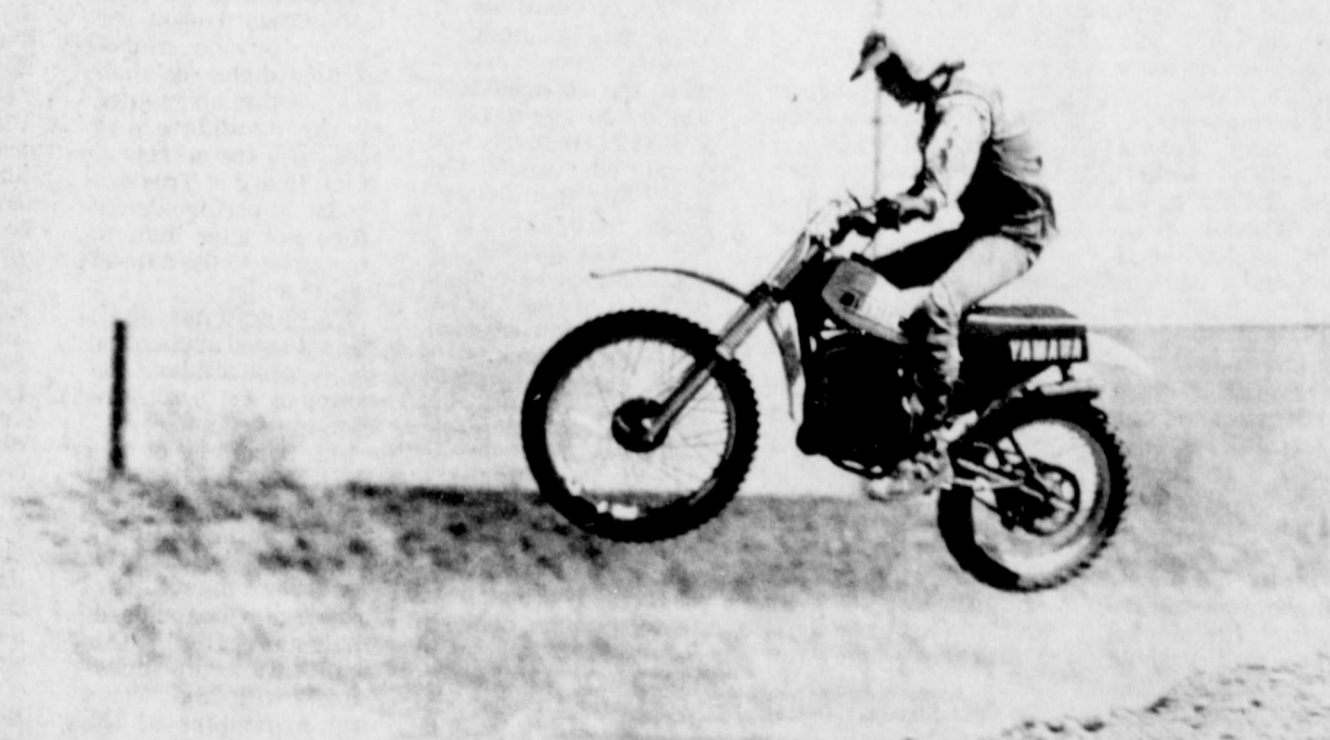
FFA raising funds for travel van

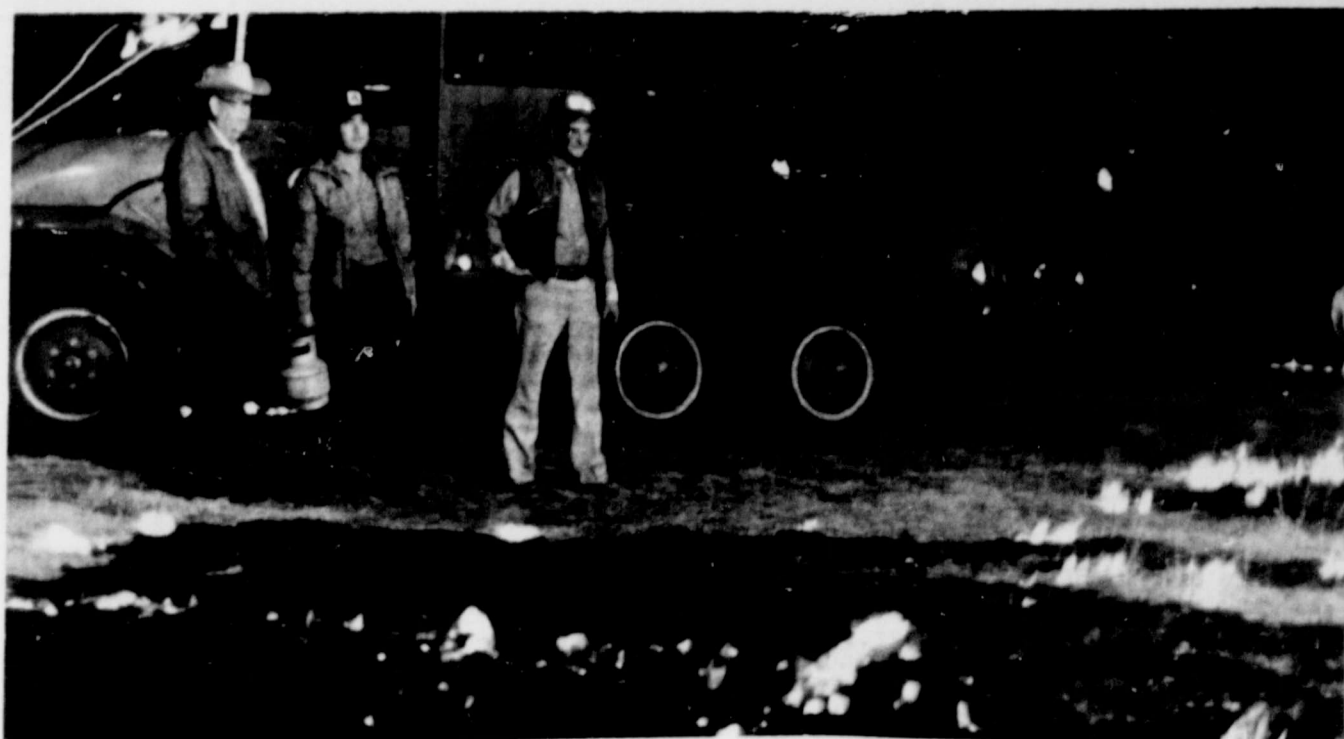
Although cystic fibrosis, the most serious lung-damaging disease, is still incurable, the average life expectancy of children affected has
